20 Yeah. I just recognized you,
21 Councilwoman, for a report from the
22 committee.

23 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Yes. Thank
24 you, Mr. President. The Committee on
25 Public Health and Human Services reports

2 out one bill with a favorable
3 recommendation.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you.

6 Mr. Decker, please read the
7 report.

8 CHIEF CLERK: The Committee on
9 Public Health and Human Services, to
10 which was referred Bill No. 210082,
11 entitled "An ordinance amending Title 17
12 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled
13 'Contracts and Procurement,' by amending
14 Chapter 17-1400, entitled
15 'Non-Competitively Bid Contracts;
16 Financial Assistance,' to provide
17 procedures applicable to the awarding of
18 contracts to non-City providers of
19 vaccine doses for COVID-19 and related
20 variants," respectfully reports it has
21 considered and amended the same and
22 returns the attached bill to Council with
23 a favorable recommendation.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you.

2 The Chair again recognizes
3 Councilwoman Bass.

4 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
5 Mr. President. I move that the rules of
6 Council be suspended so as to permit
7 first reading this day of Bill No.

9 (Duly seconded.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
11 Thank you. It has been moved and
12 properly seconded that the rules of
13 Council be suspended so as to permit
14 first reading this day of Bill No.
15 210082.

16 All those in favor indicate by
17 saying aye.

18 (Aye.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Those opposed?

21 (No response.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
23 ayes have it, and this bill will be
24 placed on our First Reading Calendar
25 today.

2 That concludes our reports from
3 committee, and our next order of business
4 is consideration of the Calendar.

5 I note that the bills just
6 reported from committee with a suspension
7 of the rules have been deemed to have had
8 a first reading. These bills will be

10 Passage Calendar at our next session of
11 Council.

12 As there are no additional
13 bills on the First Reading Calendar, the
14 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker for
15 the purpose of calling up resolutions and
16 bills on the Second Reading and Final
17 Passage Calendar.

18 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
19 you, Mr. President. The following
20 resolutions and bills are being called up
21 from the Second Reading and Final Passage
22 Calendars today. They are Nos. 210140,
23 210141, 210142, 210144, 210145, 210146,
24 210147, 210149, 210150, 210151, 210153,
25 and 200617. All other resolutions and

2 bills are being held, Mr. President.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you so much, Councilwoman.

5 Before we proceed with the
6 consideration of the Calendar, we will
7 move forward with our public comment.

8 We're going to take a brief
9 five- to ten-minute recess to give our
10 technology professionals some time to
11 connect the speakers that we have for
12 today's meeting.

13 (Brief recess.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 We're going to get started. Now that
16 everyone is connected to the meeting and
17 before considering the resolutions and
18 bills we have before us today, we will
19 consider public comment. It will go as
20 follows:

21 The public comment must concern
22 matters of the Second Reading and Final
23 Passage Calendars for possible action at
24 a session of Council. A speaker on any
25 of those matters must sign up in order to

5 When you call, we will take

10 add you to the list. We will telephone
11 each person on the list during the
12 Council session and invite them to our
13 remote meeting.

14 Depending on the circumstances,
15 we will designate a time. Today you will
16 have two minutes, so we ask you to
17 please, if you need to, adjust your
18 testimony to reflect a two-minute limit.

19 In order to be fair to all
20 those wishing to speak, I intend to hold
21 faithfully to the established time limit.
22 So once invited to the meeting and asked
23 to begin your testimony, a timer will be
24 started. We will monitor your remaining
25 time throughout your testimony, and when

2 there are 30 seconds remaining to your
3 time, you will be reminded of this. Once
4 your allotted time has passed, you will
5 be asked to conclude your remarks.

6 Shortly thereafter you will be muted and

9 the provisions of the public comment to
10 limit the number of speakers where
11 repetitious comments are being made on
12 the same matter and to limit the scope of
13 testimony to only certain items on the
14 agenda during the emergency, which could
15 affect callbacks for public comment at
16 the meeting.

17 And also please be aware that
18 the public meeting is being recorded, and
19 because the meeting is public,
20 participants and viewers have no
21 reasonable expectation of privacy. So by
22 continuing to be in the meeting, you are
23 consenting to being recorded.

24 I will now ask the Chief Clerk
25 to please read the name of our first

3 CHIEF CLERK: Tiffany Green,
4 commenting on 210142.

5 COUNCIL SUPPORT: She is not on
6 the line.

7 MS. GREEN: I am on the line.
8 Hello?

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
10 morning. Just state your name for the
11 record and proceed with your testimony.

12 MS. GREEN: Yes. Tiffany
13 Green. I am discussing Bill 210142.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Go
15 ahead.

16 MS. GREEN: Council President
17 and Council, we at Point Breeze community
18 is requesting your help to put on hold
19 Bill 210142 and stop the sale of 20
20 City-owned properties listed to sell to a
21 developer, Point Breeze Cross Street.
22 There was no public meeting for this
23 resolution bill that was fast-tracked and
24 introduced on February 18th and now is up
25 for final passage. This process will

2 have a negative impact.

3 Council President, you have
4 been promoting neighborhood preservation
5 initiatives, and we're saying that we
6 would like to have an opportunity to have
7 low-wage homeownership, which has not
8 been done in our community for people who
9 make under \$15 an hour. These are
10 essential workers, and we work at Shop
11 Rite and Ross and everything, and these
12 young ladies, single mothers with
13 children, has stated they would like to
14 have an opportunity for low
15 homeownership.

16 We have taken surveys in our
17 community, and they have stated that
18 workforce housing is not affordable.
19 They don't even feel \$150,000 is
20 affordable. We should be able to have 30
21 AMI homeownership below that, and we as a
22 community will accept a committee and
23 oversee these 20 properties.

24 You are selling to a developer
25 who just received 19 properties last year

for Grays Ferry and sold them from
185,000 to \$230,000. That is not
affordable for low-wage working families.

We want equal treatment. New
residents are notified in advance of
City-owned properties, and they are told
they have an opportunity to have meetings
and they're able to dictate. The City
just gave or approved six to ten
properties for a doggie park, but yet you
will not allow the Point Breeze community
to have opportunities.

Councilman Johnson promised 50
properties for homeownership on this
particular block. We are asking
Councilman Johnson to uphold his promise
from 2012-2013 and do not sell these
properties for workforce and market-rate
housing.

It is not fair to ask me to
stand with you in your common need and
yet you don't have the same respect for
us to have an opinion in our community
development process.

2 Okay? We ask that City Council
3 put a hold on this bill and please give
4 us a chance. I'm asking you to really
5 give us a chance during COVID-19.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, Ms. Green. Thank you for your
8 testimony.

9 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
10 is Rashaun R. Williams, commenting on
11 210144.

12 MR. WILLIAMS: Peace and love
13 and good morning, everybody. My name is
14 Reshaun Williams. I'm commenting on
15 Resolution No. 210144.

