3 JOHNSON: Good morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

6 JOHNSON: Good morning, everyone.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

9 JOHNSON: I note that the hour has
10 come and that a quorum of this
11 Council is present. This Council
12 session will now come to order.

13 Will all members take
14 your seats, all visitors please
15 retire outside the rails and please
16 take all sidebar conversations out
17 of the Council chambers. I also
18 would like to ask all those who are
19 present to please place your cell
20 phones to silent or vibrate. Thank
21 you.

22 To give our invocation
23 this morning, the Chair recognizes
24 Reverend Dr. Marsha Brown Woodard.

2 She is the President of the Baptist
3 Pastors and Ministers Conference of
4 Philadelphia and Vicinity and
5 Assistant Pastor of the
6 St. Memorial Baptist Church in Bryn

9 Isaiah Thomas.

10 I will ask all members
11 and guests to please rise.

12 (Councilmembers, guests

14 REV. DR. BROWN WOODARD:
15 Council President Johnson,
16 Councilmember Thomas, to all the
17 other Councilmembers, let us pray.

22 this morning.

23 On behalf of all members
24 of Council, I welcome you to our

7 At this time, the Chair
8 recognizes Majority Leader Gilmore

10 resolution honoring the African
11 American Children's Book Project on
12 the occasion of its 33rd Annual
13 African American Children's Book
14 Fair.

15 Will Vanesse Lloyd-
16 Sgambati and those accompanying her
17 please join the Councilmember at
18 the podium. Joining Councilmember
19 Majority Gilmore Richardson will be
20 Councilmember Dr. Nina Ahmad,
21 Councilmember Quetcy Lozada,
22 Councilmember Mark Squilla,
23 Councilmember Jamie Gauthier,
24 Councilmember Nicolas O'Rourke and

3 (Councilmembers and
4 guests approached podium.)

5 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

6 RICHARDSON: Thank you. Thank you
7 so much, Council President, and
8 thank you to each of my colleagues
9 who have joined us this morning.

10 It is certainly my
11 humble honor and privilege to again
12 present the resolution on behalf of
13 the 33rd Annual African American
14 Children's Book Fair here in the
15 city of Philadelphia, which will be
16 held this Saturday, February 1st
17 from 1:00 to 4:00 pm. at the
18 Pennsylvania Convention Center.

19 And for those of you who
20 have been in chambers for some
21 time, you remember that my mentor
22 and former boss Councilmember
23 Blondell Reynolds Brown faithfully
24 introduced this resolution every

2 single year and I am proud to
3 continue in that tradition.

4 And whereas, books can
5 change lives, and the African
6 American Children's Book Fair
7 provides a unique opportunity to
8 celebrate diverse stories that
9 enlighten, enrich and empower young
10 readers. This family-friendly
11 event is packed with activities
12 designed to spark a lifelong love
13 of reading. The African American
14 Children's Book Project is
15 dedicated to developing and
16 encouraging young people to expand
17 their horizons through literature.

18 And whereas, the African
19 American Children's Book Project,
20 which was founded in 1992, by
21 Vanesse Lloyd-Sgambati -- let's
22 give her a round of applause.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

1 1/30/25 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 RICHARDSON: The African American
3 Children's Book Project was created
4 to promote and preserve children's
5 literature written by and about
6 Black Americans. The African
7 American Children's Book Fair has
8 put Philadelphia on the map as a
9 literary destination for children's
10 books. Book lovers travel from
11 around the country to come and
12 experience the Philadelphia
13 literary magic. In fact, the
14 African American Children's Book
15 Fair is a significant event in the
16 literary history of the United
17 States and;

18 COUNCILWOMAN AHMAD:
19 Whereas, the work of the African
20 American Children's Book Project is
21 in response to numerous studies
22 that show that children who read
23 outside of their normal school
24 coursework tend to excel in other

2 aspects of their lives. The
3 African American Children's Book
4 Project emphasizes in their
5 programs for children preschool to
6 young adult the importance of
7 providing access and choice of what
8 they read. The African American
9 Children's Book Project promotes
10 outside reading by expounding the
11 selection of books that students
12 gain access to. Adults who
13 attended as children now bring
14 their children. They credit
15 exposure to a book received at the
16 book fair for helping them learn
17 Black American history; and
18 Whereas, the African
19 American Children's Book Fair is
20 one of the oldest and largest
21 single-day events for African
22 American children's books in the
23 country, with an average yearly
24 attendance of more than 3,500. It

2 is a true book fair that brings
3 national award-winning authors and
4 illustrators for children PreK to
5 young adult to Philadelphia. These
6 presenters are American Library
7 Association and New York Times
8 best-selling authors and
9 illustrators. They are the stars
10 of the book industry who have
11 produced some of the best books for
12 our generation and;

13 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA:

14 And whereas, rich or poor no one
15 leaves empty-handed as books
16 themselves are placed at the level
17 where they are more affordable.
18 The legendary literacy role gives
19 away free-of-charge posters,
20 bookmarkers, postcards and resource
21 information on literary trends.
22 Their educators book giveaway
23 program allows teachers and
24 librarians to receive free books of

2 our guest presenters to use in the
3 classroom or libraries; and
4 Whereas, Vanesse Lloyd-
5 Sgambati, the founder of the
6 Literary Media and Publishing
7 Consultants, a publishing relations
8 marketing firm that specializes in
9 publishing with a focus on Black
10 books, she knows the art of the
11 pitch. For over 30 years, the firm
12 has served as a literary consultant
13 to authors, illustrators,
14 consumers, librarians, book
15 sellers, educators, publishers and
16 corporate entities interested in
17 literacy. The literary is known in
18 the industry as the go-to firm to
19 produce award-winning publicity and
20 marketing campaigns for Black
21 books. She is one of only 10 Black
22 literary publicity professionals
23 that works with all of the major
24 publishers. The organization's

2 virtual events have attracted a
3 global audience. In addition to
4 her career, Vanesse Lloyd-Sgambati
5 is also a native to Philadelphia.
6 Her education also includes a
7 degree from Temple University
8 Honors program where she is a
9 graduate cum laude and;

10 COUNCILMAN DRISCOLL:

11 Whereas, the premier of eight new
12 books will take place at the event,
13 this exciting feature is joined by
14 a host of opportunities to meet and
15 speak with renowned authors and
16 illustrators, the likes of whom
17 appear on national bestsellers and
18 literary honorees. In total, 35
19 nationally known literary creators
20 will be present at this event and;

21 Whereas, to kick off
22 Black History Month the African
23 American Children's Book Project
24 honors people in the community who

2 open the pages of books and keep
3 the literary flames ablaze not only
4 in Philadelphia but also across the
5 country and;

6 COUNCILMAN O'ROURKE:

7 Whereas, the AACBP's year-round
8 initiatives emphasize the
9 transformative power of books and
10 literacy through book fairs and
11 book signings, workshops to
12 encourage engagement with
13 literature, I Read To See Me,
14 author-illustrator virtual and
15 inschool visits, guidance for
16 families on building home
17 libraries, advocacy campaigns to
18 promote Black American children's
19 literature globally, resources and
20 trends to support youth literature
21 for parents, educators and
22 librarians. Black history is seen
23 through the lens of Black
24 children's picture books and;

2 Whereas, Steven Briggs

3 is a community development

4 professional with over 30 years of

5 diversified experience in the

6 financial services industry. He

7 was born and raised in

8 Philadelphia. Mr. Briggs is a

9 Vice-president within the

10 Philanthropy and Community Impact

11 group at Wells Fargo. In this

12 capacity, he manages the strategic

13 allocation of Wells Fargo's

14 philanthropic resources in

15 Pennsylvania and Delaware. He is

16 an active member of Philadelphia-

17 and Delaware-based nonprofit boards

18 and advisory committees that

19 includes the regional foundation

20 Reach Riverside Development

21 Corporation and Philadelphia LISC

22 and;

23 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER:

24 Whereas, Jamar Nicholas is an

2 award-winning artist and educator,
3 born and raised in Philadelphia and
4 from an early age strived to become
5 a cartoonist. He has taught and
6 lectured on the topic of comics
7 creation at numerous institutions,
8 dedicating his career to empowering
9 young people to create their own
10 cartoons and comics. His books are
11 published by Scholastic Books, an
12 international publisher of
13 children's books. Mr. Nicholas was
14 also honored with the Dwayne
15 McDuffie Award for diversity and
16 GLYPH Comics Award for best writer
17 of 2018 and;

18 Whereas, Jamar Nicholas
19 was also a writer and columnist for
20 DRAW! Magazine, the how-to source
21 for comic book and animation
22 professionals, and was a host of
23 the COMIC BOOK DINER Podcast
24 focusing on the business of comics.