16 I want to start off by saying
17 that if there is a level of apathy toward
18 supporting this bill, then that means
19 that there is a strong level of apathy to
20 all of the consequences of not paying
21 attention to the repair of a people that
22 we have experienced in Philadelphia.

23 We've already been quite aware,
24 made well aware, of the amount of murders
25 that have taken place, the education

2 violence that takes place.

3 Gentrification is a completely separate
4 conversation. However, it's a part of
5 the same discussion.

6 There are a series of things
7 that plague specifically the black
8 community in Philadelphia and in the

10 to Philadelphians, the thing that I want
11 to prioritize is the apathy. And so,
12 like I said, if there is a level of
13 apathy towards a study for reparations,
14 then that means that we have no interest
15 in solving the issues that plague our
16 community directly here in the City of
17 Philadelphia.

18 I don't just urge us to
19 consider this reparations resolution for
20 us to study how proposals can be given
21 across the nation. I urge us to do so
22 because we have an education crisis, we
23 have a health crisis, we have a violence
24 crisis, we have a neurological cerebral
25 development process in our people's

2 ability to cognitively function, and we
3 haven't addressed any of those things.

4 So I'm excited to hear that
5 everyone is (inaudible) and how they will
6 share their opinions so that we can amass
7 a collective consciousness for us to
8 consider this reparations resolution.

9 And I would ask us to remember that we
10 are, and if we haven't and if we are not,
11 we were once, the members of the
12 community that need your advocacy.

13 So please do not forget that
14 you are a member of the community that
15 needed this advocacy so this work can be
16 done on behalf of our people, because you
17 are those people too.

18 Thank you so much.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you for your testimony. Appreciate
21 it.

22 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
23 is Breanna Moore, commenting on 210144.

24 MS. MOORE: Good morning. I'm
25 testifying today on behalf of N'COBRA,

2 the National Coalition of Blacks for
3 Reparations in America. We are in full
4 support of this --

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ms.
6 Moore, just state your name for the
7 record, please.

8 MS. MOORE: Breanna Moore.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
10 Thank you. Go ahead.

11 MS. MOORE: May I continue?

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes,
13 please.

14 MS. MOORE: Yes. I'm
15 testifying today on behalf of N'COBRA,
16 the National Coalition of Blacks for
17 Reparations in America, and we're in full
18 support for Resolution 210144 calling on
19 Congress to pass H.R. 40, the Commission
20 to Study and Develop Reparation Proposals
21 for African Americans.

22 Philadelphia is the poorest big
23 city in America, and we are a majority
24 black and brown city. We will benefit
25 the most from the passing of H.R. 40.

2 Black people live every day
3 with the afterlife of slavery. We
4 experience few life chances, limited
5 access to health and education, premature
6 death, incarceration, and poverty.

7 Enslaved Africans, our
8 ancestors and their descendants, have
9 suffered crimes against humanity. We
10 have suffered murder, extermination,
11 enslavement, deportation, forcible
12 transfer, imprisonment, torture, sexual
13 violence, persecution, sterilization.

14 All over the nation, academic,
15 medical, and religious institutions, city
16 councils, and state legislatures are
17 exploring their historical connections
18 with slavery and making efforts to
19 address its history. It's time for the
20 national government to do the same thing
21 through the H.R. 40 bill.

22 N'COBRA defines reparations as
23 a process of repairing, healing, and
24 restoring a people injured because of
25 their group identity and the violation of

their fundamental human rights by government, corporations, institutions, and families. Those groups that have been injured have the right to obtain from the government, corporation, institution or family responsible for the injuries which is needed to repair and heal themselves.

In addition to being a demand for justice, it is a principal international human rights law. We are asking for atonement for our black Holocaust, which has never been atoned for. The passage of this bill is a step toward making an atonement to our ancestors. We owe it to them and their descendants.

Thank you.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you for your testimony. We appreciate it.

CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker is Fatima Adekola, commenting on 210144.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

3 COUNCIL SUPPORT: She is not on

5 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
6 is Ari Merretazon, commenting on 210144.

7 MR. MERRETAZON: Thank you.

8 I'm Ari Merretazon of the Invisible
9 Church of our Enslaved Ancestors and the
10 Northeast Representative of N'COBRA,
11 which is the acronym for the National
12 Coalition of Blacks for Reparations in
13 America. I am a member of N'COBRA
14 Philadelphia. I requested an invitation
15 to revise and extend my remarks because
16 of restrictions on time.

17 Thanks, Councilman Kenyatta
18 Johnson, for the invitation to support
19 your resolution calling on Congress to
20 pass H.R. 40, the Commission to Study and
21 Develop Reparation Proposals for African
22 Americans Act. The H.R. 40 Commission
23 would target full repair in the context
24 of our people from 1619 to present day as
25 supported by the voluminous millions and

2 millions of written documents and now
3 databases.

4 H.R. 40 stands in the center of
5 the political crossroads representing
6 reparations for our wealth gap, for our
7 health gap, our political prisoners, and
8 our right of return and, yes, a check as
9 an element of the solution.

10 Currently there are 173
11 co-sponsors of H.R. 40. Locally the
12 congressional sponsors in the Delaware
13 Valley are Representative Brendan Boyle,
14 Second District; Representative Dwight
15 Evans, Third District; Representative
16 Madeleine Dean, Fourth District;
17 Representative Mary Gay Scanlon, Fifth
18 District; Representative Lisa Blunt
19 Rochester, Delaware at-large;
20 Representative Donald Norcross, First
21 District, Camden County, New Jersey.

22 Please join them with the
23 passage of this resolution, our mother's
24 mother's mother and our father's father's
25 father.

2 Thank you. This resolution
3 remembers them and values them and gives
4 new light to them through us, their new
5 centers.

6 As I close, today is an
7 auspicious day. We invite you and every
8 member of the Philadelphia City Council
9 to register for our Reparations Awareness
10 Day event at www.ncobraphl.org to better
11 understand the facts and circumstances of
12 what happened to our ancestors and the
13 generational injuries to us, their
14 descendants. Again, the website is
15 www.ncobraphl.org for Reparations
16 Awareness Day event.

17 Again, I thank Councilman
18 Johnson and the Philadelphia City
19 Councilmembers for this resolution
20 expressing your support for Congress to
21 pass H.R. 40, the Commission to Study and
22 Develop Reparation Proposals for African
23 Americans Act.

24 And, remember, and never
25 forget, reparation is the crossroad

2 solutions to our human capital
3 infrastructure in the context of a
4 reparations accord for the centers of
5 Africans enslaved in the United States as
6 a matter of public policy, and I thank
7 you for the short time.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
9 Thank you for your testimony. We
10 appreciate it.

11 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
12 is Nabeelah Bey, commenting on 210144.

13 MS. BEY: Good morning. This
14 is Nabeelah Bey speaking on 210144. I
15 call on the spirit of our great Queen
16 Mother Moore who presented a petition to
17 the United Nations in 1957 and in 1959
18 for self-determination against genocide
19 and for land and reparations.

20 I noticed that your bill asks
21 for compensation and atonement, and
22 compensation, of course, could never be
23 repaid for the free labor and the torture
24 of our ancestors. However, here are some
25 examples of repair, such as returning

lands that were stolen from people of African descent; granting land mass for people of African descent who choose to live among each other, although not being totally separated from the United States but still interacting with the United States, but we need some place where we can be among our own; free education through the doctorate level and loan forgiveness for all college and after high school training programs; free name changes, free legal name changes so that we can return to our own and practice self-determination; targeted physical and mental health treatment for the healing of our people.

And what is our people? One of the major tenets of N'COBRA is to honor the subject called peoplehood. You know, all people, all human beings have the right to determine their own peoplehood and to -- so I'm just asking that -- and I'm grateful for the resolution, and I'm asking that you give full support for

2 H.R. 40 and for all reparations bills.

3 Thank you.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you so much for your testimony.

6 Appreciate it.

7 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
8 is Maria Ortiz, commenting on 210142.

9 MS. ORTIZ: Yes. Hello? Can
10 you hear me?

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes,
12 we can. Just state your name for the
13 record and proceed with your testimony.

14 MS. ORTIZ: Maria Ortiz. I'm
15 opposing Bill 210142. I do not want to
16 sell -- these properties to be sold to a
17 high-end developer. We want low-wage
18 homes for people earning \$7.50 to \$15 a
19 place and low wage, not high end.

20 We give a sense of
21 homeownership and wealth where they can
22 appreciate the value of a home in
23 Philadelphia, besides working here too.
24 We have over 5,000 homeless people in
25 Philadelphia, not because they are not

2 working. It's because of the rents are
3 so high and the wages are \$7.50 to \$15.
4 Family torn apart where the system has
5 failed to help each other, where family
6 cannot get help and support.

7 Did you know we only have 700
8 beds in Philadelphia? If you have to be
9 in line by a certain time and if you
10 working, you do not have a place to
11 sleep. This is where it gets tricky. No
12 place. You sleeping on steps, alley,
13 park, maybe in a car if you have a
14 family, and bridges.

15 There are true people who want
16 homes, and families do too. Landlords
17 filing false claims, renter license not
18 up to date, and finally eviction. I am a
19 homeowner that lives here and been
20 affected, so have many others, in a
21 two-story row home. These new homes
22 towers over our home, causing damage. I
23 know. Where is the help for us?
24 Developers destroying people's homes.
25 Why is the City ready to throw long-term

residents away, those that choose to stay
here?

(Inaudible) causing debt
problem. What happens? We are good
enough to vote, but not enough for a
place to live, jobs, and supermarket.

If the new -- if a new person
comes to buy a home, they should be
paying their fair share of taxes. You
said the City needs money. Why are we
priced out, longtime residents? Why are
we getting less and the continuing
abatement gets more?

All I have seen is taxes hit
the most high, with utilities and other
entities. We, the longtime residents,
deserve better, not priced out with taxes
and water. Did you know water went up
\$60 more? We pay water bills on top of
that.

We voted for 17 Councilpeople
and a Mayor. Only three Councilperson
care about longtime residents. Did you
know a senior has four years --

10 MS. ORTIZ: Thank you for
11 listening to the problems and concerns of
12 the people of Philadelphia.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Thank you. Thank you so much for your
15 testimony. We appreciate it.

16 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
17 is Pat White, commenting on 210142.

18 MS. WHITE: Point Breeze is
19 requesting 20 City-owned properties. We
20 need our community to have --

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Ms. White?

23 MS. WHITE: -- low-income
24 housing.

25 Yes?

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Just
3 state your name for the record.

4 MS. WHITE: I'm sorry. Pat
5 White.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 MS. WHITE: All right. I'm
9 sorry.

10 Point Breeze is requesting 20
11 City-owned properties. We need our
12 community to have low-income housing
13 ownership. We want to be involved in
14 making decisions being allotted to these
15 developers. We have long-term ownership
16 in neighborhoods and feel our voices are
17 not being heard.

18 Again, I oppose Bill 210142.
19 Thank you.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Thank you for your testimony. We
22 appreciate it.

23 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
24 is Vivian Burbage, commenting on 210142.

25 MS. BURBAGE: Yes. I'm here.

2 My name is Vivian Burbage and I am
3 commenting on Bill 210142.

4 As a longtime and long-term
5 homeowner in the area of South
6 Philadelphia, I am under the constituency
7 of Kenyatta Johnson, and I vehemently
8 oppose the building of these 20
9 properties or given over to developers.
10 It will be a terrible impact on the
11 citizenry of South Philadelphia. Plus I
12 strongly oppose because we were given no
13 say-so in whether or not this bill is
14 passed or not.

15 While I hope it's put on hold
16 or at least stopped, because this bill
17 should be placed in the hands of the
18 citizenry of South Philadelphia,
19 primarily because we need peers of our
20 own kind down here, and it should be
21 reserved for low-wage to low-income
22 homeownership.

23 We have many people in this
24 area who are trying to buy a home, but if
25 it's stated and slated for the property

2 for millionaires or people in that income
3 bracket, it will serve no purpose for us
4 down here.

5 While there are many reasons
6 why I oppose it, that is my strongest one
7 and that is what I feel so very
8 passionately about. Please --

10 MS. BURBAGE: Hello? Can you
11 hear me? I'm still talking.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm
13 sorry about that.

14 MS. BURBAGE: That's all right.
15 I just want to say that I did really
16 oppose the building of these homes given
17 over to developers. We need an equal
18 share. We need our equal say-so in the
19 building of these homes.

20 Thank you. I relinquish the
21 rest of my time.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 Thank you very much for your testimony.
24 We appreciate it.

25 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER:

2 Mr. President, just a point of personal
3 privilege. I'm going to ask everybody
4 who is on the line, because I don't know
5 if it's coming out on your end,
6 Mr. President, but someone needs to mute
7 their mic if they are not speaking.

8 Thank you, Mr. President.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you, Councilwoman. It did come
11 through on mine, yes. I heard it.

12 Mr. Decker, go ahead.

13 CHIEF CLERK: The next speaker
14 is Anette Randolph, commenting on 210142.

15 MS. RANDOLPH: Good morning.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
17 morning.

18 MS. RANDOLPH: Good morning.

19 My name is Anette Randolph. Hello. My
20 name is Anette Randolph and my husband,
21 Dennis, has retired from the Army. We
22 reside here at 2012 Ellsworth Street,
23 where I am the co-block captain. I have
24 been at our permanent address for
25 61 years and have seen this neighborhood

2 do a dramatic change.