2 He currently is the producer and
3 co-host of PENCIL TO PENCIL, a
4 podcast on the business of
5 creativity. A mainstay of the
6 cartooning world, Jamar also holds
7 a Board seat in the National
8 Cartoonist Society as well as
9 serving as Chapter Chair for
10 Philadelphia and;

11 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA:
12 Whereas, Jamilah Thompkins-Bigelow,
13 M.S.Ed, is a Philadelphia-based
14 educator and children's book
15 author. A curriculum writer and
16 former English teacher, she has
17 educated children and teens in
18 traditional and alternative
19 learning settings for 15 years.
20 Her picture books and short stories
21 which feature young Black and
22 Muslim characters have been
23 recognized as the best in
24 children's literature by TIME

2 magazine, Read Across America, and
3 NPR and;

4 Whereas, she is
5 published by four of the largest
6 publishers in the world, Harry N.
7 Abrams; Random House; HarperCollins
8 and Simon and Schuster's Salaam
9 Reeds. Founded in 2016, Salaam
10 Reeds is an imprint that celebrates
11 joy, vibrancy and a variety in
12 stories of Muslims lives. These
13 books are widely popular across the
14 United States and;

15 COUNCILMAN YOUNG:

16 Whereas, the free 2025 African
17 American Children's Book Fair will
18 take place on Saturday, February 1,
19 2025 live in person at the
20 Pennsylvania Convention Center from
21 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. and;

22 Whereas, Council has no
23 doubt that this year's iteration of
24 the book fair will exceed all

2 expectations inspired by its
3 history of excellence. We
4 encourage all of our City's
5 residents, young and old alike, to
6 discover for the first time or once
7 again the wonders to be found in
8 the pages of a good book; now,
9 therefore, be it

10 COUNCILWOMAN GILMORE

11 RICHARDSON: Resolved, by the
12 Council of the City of
13 Philadelphia, that we hereby honor
14 the African American Children's
15 Book Project on the occasion of its
16 33rd Annual African American
17 Children's Book Fair.

18 Further resolved, that
19 Engrossed copies of this resolution
20 be presented to the African
21 American Children's Book Project
22 further evidencing the sincere
23 respect of this legislative body.
24 Thank you very, very much.

3 JOHNSON: The Chair recognizes
4 Vanesse Lloyd-Sgambati for remarks.

5 MS. LLOYD-SGAMBATI:

6 Thank you, Council President
7 Kenyatta Johnson and Katherine
8 Gilmore Richardson who continues
9 the tradition started by former
10 Councilmember Blondell Reynolds
11 Brown to kickoff Black History
12 Month by honoring those who make
13 contributions to the literary fiber
14 of this city.

15 And also, I wanted to
16 acknowledge, lest I forget because
17 I don't want the Sandman to come
18 after me from the Apollo, I wanted
19 to acknowledge how grateful we are
20 at the African American Children's
21 Book Fair of Councilman Johnson,
22 Katherine Gilmore Richardson,
23 Councilmembers Anthony Phillips,
24 Curtis Jones, Councilwomen Cindy

2 Bass, Jamie Gauthier, Kendra Brooks
3 and Jeffrey Young whose financial
4 support has enabled the African
5 American Children's Book Fair to
6 offer our children something that
7 is taken for granted in schools
8 throughout this country, the
9 opportunity to meet the stars of
10 the children's book world, the
11 opportunity to meet someone who
12 looks like themselves and the
13 opportunity to have access to books
14 that are encouraging, empowering
15 and enlightening, and of course the
16 opportunity to dispel the myth that
17 Black people do not read and do not
18 buy books.

19 I can spend hours
20 talking about attempts to silence
21 these voices, but I've chosen to
22 spotlight in these brief moments on
23 the wonderful things happening in
24 the world of publishing. At the

2 book fair this year, the American
3 Library Association announced on
4 Monday its 2025 best book winners.

5 This is all the books
6 that were published for children in
7 2024. Five of those people will be
8 in Philadelphia. Four of the 2025
9 NAACP Image Award nominees will be
10 in Philadelphia, and of course
11 people be trying to get on the New
12 York Times list and our children
13 get to meet those folks. In fact,
14 the woman who's No. 6 on the New
15 York Times Best Children's Book
16 will be in Philadelphia.

17 All of these honors and
18 lists is an indication that Black
19 stories are being read by the
20 overall book community. There are
21 more books than ever before being
22 produced about Black people. Last
23 year here in Council I introduced
24 you to the Ice Cream Man, who was

2 the richest Black man in
3 Philadelphia in the 1800s.

4 And lest we forget, Mae
5 Reeves who owned a hat shop on
6 South Street. She was the first
7 Black woman to own a hat shop on
8 South Street and she used to go to
9 Paris in New York to buy the things
10 that she needed for her hats in the
11 '40s. So this year we're not going
12 to disappoint the audience.

13 James Earl Jones,
14 there's a book called, Ode to
15 Grapefruit. It's about how he was
16 a stutterer. There's also Monique
17 Duncan who talks about how the
18 women in slavery used to braid
19 stories in their head to remind
20 people that there was a way out of
21 that and it taught them how to
22 follow a path to freedom.

23 And the participants who
24 are coming this year come from all

2 corners of the earth because
3 Philadelphia is on the map as a
4 destination for literacy. In fact,
5 Wikipedia listed in their listing
6 of children's books from 1700 to
7 present, the African Americans
8 founding in 1992.

9 And of course some
10 homegrown talent, you might know
11 this name, you might know somebody
12 that knows this person, Dawn
13 Chavous, whose second book has
14 received high acclaim; Stacey
15 Woodson and the two people who are
16 in back of me, Jamar Nicholas and
17 Jamilah Thompkins-Bigelow.

18 I went to the -- this
19 book fair started in 1992 and I
20 went to the Regency Room in John
21 Wanamaker. And I said, girl, they
22 gone but you're going to still be
23 here. So I want to remind people
24 how important the work that we are

2 doing, it is not just about a book.

3 It's about showing kids, young boys

4 when they read a book that they can

5 be the hero in the story, young

6 girls when they read a book, that

7 their stories are powerful. A

8 little girl who wants to study

9 ballet and she doesn't look like a

10 ballerina, there's a book for her.

11 And so, I'm going to

12 close my remarks by letting -- I

13 know we're not supposed to do this

14 but you know I like breaking rules.

15 Each person who's being honored is

16 going to say one sentence why it's

17 important to read Black books.

18 Come on y'all, step up, hurry up.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

20 JOHNSON: Briefly.

21 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:

22 Okay. Black books are very

23 critical to our young people to

24 open up a lot of doors that we may

2 have thought were walls at one
3 point.

4 MS. LLOYD-SGAMBATI:

5 Okay. One sentence.

6 MS. THOMPCKINS-BIGELOW:

7 Good morning --

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

9 JOHNSON: Excuse me, excuse --

10 MS. THOMPCKINS-BIGELOW:

11 -- Black books --

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

13 JOHNSON: Excuse me, excuse me,
14 just real quick. So we know what
15 author is coming up to the
16 microphone. Yeah, go ahead.