3 I am opposing this Bill 210142.

4 I am requesting, pleading for low-wage
5 homeownership for low-wage working
6 families, like my daughter and son, who
7 works very hard and have children who
8 would love to have their own homes,
9 bedrooms, backyard, basements, and a home
10 that they can look to say they own a home
11 from hard work.

12 Please stop looking straight
13 without realizing we have another
14 generation that is here and is still
15 coming, and they look to us as well as
16 voting.

17 I thank you, and that's all I
18 have to say.

The American Heart Association is proud of our continued partnership and collaboration with City Council, the Department of Public Health, the School District of Philadelphia, and the City of Philadelphia. Together, we have implemented innovative approaches to improve health equity, including removing sugary drinks from children's meals, adding additional restrictions to the back of retail licenses, making it more difficult for youth to become addicted to nicotine products, CPR trainings to help

5 NOW, National Organization for
6 Women, is the grassroots arm of the
7 women's movement and is dedicated to a

9 approach to women's rights and the
10 largest organization of feminist
11 grassroots activists in the United
12 States.

13 NOW condemns the racism that
14 inflicts a double burden of race and sex
15 discrimination on women of color. Seeing
16 human rights as indivisible, we are
17 committed to identifying and fighting
18 against those barriers to quality and
19 justice that are imposed by racism.

20 A necessary step to permanently
21 dismantle systemic racism is to
22 acknowledge the promise of 40 acres and a
23 meal that was never honored. Imagine how
24 profoundly different the history of race
25 relations in the United States would have

2 been had this policy been implemented and
3 enforced and had the formerly enslaved
4 actually had access to ownership of land
5 of property and if they had the chance to
6 build, accrue, and pass on wealth. Today

9 We also want to underscore a
10 woman's right in this matter of
11 reparations, because there have been some
12 parts of slavery that black women bore
13 alone. The lack of significant data
14 pertaining to the practice of exploiting
15 the sexual vulnerability and reproductive
16 capacity of enslaved women have led to
17 African American women to yet acquire a
18 coherent legal doctrine with which to
19 address the modern manifestations of
20 female slaves' sexual and reproductive
21 abuse. We are requesting that analysis
22 of the sex of female slaves' sexual and
23 reproductive abuse be studied and
24 incorporated into the modern slavery
25 reparations movement in the United

10 four are going for market rate.

11 So it's a mixed-income package
12 that we're working with the developer for
13 to make sure that we have some level of
14 balanced housing in the Point Breeze
15 community, and also the houses are sold
16 at 80 percent AMI.

17 So it's a balanced approach,
18 but also just for the record that I want
19 to state for the listeners as well and my
20 colleagues in terms of my background and
21 making sure that we have affordable and
22 workforce housing and low-income housing
23 in Point Breeze, we also are working with
24 the Women's Revitalization Corporation
25 where we just did a proposal, an RFP, for

2 33 houses in Point Breeze, and these are
3 super low-income housing, rents starting
4 at \$800, maxing out at \$1,300,
5 particularly to help individuals,
6 primarily women with children. That's
7 with Nora Lichtash.

8 So we continue to look for
9 affordable housing options in Point
10 Breeze, and also remind individuals that
11 I am the Councilperson who passed the
12 bill known as the extension to LOOP.
13 That's the Longtime Owner Occupants
14 Program for long-term residents to have a
15 lifetime tax abatement, not ten years, if
16 you live in a home in the Point Breeze
17 community or any other community across
18 the City of Philadelphia for more than
19 ten years. And obviously at one time the
20 bill stated that your taxes had to
21 triple. We amended the bill now to only
22 have to increase a half a percentage as
23 it comes to your taxes increasing, and
24 you can be eligible for that program if
25 you live in your home for more than ten

years for the lifetime. So that's a
lifetime tax abatement.

And so I do want to address
this narrative regarding my approach to
making sure that we have a level of
affordable and mixed-income housing in
the Point Breeze area, but this
particular proposal, I have been working

sure that we have a balanced approach for
affordable and workforce housing in Point
Breeze.

And so with that being said, I

7 on Gun Violence Prevention to hold joint
8 hearings regarding the connection between
9 poverty, gun violence, and systemic
10 racism in Philadelphia, introduced by
11 Councilman Green.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
13 Chair recognizes Councilman Green.

14 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
15 Council President. This is an issue that
16 this body has been focusing on for some
17 time. Councilmember Kenyatta Johnson has
18 been very focused on this issue for some
19 time and Chair of the Special Committee
20 on Gun Violence, as well as Councilmember
21 Curtis Jones, who is the Chair of our
22 Public Safety Committee, as well as
23 Councilmember Jamie Gauthier, who
24 recently joined the National League of
25 Cities on an issue regarding this

2 concern, and all members of Council have
3 been very focused on this issue.

4 We know that we had a horrific
5 statistic last year, that we reached 499
6 homicides, the highest since 1990.

7 Already this year we're at a 42 percent
8 increase over last year's very horrific
9 number. And it was actually someone
10 that's been working on this issue for
11 some time, Bilal Qayyum, who many of you
12 know has been very active in working
13 trying to address gun violence and
14 violence in the City, but also he worked
15 for the City in the Commerce Department.
16 And in conversations, we talked about the
17 connection between the homicides and gun
18 violence in our city and also the lack of
19 African American businesses and the
20 growth of businesses and the connection
21 of systemic racism between that issue.

22 And when you think about in the
23 City of Philadelphia only 6 percent of
24 businesses with employees are owned by
25 African Americans in the City of

2 Philadelphia and during the height of the
3 pandemic, there was a 68 percent
4 reduction in the number of active black
5 business owners in our city compared to a
6 44 percent reduction for white business
7 owners.

8 So this connection between the
9 issues of gun violence and homicide and
10 poverty and the lack of growth of
11 businesses is something I think there's a
12 need to have a further examination.

13 I want to thank all of my
14 colleagues for co-sponsoring this
15 resolution, and I move for its adoption.

16 (Duly seconded.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you. It's been moved and properly
19 seconded.

20 All those in favor indicate by
21 saying aye.

22 (Aye.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Those opposed?

25 (No response.)

3 ayes have it, and that resolution is
4 adopted.

5 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
6 other resolutions on the Final Passage
7 Calendar, Mr. President.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

10 That concludes our Calendar for
11 today.

12 We will move to our speeches.
13 And I'd just like to say for the record
14 prior to recognizing members regarding
15 speeches, I will note for the record at
16 this time that we will use the Chat
17 feature available in Microsoft Teams to
18 allow members to signify that they wish
19 to be recognized. In order to comply
20 with the Sunshine Act, the Chat feature
21 must only be used for this purpose.

22 With that said, are there any
23 speeches on behalf of the minority?

24 I believe Councilmember Brooks.

25 COUNCILWOMAN BROOKS: Thank

2 you, Council President.

3 I would like to thank my
4 colleagues, Councilmembers Jamie
5 Gauthier, Katherine Gilmore Richardson,
6 Derek Green, Helen Gym, Cherelle Parker,
7 and Isaiah Thomas, for co-sponsoring the
8 resolution that I introduced today
9 calling on the Biden administration to
10 cancel student debt and begin the
11 transition to education as a public good.

12 Our higher education system is
13 at a breaking point, as even entry-level
14 jobs require one, if not multiple,
15 degrees. Our community members are
16 growing into hundreds of thousands of
17 dollars of debt to land jobs that provide
18 little more than a minimum wage. And the
19 data is clear. Debt cancellation is
20 racial justice.

21 I personally have struggled
22 with student loan debt, and I have seen
23 firsthand the impact it has on
24 generational wealth. And I worry about
25 my children also going into debt for

2 their education.

3 Black borrowers take out loans
4 at a far higher rate than our white
5 counterparts, and this widens the racial
6 wealth gap, and it makes it exceedingly
7 difficult for our communities of color to
8 purchase homes and live stable,
9 self-fulfilled lives.

10 While the pandemic has laid
11 bare the systemic inequities in our
12 society, it has also helped us to expand
13 our ideas of what is possible, and it has
14 shown us a world without evictions,
15 without utility shut-offs, and where
16 people's basic needs, like food and
17 shelter, are met, and it has shown us a
18 world without student loan payments and
19 compound interest rates.

20 As we look towards
21 Philadelphia's recovery, we need to be
22 creative and bold with our solutions. As
23 the poorest big city in the country, we
24 need people-centered policies that lift
25 people out of poverty and ease their

2 financial burden.

3 Full debt consolidation will
4 help us close a racial wealth gap,
5 stimulate the economy, and reduce
6 unnecessary suffering at a time when our
7 communities have already endured so much.

8 And I want to thank the debt
9 collectors and their advocacy and
10 leadership, especially Jalil Bishop,
11 whose research on student debt and
12 systemic racism in Philadelphia inspired
13 this resolution, and I want to thank
14 Council President and thank you, Council
15 colleagues.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Thank you, Councilwoman. Thank you so
18 much for always being focused on those in
19 need.

20 Speeches on behalf of the
21 majority?

22 The Chair recognizes Councilman
23 Domb.

24 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
25 Council President. I wanted to speak

2 briefly regarding the introduction of
3 Bill No. 210121. As the Chair knows and
4 the other members of the Committee know,
5 I voted against this bill moving out of
6 committee. I just want to explain my
7 vote and make one simple request of the
8 Administration and, that is, before next
9 week's final vote, please show us the
10 plan.

11 The Administration is asking us
12 to hand over another big check for our
13 city's responses to COVID, \$50 million,
14 but on Monday we really didn't see a lot
15 of details around how that money would be
16 spent. And I know a lot of us have asked
17 for more details on the City's
18 vaccination operations. In fact, during
19 last week's hearing, I know
20 Councilmembers asked for additional data
21 on the number of vaccines being
22 distributed by location, zip code, and
23 other information on who exactly were
24 vaccinated.

25 I think everything we're asking

2 for is reasonable, including a plan I
3 requested. My concern at this point is
4 simple. We lack a detailed plan, a plan
5 that lays out goals and timelines, a plan
6 that explains exactly what we're doing,
7 when, and how we're doing it. And until
8 we have those plans in place, I can't
9 justify handing over another large check
10 to the Administration.

11 On Monday, our committee, led
12 by Chairperson Quinones-Sanchez, had an
13 open and very transparent conversation
14 about this vote, and I really appreciated
15 her willingness to consider my
16 perspective on this. I know she's
17 working to get us the information we need
18 so we all can be comfortable with our
19 vote next week, but I want to be clear, I
20 can't vote for this without some
21 knowledge or confidence in the
22 Administration's plan to spend this
23 additional \$50 million.

24 The Philly Special Coalition
25 called for a plan that was big and bold

2 enough to vaccinate our citizens quickly
3 and restore equity to a vaccination
4 system that is vaccinating white
5 neighborhoods twice as fast as
6 communities of color.

7 One week ago, this body, we
8 voted 16 to 1. We passed a resolution to
9 put the Philly Special plan in place, to
10 ramp up drive-through mass vaccination
11 sites at Lincoln Financial Field, the
12 Mann Center, our largest black churches,
13 and large outdoor parking lots in every
14 section of the City. We were told as
15 recently as a week ago that the Linc and
16 these other large outdoor venues did not
17 make sense. And the quote is, the
18 Administration said, "Using the Linc as a
19 site is not feasible at the moment
20 because it's due to the shortages in
21 vaccine supplies the City is being
22 allocated. If and when the City begins
23 to get substantially more doses of the
24 vaccine, using Lincoln Financial Field as
25 a vaccination site may be considered."

2 This was one week ago.

3 Yesterday the Administration changed
4 their tune. These are the words used
5 yesterday, just two days ago, at the
6 weekly COVID-19 meeting, and I quote, "We
7 are more or less at the point now where
8 the greatest limiting factor is not the
9 number of doses we receive, but just our
10 own capacity to administer them through
11 all the different organizations that were
12 administering them through the City."

13 So I want to be clear. I want
14 to get this straight. A week ago we
15 didn't need to ramp up capacity because
16 we weren't getting enough doses. Now,
17 one week later, we have run out of
18 capacity to move the doses we're
19 currently getting.

20 The same day we were told we
21 have run out of vaccine distribution
22 capacity, Pfizer and Moderna announced an
23 additional 220 million doses of vaccine
24 will be available in March. Johnson &
25 Johnson has already said that 100 million

2 of its one-shot vaccinations will be
3 distributed in June.

4 To my fellow Councilmembers, if
5 we're currently limited not by the number
6 of doses we get but by our capacity to
7 distribute them, this is why we need a
8 plan today to increase capacity.

9 In the coming week and before
10 we vote, I'd like the Administration to
11 come to us with a detailed plan for how
12 we'll be able to escalate the vaccination
13 distribution through current channels and
14 additional channels.

15 I know I've been very outspoken
16 about the use of Lincoln Financial Field
17 and other large neighborhood locations,
18 but it's only because I believe we have
19 to think bigger and be bolder about our
20 future level of distribution so we're
21 ready to go on day one.

22 The call for a plan is also a
23 call for transparency. Last week when we
24 were informed of the FEMA Type 1 site
25 coming to the Pennsylvania Convention

2 Center, the Commissioner said many of the
3 details were still being worked out. But
4 in a city with a black population of
5 44 percent currently receiving less than
6 20 percent of our vaccines, putting our
7 only federal mega site within walking
8 distance of 195,000 Center City
9 residents, 67 percent of them who are
10 white, presents its own unique challenges
11 to ensure racial equity.