17 MS. THOMPCKINS-BIGELOW:

18 All right. I'm Jamilah Thompkins-
19 Bigelow. I want to say Black books
20 matter because no matter what
21 anyone tells you, our stories are
22 foundational to the fabric of this
23 nation.

24 MR. BRIGGS: Good

2 morning, Steven Briggs. And Black
3 books are important because
4 representation is important.

5 MS. LLOYD-SGAMBATI:
6 Preserve a legacy and buy a Black
7 book.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

10 JOHNSON: Thank you, Vanesse, for
11 being consistent on addressing the
12 issue of literacy and academic
13 excellence. Let's give her another
14 round of applause everyone.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

6 JOHNSON: Thank you. Before
7 considering these bills and
8 resolutions, we will consider
9 public comment as follows: Your
10 public comment must concern matters
11 on the Second Reading and Final
12 Passage Calendars for possible
13 action at today's Council session.

14 All speakers must sign
15 up in order to testify. If you
16 have not already signed up for
17 today's session, please do so now
18 by giving your name to Ms. Colia
19 Adams to my left outside the rails
20 of the chambers. Once you have
21 signed up, you will be called in
22 the order in which your name
23 appears on the sign-up sheet.

24 Under ideal

2 circumstances, public comments each
3 will have three minutes to speak.
4 However, this time limit may vary
5 from session-to-session. Today the
6 time limit will be three minutes.
7 In order to be fair to all those
8 wishing to speak, I intend to hold

10 limit.

11 When you begin speaking,

15 MS. PEREZ: I'm Kate
16 Perez. And Israeli forces shot and
17 killed a 2-year-old, Laila
18 Al-Khatib, after a sniper shot her
19 in the head during a family dinner
20 in the West Bank this week.
21 Families trapped by military
22 checkpoints and unlawful borders
23 for years were finally able to
24 return to the north of Gaza.

2 Finding rubble and

3 weapons made in the U.S., it's

4 possible that many of them have

5 come from this state. Roads where

6 people had to walk barefoot for

7 hours were torn up by Israeli

10 the primary supplier of the top

11 three most used munitions by the

12 Israeli army, it's likely that

13 these were sold in our city.

14 I condemn Trump for

15 inviting the internationally wanted

16 war criminal Netanyahu back to the

17 U.S. for a meeting on Tuesday or

18 our shameful Congress will stand on

19 their feet to give him another

20 standing ovation for his genocide.

21 In a country ripe with the housing

22 crisis and desperate for debt

23 relief, Trump's first acts as

24 President have been to pardon the

2 people who tried to storm the
3 Capitol, lift sanctions on violent
4 settlers in the West Bank and
5 realow 2,000-pound bombs to be
6 sent to Israel.

7 The Mark 84 can form a
8 crater 50 feet wide and 36 feet
9 deep with a lethal fragmentation to
10 a radius of 400 feet. General
11 Dynamics, just like Day & Zimmerman
12 in our city, continues to sell
13 weapons to an apartheid occupation
14 that indiscriminately drops bombs
15 on refugee camps and hospitals.

16 Dr. Hussam Abu Safiya is
17 still being held hostage in the Sde
18 Teiman torture camp by an occupying
19 state we continue to partner with
20 no matter how many kindergartens
21 they bomb, humans they starve or
22 hostages they torture. We should
23 have cut ties with the apartheid
24 state years ago. Just like the

2 United States has broken every
3 treaty with Native Americans, the
4 Occupation violates every ceasefire
5 agreement they make, dropping white
6 phosphorus on Lebanon and sniping a

10 body.

11 Trump, his son-in-law,
12 Israeli politicians and Keller
13 Williams see a humanitarian
14 disaster and call Gaza a potential
15 beachfront property. He passes
16 laws to allow for the detainment of
17 immigrants at detention centers
18 that have histories of human
19 trafficking, sexual abuse and
20 forced hysterectomies.

21 ICE is raiding our homes
22 and our businesses without
23 warrants, holding Americans hostage
24 for hours while using language to

2 dehumanize immigrants, calling them
3 illegal, calling them aliens while
4 announcing a 30,000 person
5 concentration camp at Guantanamo
6 Bay, then floating the idea of

10 He's also making a point
11 to deport anti-Israel students,
12 which is weird that he didn't put
13 America first. We need an arms
14 embargo. We have to fight against
15 Nazis. Fuck ICE. Free Palestine.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT
23 JOHNSON: Dr. Simmons, just before
24 you start, I just want to ask for

3 comment and those who are

6 decorum regarding language. We
7 welcome all comments as it relates

12 Dr. Simmons, please
13 begin.

14 REV. DR. SIMMONS: Good
15 morning, everyone. Thanks for this
16 opportunity. I'm Reverend
17 Dr. Michelle Simmons, the founder
18 of Why Not Prosper. For the last
19 23 years I've been working
20 tirelessly to support formerly
21 incarcerated women in our
22 community.

23 Today I stand before you
24 with a message of progress, urgency

1 1/30/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 and partnership. Three years ago
3 in 2022 Why Not Prosper alongside
4 of the SWAG team conducted a
5 participatory action study called
6 Breaking All Racial Barriers. This
7 was a yearlong effort where we
8 interviewed justice partners,
9 community orgs, incarcerated and
10 formerly incarcerated individuals.
11 We also engaged in court watch and
12 professional interviews and held
13 focus groups along with surveys to
14 understand the issues contributing
15 to the racial disparities in our
16 prison system.

17 Through our research, we
18 discovered that one of the key
19 factors contributed to the
20 overincarceration of Black and
21 Brown people who make up currently
22 78 percent of the jail population
23 were policies related to detainers,
24 violations and the Philadelphia

2 risk assessment tool.

3 Once we identified these
4 critical variables, we took action
5 by launching Straight Out of
6 Trouble program. This initiative
7 was the design to combat the racial
8 disparities in our local prison
9 system by addressing three main
10 areas, supporting people with
11 detainers, helping individuals
12 re-engage with probation officers
13 and advocating for early
14 termination of probation.

15 Since its inception,
16 Straight Out of Trouble has made
17 significant strides. We supported
18 131 people apply for early
19 termination and we also helped 89
20 people re-engage with their parole
21 officers. We've helped hundreds of
22 people get warrants lifted and get
23 back on track, finding employment
24 and supporting their families and

2 making better decisions for the
3 future.

4 But despite these
5 successes, we face significant
6 challenges, a data and policy
7 deficit. We have worked
8 relentlessly to understand the
9 policy-governed detainers. We
10 continue to face resistance in our
11 efforts to obtain the necessary
12 information from our justice
13 partners.

14 In December 2024, right
15 to know request was denied, leaving
16 us with no clear understanding of
17 how to move forward. These
18 policies and data points are
19 crucial not only to the progress of
20 our community but also for the
21 future of our city. I don't want
22 to be an adversary, but my goal is
23 to build strategies to reduce jail
24 population and provide support.

1 1/30/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 All right. So I seen
3 that yellow light. I want to thank
4 our justice partners for submitting
5 data but we still have a lot of
6 work to do, and I ask for your
7 support in passing a resolution
8 that will bring the courts to the
9 table to discuss these policies and
10 procedure for lifting detainers and
11 addressing detainer issues.

12 Together we can build a system that
13 prioritize equity, accountability
14 and second chances.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

17 JOHNSON: Thank you, Dr. Simmons.

18 Can the ladies of SWAG
19 just please stand. Thank you for
20 your hard work on this issue.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

23 JOHNSON: In my former life, we
24 would call it the detainer of

2 dipsy, but that's a different
3 conversation.

4 Go ahead, sir.

5 MR. MUSGROVE: Good
6 afternoon. My name is Malcolm
7 Musgrove. I'm the Vice-president
8 of Merakey, and I'm here to talk
9 about two City initiatives, new
10 initiatives that have started in
11 the City of Philadelphia. They are
12 Mayor Parker's initiatives. One is
13 the Wellness Center and one is the
14 Wellness Village.