12 So we need to see a real plan
13 of action for how we're targeting the
14 very people we need to get to the
15 Convention Center in the next six weeks.
16 We need a transit plan, a parking plan, a
17 zip code targeting effort, and we need to
18 see outreach plans that include trusted
19 community partners.

20 A vote earlier this week
21 against moving 50 million of CARES
22 dollars to the General Fund was one more
23 attempt to try to get the Administration
24 to give us a plan, a clear path forward,
25 to vaccinating 100,000 people per week

2 when those doses reach this level, which
3 could be next month, and it's still not
4 too late.

5 The Philly Special plan can be
6 that plan. It was ten drive-through mega
7 sites, one in each Councilmanic district,
8 including a FEMA Type 1 drive-through
9 mega site at the Lincoln Financial Field,
10 capable of shooting over 10,000 doses per
11 day. That's 70,000 per week. All of
12 these sites linked to a web platform that
13 registers and schedules all vaccine
14 appointments by zip code, ensuring the
15 racial equity.

16 If not this plan, then show us
17 one that can achieve levels of dosing and
18 timetables that match the supply levels
19 set by the vaccine companies and the
20 Biden administration.

21 I applaud our health partners,
22 community leaders, faith leaders,
23 universities, groups like the Black
24 Doctors fighting COVID and other
25 non-profits, all who have stepped up to

2 confront the health crisis of our time.

3 This is a health crisis of our

4 generation. They all understand, as we

5 do, that the sooner we get people

6 vaccinated, the sooner we can safely

7 bring people back to work and students

8 back to school. And the sooner we can

9 bring back our way of life, the better it

10 is for everyone in the City.

11 But without a plan in place,

12 it's unclear what we're holding the

13 Administration accountable for

14 accomplishing these next few months.

15 That is why for the sake of the City, we

16 have to continue to look at this

17 critically and ensure every dime we spend

18 is maximized.

19 I don't think I'm being

20 unreasonable in my request to the

21 Administration, and before we vote next

22 week, I'm hopeful the Administration will

23 come through with an operational plan

24 that we all feel comfortable with moving

25 forward.

2 I think it's important that we
3 ask the questions we've all been asking,
4 all of us, and it's imperative to the
5 process that the Administration answer
6 them. But until then, without a plan, I
7 am a no vote.

8 My fellow Councilmembers, I've
9 never been more passionate about anything
10 other than this. This is a moment in
11 time for all of us. We are facing the
12 health crisis of our generation. We will
13 all be judged as to what we did to ensure
14 the citizens of this city receive the
15 potential life-saving vaccinations as
16 fast and as equitably as possible. We
17 must take this crisis as an opportunity,
18 the opportunity to show our constituents
19 that we met the moment with a boldness of
20 plan and the thoughtfulness in execution.
21 This is what they deserve and have a
22 right to demand from all of us.

23 Thank you for the time today,
24 Mr. President. Thank you.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Thank you, Councilman.

3 The Chair recognizes Councilman
4 Thomas.

5 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Thank you,
6 Council President. Can you guys hear me
7 good?

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes,
9 sir.

10 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: So, first,
11 Council President, I just want to let you
12 know that we got some positive feedback
13 about the Clarke and Thomas Sports Show
14 already. So thank you, Councilmember
15 Green, for your recommendation.
16 Apparently the public heard it and we've
17 already received some positive rave
18 reviews.

19 But I want to actually start by
20 echoing the sentiments of my colleague
21 Councilmember Domb in joining him on a
22 choir of saying we need a plan. I too
23 was in the Appropriations hearing this
24 past week, and outside of that
25 Appropriations hearing, I also had an

2 opportunity to join Councilmembers Brooks
3 and Gym, whose leadership I appreciate,
4 to stand outside a little bit with some
5 of the people who were at the 24-hour
6 vaccination site that the Black Doctors
7 Consortium put together, and I got a
8 chance to talk to some folks. And I
9 think that personal narratives are
10 important where you could talk to people,
11 but I actually asked them to document
12 their experience.

13 So I want to take a moment --
14 and I don't normally do this, but I want
15 to take a moment to talk about what
16 somebody, who I'm going to call Mr. B,
17 said as it relates to standing in line at
18 the vaccination site.

19 So Mr. B -- and I'm not going
20 to read it verbatim, because it's very,
21 very long, but Mr. B talked about the
22 fact that it was freezing cold out there,
23 freezing temperatures, right? Mr. B
24 talked about how he had on his gloves.
25 He talked about how poorly the City did

2 not support the Black Doctors Consortium.
3 He talked about parking citations. And I
4 vividly remember in our hearing bringing
5 up the PPA and issues with parking. He
6 talked about people getting parking
7 citations. He talked about people being
8 worried about parking. He talked about
9 the difficulties to go to the bathroom.
10 He talked about type of vending, meals
11 not available, nothing in the sense of
12 hot food.

13 But at the end of the day,
14 after all that, he closed out by saying
15 he was thankful to get the vaccination.
16 He was so appreciative of the Black
17 Doctors Consortium, of them stepping up
18 to the plate, but so disappointed in the
19 City of Philadelphia as it relates to the
20 lack of plan and the lack of planning
21 surrounding -- anticipating the fact that
22 he said thousands of people is what it
23 felt like to him being out there for six
24 hours in the freezing cold with
25 essentially no support at all.

2 So when Councilmember Domb says
3 that we need a plan, it's examples like
4 who I'm calling Mr. B and several dozen
5 other people who I had an opportunity,
6 the unfortunate opportunity, to meet
7 while they were standing outside for
8 hours this past weekend. But then it's
9 also similar to the conversation that I
10 had with members of District Council 33,
11 who this past week talked about the fact
12 that they have absolute no plan, no
13 indication, no communication as it
14 relates to when their employees will be
15 vaccinated, and they have been
16 front-line, essential workers since the
17 start of this pandemic, which is almost a
18 year, which was almost a year ago.

19 So I think that when we're
20 screaming and hollering this
21 communication issue and this sense of
22 urgency that's needed around the
23 vaccination, I'm going to put on my
24 Marvel super hero kid hat and say,
25 listen, we have the cure, right? Like

2 this is the cure. People want access to
3 the cure. People want to be relieved of
4 that anxiety, and they want to put
5 themselves in the position where they can
6 have some level of norm after all the
7 trauma and negative experiences that
8 we've all faced over the last year.

9 So thank you, Councilmember
10 Domb. I appreciate your leadership and
11 your advocacy on this issue, as well as
12 other members of Council, and it's a huge
13 problem.

14 I also want to take a moment to
15 thank my colleague and fellow millennial
16 member in Council, Councilmember Gilmore
17 Richardson, who I've been working with
18 for months now as it relates to the work
19 of the Disadvantaged Communities Task
20 Force. It's an honor to introduce the
21 Illuminating the Arts bill today, which
22 we announced earlier this week.

23 I also appreciate all of my
24 other colleagues who have been working in
25 collaboration with the Arts and Culture

2 Task Force to put us in a position to try
3 to create some level of stimulus dollars
4 but, more importantly, some level of hope
5 as it relates to this legislative body
6 and our focus specifically with the arts
7 and culture community. And other
8 Councilmembers have been doing this work
9 long before I got here, like
10 Councilmember Green, Councilmember
11 Squilla, Councilmember Oh, and I probably
12 missed one or two. I appreciate you,
13 appreciate your work and your support
14 with the Task Force, and of course,
15 Council President, I appreciate you.

16 I know I'm a little longwinded,
17 but I still got to keep going. I
18 apologize.

19 We actually had a very
20 important hearing yesterday as it relates
21 to hit-and-runs, and the hearing was
22 rather lengthy but also rather
23 informative, and we were able to hear
24 from experts and different opinions as it
25 relates to what we need to do around this

1 2/25/21 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 issue. But I think most people who were
3 in the hearing would agree that the most
4 heart-wrenching testimony was from the
5 victims, the victims and the families who
6 have lost loved ones to hit-and-runs in
7 the City of Philadelphia. And I know for
8 me, it was very emotional to hear from
9 Reverend Evans and her talk about the
10 tragic loss of her son. And what was
11 even more discouraging was the lack of
12 response from the City of Philadelphia
13 and the lack of action. And I think
14 Reverend Evans spoke for dozens of
15 citizens across the City of Philadelphia
16 who have been victims of what we know to
17 be in 2020 more deaths, more fatalities
18 through hit-and-runs than what we've seen
19 in over a decade.

20 So when we talk about the
21 different issues that we have across the
22 City, one of the things that came out of
23 the hearing was that we need capital
24 investment in infrastructure. That was a
25 direction that we need to go to. And as

2 I left the hearing, it began to really
3 sink in me like, wow, we need capital
4 investment in a lot of things.

5 So I think it was Councilmember
6 Green who in one of our hearings earlier
7 this week said that he was calling on the
8 Administration to be innovative as it
9 relates to how we approach this budget
10 season, and I'm going to go ahead and
11 echo his sentiments today in Council. I
12 too am calling on the Administration to
13 be very innovative as it relates to us
14 moving into budget season. We need
15 capital investments in infrastructure.
16 We need capital investments in our
17 schools. Clearly, that's a problem that
18 we are facing as it relates to trying to
19 get folks returning to schools.

20 We have a huge gun violence
21 problem in the City of Philadelphia, and
22 I know me personally, I've been begging
23 the Administration to be innovative as it
24 relates to how we invest into
25 prevention-based initiatives. And when

2 you look at that achievement gap that
3 we're going to have as it relates to
4 virtual learning and us being unprepared
5 for that, on top of the gun violence
6 epidemic that we see in Philadelphia
7 right now, it's imperative that we see
8 innovation as it relates to this budget
9 cycle and we see the Administration
10 hopefully lead the way as it relates to
11 putting dollars and resources into places
12 in the neighborhoods that can really put
13 some holes in some of these problems that
14 we're complaining about. And
15 unfortunately if the Administration
16 doesn't lead the way, I am very confident
17 in this Council body working together to
18 redistribute dollars in the City of
19 Philadelphia to help move those who are
20 suffering the most.

21 Council President, colleagues,
22 thank you so much. I apologize for being
23 longwinded, but I do appreciate your
24 patience.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

3 The Chair recognizes Councilman
4 Jones.

5 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
6 Mr. President. In the past when any
7 ethnic group was attacked, the people
8 that took the greatest offense weren't
9 from the particular ethnic group
10 involved. So my Asian colleagues stepped
11 up to the plate when Muslims were
12 attacked. My Christian colleagues
13 stepped up to the plate when Jewish
14 cemeteries were attacked. And what sent
15 the best signal in my mind was that
16 non-impacted ethnic groups stood shoulder
17 to shoulder with their counterparts from
18 other parts of the culture.

19 Today I rise because of the
20 lack of understanding that some people
21 have when they put on a menu that they
22 want to have COVID-19 mac and cheese and
23 giving an Asian flavoring to it. It's
24 not funny. I'm putting you on notice,
25 it's not funny.

2 If you've ever been to the
3 Holocaust Museum, if you've ever been to
4 Lest We Forget in the Eighth Councilmanic
5 District talking about slavery, people
6 hid their racist intent behind humor.
7 Haha, heehee.

8 As a member of the Pennsylvania
9 Human Relations Commission, we've noted
10 that in the country, there have been
11 close to 3,000 attacks on Asian Americans
12 since COVID-19. Once again, here's the
13 memo: It's not funny, it's not
14 acceptable. And I take offense just as
15 hard as anyone from the Chinese or Asian
16 community, that if it's done to them, it
17 is done to all of us.

18 So whether you don't get the
19 memo about how insensitive something like
20 that can be, take note, take note today,
21 and please let us kind of understand and
22 view these humorous attempts through the
23 other person's lens, because it's just
24 not funny.

25 Thank you, Mr. President.

3 Thank you, Councilman.

4 The Chair recognizes

5 Councilwoman Bass.

6 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
7 Mr. President.

8 And I wanted to start actually
9 first by recognizing the Black Doctors
10 Consortium, awesome job, awesome job,
11 awesome job with what they did with
12 vaccinating over 4,000 people last
13 weekend, but I agree, the question is
14 where is the City of Philadelphia? Where
15 is the Administration? And this is not
16 to attack or beat anyone up, but we need
17 to do better. Our constituents deserve
18 it. They need it.

19 This is something that is
20 life-saving, and there's no reason,
21 there's really no reason with a city with
22 a nearly \$5 billion budget that we
23 haven't done better by our most
24 vulnerable constituents. So I did want
25 to say that for the record.

2 I also wanted to take time to
3 highlight the creativity and passion of
4 our Philadelphians and Philadelphia-based
5 organizations in tackling highly
6 important issues within our city. And
7 first I wanted to recognize Cody
8 Anderson, who passed away on Saturday.
9 He was an iconic leader in black media
10 for decades. He was the first General
11 Manager of WURD, the only African
12 American-owned and operated talk radio
13 station in Pennsylvania. He was the
14 President and General Manager of WDAS
15 105.3 FM, and the owner and General
16 Manager of WHAT 1340 AM. He was also a
17 member of Canaan Baptist Church of
18 Germantown in my district. And Cody was
19 well known by his colleagues as a beloved
20 host, mentor, and friend. He used radio
21 not only for music and talk, but also to
22 discuss black political power and
23 black-owned and operated radio.