15 Both are to combat the
16 opiate epidemic that we are facing
17 in the city of Philadelphia. It is
18 taking a holistic approach to
19 treatment at both locations --
20 sorry about that. Taking a
21 holistic approach to treatment at
22 both locations looking at not only
23 the behavioral health, which
24 includes the mental health and

2 substance use disorder, but also
3 looking at the physical health, all
4 the social determinants of health,
5 so food insecurities, housing, job
6 readiness or vocational programs to
7 help people on their road to
8 recovery.

9 I'm preaching to the
10 choir. As you know, when you're
11 recovering if you don't have a
12 home, your chances of recovery
13 diminish. If you are food
14 insecure, your chances of recovery
15 diminish. If you are not getting
16 the proper health care that you
17 need, your chances of recovery
18 diminish and incorporating all of
19 those at both of those locations
20 will help us support and combat the
21 opiate epidemic that we have in the
22 city of Philadelphia.

23 And we would like to
24 invite you to come out to see both

2 locations, 265 East Lehigh and 7979
3 State Road. Everyone is welcome to
4 come out and see these two
5 programs. Thank you.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

8 JOHNSON: Thank you.

9 CHIEF CLERK: Vincent
10 Schiavone, Jeremy Blatstein and
11 Keir Bradford-Grey.

12 (Witnesses approached
13 podium.)

14 MR. SCHIAVONE: I'm
15 Vince Schiavone. I am the CEO of
16 Caring for Friends. We are an
17 all-volunteer nonprofit that
18 provides food and friendship to
19 Philadelphians and we've been doing
20 so for 50 years. We serve
21 homebound. We've been providing
22 food -- we serve homebound senior
23 years and disabled with our meals
24 programs.

2 Kids and families in
3 need with our community partners,
4 food cupboard programs. We serve
5 all Philadelphians. Our
6 organization was founded by one
7 woman, a mother, like many of you,
8 who had a deep faith in God and a
9 dream. She believed that no one
10 should be hungry or alone in a
11 world of caring people, and many,
12 tens of thousands of volunteers,
13 have been helping share their
14 benefits with all the people of
15 Philadelphia. Philadelphia is the
16 poorest of all our large cities.
17 The numbers across
18 Philadelphia are particularly bad.
19 22 percent of people in our city
20 are still food insecure. We're
21 doing a lot, but we're not doing
22 enough. Our seniors have it
23 particularly worse. It's up to 28
24 percent for our seniors who are

2 living alone, many of them food
3 insecure, having to choose between
4 medicine, rent and food, and
5 everybody here knows how much food
6 has gone up and how difficult it
7 is.

8 And many of them are
9 also disabled. They're not mobile.
10 They can't shop. They can't cook,
11 stand to cook. Anybody who has
12 aging parents can appreciate this
13 as we take care of them. It's
14 really hard. We provide them
15 frozen meals with our volunteers
16 all across the city. We're
17 currently providing that for about
18 10,000. There's probably 30,000
19 more we need to help and we need to
20 do more and better for the
21 generation before us.

22 We also provide food for
23 kids and families in need. All
24 right. Kids have it really bad.

1 1/30/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 30 percent are food insecure. That
3 number is higher among every
4 minority across this city. All
5 right. Kids often get their best
6 meal at school, but 80 percent of
7 them don't get any meals during the
8 summer. Even though we have many
9 centers we don't have enough. They
10 do not get meals -- when we have a
11 holiday, there's not even a program
12 for that and there's not enough
13 afterschool programs for that.

14 We work with
15 organizations, faith-based
16 community organizations, many
17 elected officials where we know
18 people call when they are hungry
19 and alone. And together we can do
20 something about that. So we
21 appreciate the time to highlight
22 this example and ask everybody to
23 see, we can chip in, provide more
24 funding, more programs and more

2 people. Thank you.

3 (Applause.)

4 CHIEF CLERK: Jeremy
5 Blatstein, Keir Bradford-Grey and
6 then Lynn Landes.

7 (Witnesses approached
8 podium.)

9 MR. BLATSTEIN: Hello,
10 City Council, Council President
11 Johnson. My name is Jeremy
12 Blatstein. I'm here in support of
13 Bill No. 250014 because we're
14 talking about 2025 people.
15 Housing, housing, housing, housing,
16 housing, housing, housing, housing,
17 housing, housing, housing, that's
18 what we're talking about. But
19 everyone wants to talk about limits
20 not how we're building more supply.

21 But we're first going to
22 talk about the Philadelphia Land
23 Bank. Everyone wants to talk about
24 the Land Bank so let's do it. How

2 do you get land from the
3 Philadelphia Land Bank for Turn the
4 Key? You go to the Land Bank
5 website, you find land that says
6 it's available. You put together
7 an application.

8 What's in the
9 application? You know, a budget, a
10 funding source, plans. You hold a
11 community meeting, maybe you hold
12 two community meetings. Then the
13 Land Bank staff qualifies your
14 application. How long does that
15 process take, three to six months.
16 Then what? Oh, yeah, the Land Bank
17 board votes on the qualified
18 applications.

19 Then what? It gets
20 transmitted to Philadelphia City
21 Council. Then what? Technically
22 any member of Philadelphia City
23 Council can introduce the
24 resolution to move this land to

1 1/30/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 build the houses, but because of
3 everyone's favorite thing,
4 councilmanic prerogative, only the
5 District member does it.

6 How much money have you
7 spent at that point? \$20,000. So
8 we had two members of Black
9 Squirrel do this process. And then
10 what happened? Councilman Jay
11 Young decided not to introduce the
12 resolutions, so you have two
13 African American developers who
14 spent \$20,000 to build houses that
15 are not building houses anymore.
16 If we're going to solve this
17 affordable housing problem in
18 Philadelphia, we need to get
19 serious about streamlining this
20 process.

21 I hear everyone saying
22 we're going to cap this, do this,
23 this. But because of councilmanic
24 prerogative, each and every one of

2 you want to rule district-by-
3 district. That's not going to
4 work. Straight up, right. Like,
5 we can't have 10 sets of rules. So
6 the ADU rule that Councilwoman
7 Gauthier introduced today,
8 phenomenal. But we need that on
9 steroids, right. We need to do
10 that on every lot in Philadelphia.
11 It should be legal to build two
12 units on every single lot in
13 Philadelphia.

14 And finally, let's do
15 it. Raise your hand if you rode
16 SEPTA in the last week. Oh, thank
17 you. Our Councilpeople, maybe next
18 week. And oh, yeah, I guess I have
19 to do it. E-l-g-s-e-s, Eagles. Go
20 Birds. Thank you. We're going to
21 the Super Bowl. And, Councilman
22 Johnson, we riding SEPTA soon? All
23 right. I'll reach back out. You
24 said you'd follow up. All right.

2 Thank you.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

4 JOHNSON: Thank you, Jeremy.

5 MS. BRADFORD-GREY: Good
6 morning, Council. My name is --

9 Bradford. How are you?

10 MS. BRADFORD-GREY:
11 Good.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

13 JOHNSON: Great. Pleasure to meet
14 you. Welcome to City Council.

15 MS. BRADFORD-GREY:
16 Thank you. It feels so good to be
17 on this side instead of being in
18 the hot seat, so this is really
19 good. But I am here in support of
20 Bill 250027. And I don't even
21 think I need three minutes because
22 Reverend Michelle did a phenomenal
23 job really articulating the reasons
24 why this bill is so important.

2 I would just lend my
3 voice to say this, the best
4 outcomes that we got in our justice
5 system is when the community was
6 informed and they were able to work
7 with their people to get them to
8 understand the process of the
9 system. We had phenomenal outcomes
10 that actually increased public
11 safety.

12 So I would just
13 encourage us to continue down that
14 path. The community not only is
15 informed but empowered. The things
16 that we've been doing together with
17 Reverend Michelle have been going
18 on since 2015 and she is taking
19 this by storm, and people have
20 gotten fairer and better outcomes
21 from this system.

22 So I want to thank you
23 so much for giving me the
24 opportunity just to speak on this

2 resolution today. I think our city
3 and our communities are much better
4 when we work together in
5 participation. Thank you.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

8 JOHNSON: Thank you.

9 CHIEF CLERK: We have
10 Lynn Landes. Then Wanda Walker and
11 Ogbonna Hagins.

12 (Witnesses approached
13 podium.)

14 MS. LANDES: Good
15 morning. I'm Lynn Landes of
16 Safestreetsphilly.org and a
17 registered Republican. I oppose
18 Resolution 250021 that condemns
19 President Trump and his choices for
20 positions within his
21 administration.

22 This is a shockingly
23 ill-conceived resolution
24 considering that we've just emerged

2 from four years of the nightmare
3 that was the Biden administration
4 where President Biden was literally
5 asleep at the switch for much of
6 that time as he descended into
7 dementia, a fact that was kept from
8 the public by his administration
9 officials.

10 And what was their track
11 record? Well, there was Dr. Fauci
12 who turned a manageable epidemic
13 that he, himself, had caused into a
14 dystopian catastrophe as he
15 prescribed a medical response that
16 proved to be a euthanasia protocol
17 for thousands.

18 He also encouraged the
19 closing down of life as we know it
20 in America, urge censorship of
21 those who didn't agree with him
22 while coercing millions of
23 Americans to take an experimental
24 vaccine whose tragic consequences

2 are still being felt today by
3 untold numbers.

4 Then we have Defense
5 Secretary Austin and his withdrawal
6 from Afghanistan, which resulted in
7 the murder of American soldiers and
8 citizens as well as the loss of a
9 military base and \$80 billion worth
10 of equipment that is now under the
11 control of the Taliban.

12 Worst of all, there was
13 a direct attack on our nation's
14 sovereignty as Secretary of
15 Homeland Security Mayorkas aided
16 and abetted the invasion of
17 millions of illegal immigrants from
18 around the world to cross both our
19 northern and southern borders.

20 And throughout this
21 time, Biden administration
22 officials practiced the art of
23 identity politics which further
24 divided our nation as they preached

2 the gospel of diversity equity and
3 inclusion, which became in reality
4 preferential treatment for some,
5 exclusion for others and
6 entitlement for those of the right
7 race, sexual identity and
8 disability. Isn't it time to turn
9 the page and give President Trump
10 and his new team a chance. Let's
11 support law and order, meritocracy
12 and common sense for a change.
13 Thank you.

14 MS. WALKER: All right,
15 y'all. Good morning. My name is
16 Wanda Walker. Good morning,
17 beautiful people.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

19 JOHNSON: Good morning.

20 MS. WALKER: Please be
21 respectful to everybody that speaks
22 even if they're Republican like
23 myself because we have things to
24 say and that's the only way we're

2 going to come to a conclusion and a
3 consensus. So I'm going to talk
4 about the Land Bank bill and
5 piggyback off of what Jeremy said,
6 and he's talking about councilmanic
7 prerogative.

8 I don't necessarily
9 disagree with him, but I don't
10 think taking away councilmanic
11 prerogative altogether would be a
12 good idea. There's not a week that
13 goes by that I don't get a phone
14 call about a senior or someone
15 losing their home but mostly
16 seniors, so I come here every week
17 and I talk about generational
18 wealth.

19 There is no house that's
20 more affordable than the house your
21 grandmom or granddad was going to
22 pass on to you. So, yes, we need
23 affordable housing, and the best
24 way to get that is to stop

2 displacing people out of their
3 homes.

4 So I believe that
5 seniors after 30 years of paying
6 taxes and a mortgage should not
7 have to pay property taxes. You
8 should not have to be low-income or
9 poor to benefit from any type of
10 tax program. Simply said, if we
11 don't charge them property taxes,
12 they're not losing the generational
13 wealth that our community
14 desperately needs to be passed on
15 so that we have seed money to work
16 and leverage to get to the next
17 level.

18 So please consider doing
19 something in reference to all the
20 properties that are going to the
21 Land Bank and finding a way to put
22 in a program so those families
23 might be able to qualify and get
24 their homes back. That's pretty

2 much it. I'll see you next week.

6 MR. HAGINS: Good

7 morning. Ogbonna Hagins, fourth

8 generation chattel slavery

9 survivor. Good morning, Council.

10 I rise today not to condemn

11 President Donald J. Trump but to

12 condemn this resolution for his

13 failure to recognize a historic

14 moment for the American Freedmen.

15 This Council seeks to

16 rebuke the President while ignoring

17 the fact that he has done what no

18 other President has done. He's

19 dared to acknowledge that the 14th

20 Amendment is exclusively the

21 progeny of the emancipated for

22 generations.

23 This misinterpretation

24 has cost the American Freedmen

1 1/30/25 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 community trillions of dollars.
3 This is not a moment for
4 condemnation. This is a moment of
5 celebration. Imagine if the newly
6 freed slaves had rejected the 13th
7 Amendment that was signed by
8 President Abraham Lincoln just
9 because they thought that he was
10 racist. How foolish would that
11 have been. The only thing that
12 mattered was that the result was
13 the end of chattel slavery.

14 To my fellow
15 Councilmembers, I ask how many of
16 you are American Freedmen. How
17 many of you are American Freedmen,
18 right? Number two, why aren't you
19 standing up for this historic
20 announcement? Is it because Donald
21 Trump is a Republican? Abraham
22 Lincoln was a Republican too.

23 Why is Council
24 condemning the first sitting

2 President to affirm the rightful
3 inheritance of Black Americans,
4 American Freedmen under the 14th
5 Amendment? This resolution does
6 not serve the people. It serves
7 political distractions.

8 The real work is
9 establishing the office of Freedmen
10 affairs right here in Philadelphia,
11 ensuring that this acknowledgement
12 leads to tangible policies that
13 repair the economic and structural
14 damage inflicted on our people. We
15 must focus on what matters, the
16 Reconstruction amendments, the
17 Civil Rights Act of 1866 and
18 securing economic and political
19 power for the American Freedmen,
20 not DEI, not empty resolutions, not
21 partisan distractions.

22 We must focus on what
23 matters. I restra -- I reject --
24 let me say that again. I reject

3 Council to do the same. It's time
4 to stand for the American Freedmen
5 and seize this moment for what it
6 truly is, an emancipation moment, a

16 Minority Leader Kendra Brooks:
17 Thank you, Council President. I
18 want to recognize and thank the
19 Reverend Dr. Michelle Simmons,
20 founder and CEO of Why Not Prosper,
21 an organization devoted to
22 sheltering and supporting formerly
23 incarcerated women as they
24 transition to life outside the

3 She also serves as the
4 Community Advisory Committee
5 Co-chair for the MacArthur
6 Foundation Safety and Justice
7 Challenge, working to reduce
8 Philadelphia's high rate of
9 incarceration and its devastating
10 impact on Black and Brown
11 communities.

12 With the resolution that
13 passed today, authorizing a hearing
14 on the First Judicial Court's use
15 of detainers, we do hope to shed
16 light on practice that prevents
17 people from rejoining their
18 families and rebuilding their
19 lives. Also want to acknowledge
20 the uncertainty and fear that many
21 people in our city have been
22 feeling this week.

23 With every headline
24 about raids or funding cuts, the

2 level of anxiety goes up and
3 Philadelphians are looking to us,
4 their elected leaders, for answers.
5 All week constituents have been
6 reaching out to all of our offices
7 with questions, what will ICE raids
8 mean for my mixed-status family,
9 how will federal funding cuts
10 impact my rent or my child's school
11 or my medication? People are
12 scared and they're looking for
13 leadership.