24 Many people who entered radio
25 broadcasting attribute the start of their

2 career and the existence of black radio
3 in Philadelphia to Cody. And so he will
4 truly be missed. I counted him as a
5 mentor, as a friend, and we're really
6 going to miss him. I think the last time
7 I spoke to him was a few weeks ago,
8 Council President Clarke, when I called
9 into your radio show with Cody and you,
10 and it was a great time. I'm glad that I
11 called in that day. I'm glad I was able
12 to have that experience. And that was
13 unfortunately our last conversation
14 together, but until we meet again, to my
15 good friend Cody Anderson. He will be
16 missed.

17 I also wanted to make mention
18 that February is National African
19 American Read-In Month and is the
20 nation's first and oldest event dedicated
21 to diversity in literature. Dr. Ebony
22 Elizabeth Thomas, Associate Professor at
23 the University of Pennsylvania Graduate
24 School of Education, leads the Humanizing
25 Stories Project, which is celebrating

2 Black History Month and African American
3 Read-In Month by highlighting new and
4 classic books from the African American
5 diaspora.

6 Recommendations can be
7 submitted to the @healingfictions Twitter
8 account. And, again, that's
9 @healingfictions Twitter.

10 In Philadelphia, I also want to
11 make note that heart disease is the
12 leading cause of death and takes lives at
13 a higher rate here than any other big
14 city in the country. This month is
15 American Heart Month, and I want to
16 recognize the American Heart Association,
17 who has collaborated with many local
18 Philadelphia organizations to provide
19 free healthy meals and produce, health
20 education resources, blood pressure
21 screenings, bystander CPR education, and
22 quality healthcare, which has improved
23 many lives in our city.

24 As someone who has suffered
25 with heart disease and has a history of

2 it within our family, as -- I won't say
3 most, but a lot of African Americans have
4 this very, very frightening concern and
5 issue within our families, it's not a
6 joke. It's not to be played with. It
7 needs routine care. It needs medication
8 in some cases.

9 And so we thank the American
10 Heart Association for all that they do,
11 particularly in the African American
12 community, which has higher rates of
13 death and heart disease than in most
14 other places. So we need to pay
15 attention to that as well.

16 And, finally, I wanted to
17 mention the resolution we did earlier
18 today on period poverty, which refers to
19 the inadequate access to menstrual
20 products, hygiene products, clean water,
21 and waste management systems. Period
22 poverty affects women around the globe,
23 forcing them to resort to socks, stuffed
24 animals, and other makeshift menstrual
25 products.

2 Philadelphians Lynette Medley

3 and Nya McGlone faced period poverty
4 themselves, and this year they have
5 established The SPOT Period, which is
6 believed to be the first menstrual hub in
7 the nation. The SPOT Period provides
8 free menstrual and hygiene products,
9 educational resources and seminars,
10 access to clean water and toiletries, a
11 computer room, first period kits, and a
12 Breonna Taylor Safe Room to serve as a
13 sanctuary for marginalized women.

14 The SPOT Period, located in
15 Germantown, will be open from 10:00 a.m.
16 to 6:00 p.m. Monday through Friday and
17 12:00 to 8:00 Wednesday and by
18 appointment on Saturday throughout the
19 pandemic.

20 And as a woman, period poverty
21 is something that I think make men
22 uncomfortable, but as a woman I can tell
23 you that every woman has been there,
24 every woman. And even if you take away
25 the poverty section of the words "period

2 poverty," if you could imagine being
3 somewhere, anywhere, at work, at a
4 function, at an event and having a cycle
5 begin without having the proper products,
6 for a woman it is terrifying, and it
7 happens routinely. This is not something
8 that is uncommon.

9 And so I really thank them for
10 bringing attention to it, that we're
11 finally able to have these conversations
12 about it, and that we continue to have
13 conversations to make people aware that
14 this is yet another thing that as women
15 we have to deal with that really for the
16 most part, I don't think that most
17 people, or most men probably, have any
18 inkling whatsoever that this is an issue.
19 It's a huge issue. And so for women, I
20 think that having The SPOT Period is just
21 going to be a great thing for our city
22 and hopefully as a model throughout our
23 country.

24 So I want to thank you, Cody
25 Anderson. I want to thank Dr. Thomas. I

3 Association of Philadelphia. I want to
4 thank Lynette and Nya for your service to
5 your community and making a difference in
6 the lives of Philadelphians every day.

7 And, Cody, again, we're going

10 again.

11 Thank you. Thank you,
12 Mr. President.

15 about issues of social justice, we have
16 literally, particularly as African
17 American people, have built this country
18 from 1619 to this current present day and
19 time.

20 So I want to thank the National
21 Coalition of Blacks for Reparations,
22 N'COBRA, for supporting this effort. And
23 also our President of the United States,
24 President Biden, also supports the
25 creation of this Commission.

2 When we look at the health
3 disparities that we are facing today, the
4 housing disparities that we are facing
5 today, the economic development
6 disparities that we are facing today, the
7 educational disparities that we are
8 facing today, it all goes back to how
9 this country was set up and this country
10 was built. When you talk about not only
11 slavery but Jim Crow, to the current
12 issues that we're fighting every day
13 around criminal justice reform and why my
14 colleague Councilman Derek Green wants to
15 look at how institutional racism impacts
16 our society and how we look at the issues
17 around gun violence, it all comes down to
18 us addressing the issues of how do we
19 right the wrongs of how this country has
20 been built and particularly have been
21 having a significant impact on how we
22 have moved forward in this country as
23 African American people.

24 So I just want to thank all my
25 colleagues for their co-sponsorship of

2 the resolution. I just want to take a
3 moment and personally say thank you.

4 Another resolution I introduced
5 is around the National Football League,
6 and that's way out of our purview. I'm
7 not really actually an all-around sports
8 guy, other than supporting our
9 Philadelphia Eagles and the sports teams
10 in my district, but, again, we talk about
11 institutional racism and every day we
12 begin to commercialize what it is to be
13 black. And I saw how the NFL committed
14 \$250 million to address the issues of
15 institutional systematic racism, but yet
16 you have a policy in place called racial
17 norming for individuals who are impacted
18 through concussions in playing sports,
19 which to me just goes towards you're
20 putting your dollars up saying that
21 you're standing up and speaking out
22 regarding an issue, but yet you have
23 policies in place that are
24 discriminatory.

25 So I thank my colleagues for

2 passing that resolution, but I wanted to
3 go on the record on those two particular
4 resolutions as it relates to how we
5 address systematic and institutional
6 racism, because in some instance, I think
7 it becomes a cliché in this day and age
8 right now. Everybody all of the sudden
9 now is fighting for social justice.

10 Everybody has a specific concern around
11 African Americans, which I believe is
12 great in terms of our day and time, but
13 also want to make sure that there's some
14 substance around the very issues that we
15 are fighting for, because these issues
16 are impacting our very country but, most
17 importantly, African Americans and people
18 of the like in our city.

19 So I just want to state that
20 for the record, and thank you very much,
21 Council President.