14 She wishes to thank all
15 of her colleagues who did join her
16 in a statement yesterday committing
17 to protect our immigrant
18 communities. The statement cannot
19 be it though. That can't be the
20 end. We need leadership at every
21 level in order to take on the
22 threats aimed at our city right
23 now.

24 As we learned at last

2 week's hearing called by Member
3 Landau, our city's level of
4 preparedness for these challenges
5 is still an open question to too
6 many in Philadelphia and we share
7 that. And in the coming weeks, we
8 do plan to work with many of you to
9 strengthen protections for our
10 workers, for our immigrants and
11 LGBTQIA+ communities and the
12 countless Philadelphians who
13 benefit from federally-funded
14 programs.

15 We cannot stay silent
16 while our communities are attacked
17 and Philadelphians deserve to know
18 how we plan to meet this moment.
19 And with that, she concluded her
20 statements with a thank you.

21 I want to just share two
22 things for my part. I often
23 hear -- actually I've heard all
24 week and share Leader Brooks'

2 concern about the reports, the
3 calls, the reach-outs as it relates
4 to the various raids and other
5 things that have been coming down
6 from this administration.

7 One thing as an
8 organizer I used to share with
9 folks all the time was that the
10 last thing that we do in a
11 functioning democracy is vote.
12 There is democracy that takes place
13 before voting and there's democracy
14 that takes place after we vote.

15 And I just want to lift
16 up two things in the spirit of
17 economic democracy, two forms of
18 economic democracy that I think are
19 worth celebrating or acknowledging
20 today. The first one is with the
21 resolution that we did lift up
22 today, the resolution that calls or
23 declares alongside the United
24 Nations here in the City of

2 Philadelphia the year 2025 is the
3 Year of Cooperatives, cooperatives.

4 This resolution
5 celebrates local worker-owned
6 co-ops and it's being introduced by
7 our team as well with a co-sponsor
8 Councilwoman Cindy Bass, who I
9 believe is in Washington today, but
10 also this resolution was
11 co-sponsored by Councilmember
12 Squilla, Leader Brooks, Leader
13 Gilmore Richardson and many, many
14 more.

15 We are excited to
16 celebrate with them, for those that
17 don't know, the U.N. resolution on
18 Co-op stressed that cooperatives in
19 their various forms promote the
20 fullest possible participation in
21 the economic and social development
22 of local communities, whose
23 inclusion strengthens economic and
24 social development and contributes

2 to the eradication of poverty and
3 hunger.

4 I believe that this too
5 is democracy, not just voting but
6 engaging to help shape our
7 communities and make sure that we
8 are alleviating the pressures of
9 poverty. I'm excited to take this
10 on this year and proud to join the
11 U.N. in declaring 2025 the year of
12 cooperatives. Colleagues, this too
13 is what democracy looks like.

14 I also want to lift up a
15 great and really historic win
16 recently. Whole Foods union, this
17 is the first Whole Foods union
18 making this union election truly
19 historic. I think the final
20 tallied vote was 130 to 100. These
21 are folks who have been fighting
22 for a union under union-busting
23 conditions. Amazon has done
24 everything they possibly could to

2 keep them from unionizing and yet
3 they were successful.

4 A lot of folks don't
5 know what to make of all this new
6 era of union drives and service
7 work from local coffee shops to
8 billion-dollar corporations. And
9 frankly being frank, our local
10 labor movement does not support
11 them uniformly. But I have to just
12 say it is an immense honor to
13 represent so many people, folks
14 from all walks of life, but
15 especially so many young folk who
16 aren't afraid to experiment with
17 this system, this governance system
18 that they've been given in order to
19 build a better democracy and a
20 better way of life.

21 I think it really does
22 help us become a better city and
23 ultimately a better country when
24 our unions win. When we celebrate

7 JOHNSON: You're welcome.

8 The Chair recognizes
9 Councilmember Quetcy Lozada.

10 COUNCILWOMAN LOZADA:

11 Thank you, Council President.

12 I just want to thank
13 some of my colleagues who have
14 reached out regarding the ICE raids
15 that took place in the District. I
16 publicly want to say that if you
17 are truly willing to help, the help
18 that we need right now is to make
19 sure that this vulnerable
20 population receives the information
21 regarding the resources and how to
22 protect themselves and their
23 families.

24 And so, I ask that you

2 please share the information. My
3 staff has Know your Rights cards.
4 We have additional flyers. We have
5 a resource book that we're putting
6 out. If you really want to help,
7 that is what we need to do right
8 now.

9 So many of these
10 residents are truly afraid.
11 They're not sending their children
12 to school, they're not showing up
13 to work, and we need to make sure
14 that they have all of the resources
15 and the information that they need
16 to be able to protect themselves.

17 The Mayor has said many
18 times already that we continue to
19 be a welcoming city. We are not
20 being notified of where these
21 agents are going to be showing up
22 and when and how. We do know that
23 there are people, innocent people,
24 people who have been here for many,

2 many years, have established a life
3 here who have been contributing
4 citizens to our city and who are
5 being caught up in all of this and
6 we are outraged too, right.

7 The best way to provide
8 the support to this community right
9 now is to make sure that they are
10 connected to the resources that
11 they know where to get the answers
12 to their questions from the
13 appropriate professionals in a
14 language that they understand, and
15 that doesn't mean just in Spanish,
16 right.

17 I want to make sure that
18 folks understand that I'm not just
19 advocating for Latino immigrants.
20 Yes, this is a citywide problem and
21 there are many immigrants who don't
22 just speak Spanish in our city.
23 And so, we need to make sure that
24 all of these documents are

2 translated into languages that they
3 understand and that each one of us
4 does what we can quietly,
5 preferably to make sure that these
6 resources get into the hands of
7 those who need it the most.

8 My office, again, is
9 available to provide those
10 materials if you don't have them.
11 There are other groups who have
12 these resources. Juntos, New
13 Sanctuary, Esperanza, all of those
14 are organizations who deal with
15 this population on a day-to-day,
16 have all of these resources and
17 they have also said that they are
18 willing to help support.

19 If you don't want to
20 come to my office, please reach out
21 to those offices. But right now it
22 is absolutely urgent that we
23 connect people with resources. All
24 the other nonsense is unnecessary.

2 Thank you.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

4 JOHNSON: The Chair recognizes

5 Councilmember Jones.

6 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank

7 you, Mr. President and colleagues.

8 I had every intention of
9 talking about the updates of CPOC
10 and preparing you for the new
11 recommendations that will be before
12 Council to vet at the hard work of
13 Caroline Stack over there was put
14 in numerous (inaudible), but I have
15 to put a pause on that.

16 Now, I'm probably
17 secretly known to be one of the
18 funniest boys in City Council, like
19 I'm hilarious. I crack myself up,
20 but jokes stop being funny once
21 they get elected. And as we watch
22 the clown car unload at the White
23 House, the ominous threats that it
24 represent shows that it was

2 premeditated.

3 They authored the 2025

4 plan first on their first day.

5 They had prepared 300 executive

6 orders. They automatically turned

7 off spigots of funding. And what

8 is dangerous is they had no idea

9 what intended and unintended

10 consequences there was.

11 Because as we said,

12 Mr. President, the rain falls on

13 the just and the unjust alike. And

14 so, those cuts were hitting

15 Repub -- and I apologize to my

16 colleague here, make exception for

17 him, but there are Republican

18 states that were going to bear the

19 brunt of those decisions. So they

20 had to back up, take a step back.

21 Thank God.

22 Now, what we have to do,

23 what we must prepare for is the

24 three Cs. We must fight them in

2 chambers, just like this at the
3 state level challenging their laws,
4 challenging their budgets, making
5 amendments to our laws to
6 accommodate our vulnerable. We
7 must fight them in courts where the
8 NAACP, Esperanza or whatever
9 organizations are out there and
10 join their legal prowess and file
11 briefs to stop some of this,
12 challenge some of this, at least
13 slow it down until we get a grasp
14 on -- they released those things so
15 fast, so furious, it's like in the
16 barbershops they got flared on.

17 We didn't know how to
18 block half of the stuff that was
19 coming down the pipe, so we need to
20 make them pause sometimes so we can
21 digest and process what they are
22 trying to do to us.

23 I will also say to you
24 that as a Pennsylvania Human

2 Relations Commissioner, a while
3 back I heard something that now
4 makes all the sense about the
5 vulnerable. There was a case where
6 an illegal immigrant "was renting
7 from a homeowner." He said, I will
8 call ICE if you do not satisfy me
9 sexually. That's beneath human.
10 We cannot sit back and abide this.

11 So no matter how left
12 some of my colleagues are or how
13 right some of my colleagues are, we
14 have a greater threat because as
15 they say in the Game of Thrones,
16 Winter is not just coming, it is
17 here.

18 Thank you,
19 Mr. President.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

21 JOHNSON: Thank you, Councilmember
22 Jones. Very well said.

23 The Chair recognizes
24 Councilmember Dr. Nina Ahmad.

2 COUNCILWOMAN AHMAD:

3 Thank you, Council President.

4 I just want to speak to
5 the resolution I introduced today,
6 which is to recognize January 29th,
7 2025 as the start of the Lunar New
8 Year. I wanted to honor the
9 arrival of the new year as the Year
10 of the Snake. This time will bring
11 wisdom, intuition, caring,
12 intelligence and problem-solving,
13 which are all vital for the work we
14 conduct in Council.

15 This time will also
16 symbolize luck, prosperity and
17 happiness in our homes and
18 communities. Let us continue to
19 appreciate the rich, cultural
20 tapestry that connects us and
21 allows us to share traditions,
22 happiness and a stronger sense of
23 community. Happy Lunar New Year to
24 everyone. Thank you.

3 JOHNSON: Thank you.

4 The Chair recognizes

5 Councilmember Jamie Gauthier.

6 COUNCILWOMAN GAUTHIER:

7 Thank you, Council President.

8 I want to start by

9 thanking this body for taking bold

10 action last year in implementing

11 Phase 1 of my Defying Displacement

12 Campaign. We cracked down on

13 illegal discrimination against

14 tenants using housing vouchers.

15 We mandated that revenue

16 generated by "payments in lieu of

17 affordable housing" get reinvested

18 back into communities experiencing

19 overly dense development. Voters

20 in the May 2025 primary will have

21 the power to compel the City to

22 fully fund our Housing Trust Fund.

23 I urge everyone

24 listening here and at home to vote

2 yes in support of safe, stable and
3 affordable housing, and we enacted
4 my low-income property tax freeze
5 which stopped property taxes from
6 increasing for eligible and
7 enrolled homeowners.

8 Thanks to Councilmember
9 Landau, the Department of Revenue
10 recently extended the deadline to
11 apply for this tax freeze until
12 February 28th. Do not leave money
13 on the table. If you are a low- or
14 no-income homeowner, call your City
15 Councilmember to learn how to
16 freeze your property taxes.

17 I've been told that 2025
18 is all about housing. I'm excited
19 to get the ball rolling by
20 introducing Phase 2 of defying
21 displacement, which cuts red tape
22 for developers and homeowners who
23 want to be a part of the affordable
24 housing solution.

2 At our current pace, it
3 will take us more than 200 years to
4 build enough affordable housing to
5 meet the need. And all of us know
6 that this is time we do not have.
7 That's why this body needs to slash
8 unnecessary red tape that slows
9 down the development of affordable
10 housing and drives up our housing
11 cost.

12 First, the City should
13 routinely expedite zoning and
14 building permit applications for
15 affordable housing projects. L&I
16 does have a prioritized review
17 process, but it is only available
18 for certain affordable housing
19 projects when requested by the
20 developer and "to the extent L&I's
21 capacity permits."

22 If the City is serious
23 about building affordable housing,
24 we should quickly and predictably

1 1/30/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 review affordable housing zoning
3 and building permits every single
4 time. No ifs, ands or buts. This
5 principle should apply to variances
6 too.

7 Why does the City treat
8 applicants who want to build in a
9 few extra units so they can charge
10 affordable rents the same as those
11 proposing a luxury skyscraper?
12 Let's prove affordable housing is a
13 priority by giving developers who
14 want to do good expedited hearings
15 in front of the ZBA for no
16 additional fee and to make sure
17 developers don't abuse this fast
18 track by promising to build
19 affordable housing when they have
20 no intention of actually doing so.
21 We must empower the City to enforce
22 conditional approvals by the ZBA.

23 But large developments
24 are far from the only solution to

1 1/30/25 - STATED - SPEECHES
2 our city's housing crisis, and
3 commercial developers should not be
4 the only ones to profit off this
5 work. Luckily we have another tool
6 that grows affordable housing,
7 defies displacement and empowers
8 homeowners to build generational
9 wealth all at the same time without
10 changing the look or feel of our
11 neighborhoods.

12 Across the nation and
13 here at home, bonus units,
14 sometimes referred to as accessory
15 dwelling units, help families to
16 stay in their homes amid
17 skyrocketing cost. But in the last
18 decade, the City has only approved
19 an average of one bonus unit per
20 year.

21 This isn't because
22 homeowners don't want bonus units.
23 My office consistently hears from
24 constituents who want them but have

2 trouble navigating the time-
3 consuming and expensive
4 bureaucratic process. By cutting
5 red tape to make it easier for
6 homeowners to take advantage of
7 bonus units in Council Districts
8 that allow them, we have a rare and
9 frankly easy opportunity to keep
10 families in their homes and bring
11 new affordable homes online all in
12 one go.

13 That's why my
14 legislation will allow homeowners
15 in single family homes to add bonus
16 units by-right in their primary
17 residence, granted the change does
18 not materially change the look of
19 their home externally. This week
20 The Inquirer reported that
21 Philadelphia is the ninth least
22 affordable metro in the nation.

23 This reaffirms that even
24 though we have made significant

2 progress we cannot take our foot
3 off of the gas. I look forward to
4 working with this body, the Parker
5 administration and every
6 stakeholder to cut red tape and
7 empower developers and homeowners
8 alike to defy displacement. Thank
9 you.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

11 JOHNSON: Thank you very much.

12 The Chair recognizes
13 Jeffrey Jay Young.

14 COUNCILMAN YOUNG: Thank
15 you, Mr. President.

16 So today we passed a
17 resolution authored by
18 Councilmember Harrity recognizing
19 National Poverty Awareness Month,
20 and we all acknowledge as my
21 colleague Councilwoman Jamie
22 Gauthier just mentioned that we
23 have, you know, there's an
24 affordable housing issue that we

2 have in the city. But I think we
3 should rephrase that sometimes as
4 we have an issue with housing that
5 people can afford, right.

6 In that resolution it
7 talked about how our city continues
8 to remain the highest -- the
9 poorest biggest city among the most
10 10 popular cities in the country.

11 But let's look at why is that,
12 right. Every state around
13 Pennsylvania has a higher minimum
14 wage than we do, right.

15 New York's minimum wage
16 is \$16.50. New Jersey's is \$15.49.
17 Delaware is \$15 an hour.
18 Maryland's \$15 an hour. Ohio is
19 \$10.70 and even West Virginia has a
20 higher minimum wage than
21 Pennsylvania at \$8.75. We will
22 always be the largest poorest big
23 city as long as our residents are
24 only being paid \$7.25 an hour. So

2 if we can increase wages, maybe our
3 residents will be able to afford
4 housing in this city.

5 And on that same note, I
6 definitely want to congratulate the
7 United Food and Commercial Workers
8 Local 1776 for organizing the
9 first, the very first unionized
10 Whole Food Store, and it happens to
11 be right here in the 5th Council
12 District here in the city of
13 Philadelphia.

14 With this new right to
15 collectively bargain, hopefully
16 these workers now will be able to
17 earn a better wage, have better
18 working conditions and can truly be
19 able to afford to shop at the place
20 that they work and live in the city
21 that they love comfortably.

22 So with that, I believe
23 that we continue to fight for
24 higher wages, a higher minimum

2 wage, we will improve the condition
3 and lives of countless
4 Philadelphians throughout the city.
5 So I'll do everything in my power
6 and I'm sure most of my colleagues
7 will too to make sure that we can
8 increase this minimum wage from
9 \$7.25 in 2025.

10 So thank you,
11 Mr. President.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

13 JOHNSON: You're welcome.

14 The Chair recognizes
15 Councilmember Rue Landau.

16 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:

17 Thank you, Council President.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

19 JOHNSON: You're welcome.

20 COUNCILWOMAN LANDAU:

21 First, I want to thank my colleague
22 Councilman Jones for bringing up
23 that really awful scenario of what
24 you remember when you were at the

1 1/30/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 Pennsylvania Human Relations
3 Commission. Unfortunately, this
4 happens all too often that folks
5 who are not citizens of United
6 States where they're working or
7 where they're living are often
8 threatened by their employers, by
9 their housing providers that
10 somebody would call ICE.

11 When I ran the City's
12 Human Relations Commission, we
13 heard these cases all the time.
14 And I just want to make sure that
15 it is loud and clear to anybody
16 listening that is illegal. It is a
17 form of sexual harassment, sex
18 discrimination. You could file a
19 claim with the City's -- the
20 Philadelphia Commission on Human
21 Relations, the Pennsylvania Human
22 Relations Commission.

23 But it's also the reason
24 why I held my hearing to look at

1 1/30/25 - STATED - SPEECHES
2 the City's readiness and commitment
3 to enforcing the great laws that we
4 actually have on the books here in
5 Philadelphia to make sure that for
6 the wide range of awful things that
7 are happening to folks who are
8 undocumented or not in the city
9 because of racial profiling, that
10 we make sure folks are as protected
11 as possible, including the fact
12 that all City employees are not
13 allowed to ask you, unless it is
14 necessary for the thing that you
15 are trying to get an application
16 for something, they are not allowed
17 to ask you about your citizenship
18 status. So I just wanted to make
19 that clear so we can look at all of
20 this holistically because it's
21 affecting people throughout the
22 city in every area.

23 The second thing is this
24 is the beginning of tax month and I

2 do want to remind people -- thank
3 you, Councilmember Gauthier --
4 folks should go to
5 claimyourmoneyphl.com, the City's
6 claim your money tax site. That
7 site will point you to the free tax
8 preparers who will do your taxes
9 for free. They are certified.
10 They are wonderful. We just had a
11 press conference for them. They're
12 fantastic.

13 If you do go to a paid
14 tax preparer, please remember my
15 bill from last year. The tax
16 preparer must tell you how much
17 it's going to cost to do your taxes
18 upfront. So we got a lot of people
19 leaving the earned income tax
20 credit and the child tax credit on
21 the table. These are thousands of
22 dollars that we can get into the
23 pockets of Philadelphians even if
24 you made just a little bit of

1 1/30/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 money. I'm not going to file my
3 taxes. I'm not going to owe
4 anything. The federal government
5 will give you money. Please do it.
6 It could be up to \$10,000 depending
7 on your family size.

8 And then finally, I want
9 to talk a little bit about the
10 bills that I introduced today.
11 Many of you know in my background
12 as a housing and civil rights
13 lawyer I've been saying housing is
14 a human right throughout my career.
15 I've seen firsthand how hardworking
16 people, families, seniors, people
17 transitioning out of homelessness
18 are blocked from housing, not
19 because they can't afford the rent,
20 but because they simply can't
21 afford to move in.

22 That's why today I'm so
23 proud to introduce my Move-in
24 Affordability Plan, a crucial step

1 1/30/25 - STATED - SPEECHES
2 toward making Philadelphia a more
3 affordable and equitable place to
4 live. My Move-in Affordability
5 Plan caps excessive junk rental
6 application fees and allows
7 security deposits to be paid in
8 installments, lowering the overall
9 cost of moving into a new rental
10 unit because it's an insurmountable
11 hurdle for many Philadelphians with
12 median rents in the city at \$1,800
13 to just move into their home.
14 These are upfront costs.
15 We're in a housing
16 crisis. Nearly half of
17 Philadelphians rent their homes.
18 Almost 50 percent of them are cost-
19 burdened paying 30 percent or more
20 of their income just to keep a roof
21 over their heads. And it's not
22 just the cost of rent. It's the
23 outrageous upfront fees that make
24 securing housing nearly impossible

2 for too many people.

3 That's why we have to
4 make changes now. These bills are
5 commonsense measures that will help
6 renters without hurting landlords.
7 They remove unnecessary barriers to
8 housing and ensure that hardworking
9 Philadelphians can access the homes
10 they deserve. It's about ensuring
11 that people aren't priced out of
12 housing before they even have a
13 chance to sign a lease.

14 I look forward to
15 working with my colleagues, housing
16 advocates, landlords and community
17 members to get this done, because
18 if we want Philadelphia to be a
19 city where everyone has a fair
20 shot, we have to start by making a
21 city where everyone can afford a
22 home.

23 People are being asked
24 for three months' rent upfront with

1 1/30/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 the median rent of \$1,800. That is
3 a hurdle many can't overcome. I'd
4 like -- and so, thank you for
5 continuing this dialogue with me
6 about these bills, open door as
7 always.

8 And I also want to
9 commend Councilmember Driscoll on
10 his resolution, examining the
11 operation of the 311 non-emergency
12 hotline and its engagement with
13 City departments. As Chair of the
14 Technology and Information Services
15 Committee as well as a city
16 resident who has used 311 before,
17 I'm eager to dive deeper into the
18 subject and improve the system as
19 much as possible with Councilmember
20 Driscoll and all of our colleagues.
21 Thank you.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

23 JOHNSON: Thank you.

24 The Chair recognizes

1 1/30/25 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 Councilmember Phillips.

3 COUNCILMAN PHILLIPS:

4 Yes. Just really briefly I just
5 want to say today I introduced a
6 resolution recognizing the Clean
7 and Green office led by Carlton
8 Williams. His support,
9 Commissioner Crystal Jacobs has
10 been also a part of the clean and
11 green efforts.

12 I just want to say Mayor
13 Parker put together a great team,
14 and this team has been very
15 responsive to all of our cleaning
16 needs in the 9th District. And I
17 just want to let us know that when
18 the District Councilmembers work
19 closely with the administration, we
20 can get a lot done with the city.

21 And so, when we're
22 hearing from our neighbors what's
23 happening, when things are not
24 clean and then we contact the

1 1/30/25 - STATED - ADJOURNMENT
2 administration about what needs to
3 be clean and they are rapidly
4 responding to it, it's really
5 appreciative. So more to come on
6 us honoring and recognizing them.
7 But just want to say thank you so
8 much, Clean and Green. Let's keep
9 up the efforts.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT

11 JOHNSON: Thank you.
12 There are no more speeches on
13 behalf of the Majority.

14 Now, the Chair
15 recognizes Majority Whip
16 Councilmember Thomas for a motion
17 to adjourn.

18 COUNCILMAN THOMAS:

19 Thank you, Mr. President.

20 I move that Council
21 stand adjourned until Thursday,
22 February 6, 2025 at 10:00 a.m.
23 sharp.

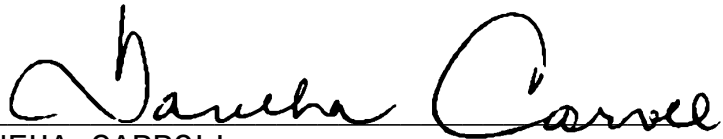
