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2 P R O C E E D I N G S

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

4 Good morning, everyone. Good
5 morning, everyone.

6 I note that the hour has
7 come and that a quorum of this
8 council is present. All members
9 have taken their seats, I'll ask for
10 all visitors to please retire
11 outside the rails and I will ask for
12 all sidebar conversations to please
13 be taken outside of the City Council
14 chambers.

15 Also, please put your cell
16 phones on silent and/or vibrate.
17 Thank you very much. To give our
18 invocation this morning, the Chair
19 recognizes Pandit Kasiram
20 Ramakrishna, founder and head priest
21 of the Vendagita Center, Inc., known
22 as the Sri Siva Vishnu Temple. He's
23 here today as the guest of
24 Councilmember Dr. Nina Ahmad. Will

1 all members and guests please rise?

2 HEAD PRIEST RAMAKRISHNA:

3 Hello, good morning.

4 Namaskar to all. I want to thank
5 Council President and all the city
6 Councilmember, and special thanks to
7 Nina -- Dr. Nina Ahmad for inviting
8 me here today.

9 I am going to recite a
10 prayer from Hindu scripture called
11 Vedas, which is the oldest
12 scriptures in this universe. We all
13 will pray together for well-
14 being for all the whole human being
15 and this universe. So I will
16 recite, then I will give a small,
17 brief explanation what I chanted,
18 the mantras.

19 (Reciting prayer in Hindu.)

20 HEAD PRIEST RAMAKRISHNA:

21 It just says, may God protect all of
22 us. May he nourish us all together,
23 may our studies be enlightening, may
24 there be no hate among us. May we

1 all work together with great energy
2 to protect our universe, our
3 country, United States of America,
4 and especially the city of
5 Philadelphia.

6 May all sentient beings be
7 at peace, may no one suffer from
8 illness, may all see what is
9 auspicious, may no one suffer from
10 poverty. May all beings everywhere
11 be happy and free and may the
12 thoughts, words, and the action of
13 our own life contribute in some way
14 to that happiness and to that
15 freedom for all.

16 All shanti, shanti, shanti,
17 shanti. It's peace, peace, peace.
18 That is the main message from the
19 scriptures.

20 Thank you once again, and
21 thank you the president for inviting
22 me today here.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

24 The Chair thanks you for

1 your invocation. And Council will
2 be at ease.

3 (Council at ease.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

5 The next order of business
6 is the approval of the journal of
7 the meeting of Thursday, April 10th,
8 2025.

9 The Chair recognizes the
10 Majority Leader Gilmore-Richardson.
11 The Chair recognizes Councilmember
12 Cindy Bass.

13 COUNCILMEMBER BASS: Thank
14 you, Mr. President. I move that the
15 journal of the meeting of Thursday,
16 April 10th, 2025 be approved.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
18 It has been moved and properly
19 seconded that the journal of the
20 meeting of Thursday, April 10th,
21 2025 stand approved.

22 All those in favor will
23 signify by saying aye.

24 (Aye.)

1 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

2 Those opposed? The ayes have it,
3 and the journal is approved.

4 The next order of business
5 is a request for leave of absence.
6 And the Chair recognizes Majority
7 Leader Katherine Gilmore-Richardson.

8 COUNCILMEMBER GILMORE-
9 RICHARDSON:

10 Thank you, Mr. President.
11 On behalf of the majority, a leave
12 of absence is requested for
13 Councilmember Jones.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
15 Leave is granted. The Chair --
16 thanks to Councilmember.

17 The Chair recognizes
18 Minority Leader Kendra Brooks. The
19 Chair recognizes -- at this moment,
20 there are no leaves of absences for
21 the minority.

22 Councilmember Gilmore-
23 Richardson, for the record, are
24 there any leaves of absences for the

1 Minority Party?

2 COUNCILMEMBER GILMORE -

3 RICHARDSON: Thank you,

4 Mr. President. On behalf of

5 Councilmember Brooks, there are no

6 requests for leave of absence on

7 behalf of the minorities.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

9 Thank you very much. So much for

10 tri-partisanship. Isn't that what

11 it's called?

12 The Chair recognizes

13 Majority Leader, Councilmember

14 Katherine Gilmore-Richardson for a

15 motion concerning certain

16 legislative matters that may arise

17 during the course of today's session

18 of council, and that not -- that

19 were not listed on the calendar

20 circulated prior to today's council

21 session.

22 COUNCILMEMBER GILMORE -

23 RICHARDSON: Thank you,

24 Mr. President. I move that any of

1 the following matters, if considered
2 today, may be added to the agenda
3 for this session of council, and as
4 required by law, subsequently
5 published on an amended agenda after
6 the consideration of those matters.
7 Resolutions authorizing hearings,
8 amendments to bills on first
9 reading, the reconsideration of a
10 bill veto by or recalled from the
11 mayor, amendments to bills recalled
12 from the mayor, resolutions taking
13 substantive action to be voted on in
14 this session, a motion to withdraw a
15 bill or a resolution that is not on
16 the calendar, and a motion placing a
17 bill or a resolution on, or
18 returning a bill or a resolution
19 from the suspension calendar that is
20 not listed on today's calendar.

21 The purpose of this motion
22 is to provide the public with notice
23 concerning possible actions by
24 Council that arose too late to be

1 included on the calendar that was
2 published prior to today's session.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

4 It has been moved and properly
5 seconded. The legislative matter
6 stated by Councilmember Gilmore-
7 Richardson may be added to the
8 agenda for today should those
9 matters arise during the course of
10 this session of Council.

11 All those in favor will
12 signify by saying aye.

13 (Aye.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

15 Those opposed? The ayes have it,
16 and the motion carries.

17 The Chair will dispense
18 with the regular order of business
19 to recognize the guests and visitors
20 joining us in chambers this morning.

21 On behalf of all members of
22 City Council, I welcome you to our
23 council session. We appreciate you
24 taking the time to join us as we

1 attend the legislative affairs of
2 our great city. We certainly invite
3 you to come again. The Chair
4 recognizes Councilmember Mark
5 Squilla.

6 COUNCILMEMBER SQUILLA:

7 Thank you, Mr. President. I'd like
8 to recognize we have a group of
9 young students here from St. Mary's
10 right up here on the balcony up here
11 on the left. And they're here to
12 see democracy in action, to see what
13 council is all about. I'd just like
14 to give them a great round of
15 applause for coming out here to
16 witness.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

18 They are here in spirit.

19 COUNCILMEMBER SQUILLA:

20 Yes, they left. They were just
21 here. So thank you for that. I'd
22 like to thank you, Mr. President,
23 the committee on appropriation
24 reports. I have three bills with a

1 favorable recommendation.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

3 Not at the moment just yet, sir.

4 COUNCILMEMBER SQUILLA:

5 Okay. Thank you.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

7 But thank you, Member. We're still
8 going through welcomes.

9 The Chair recognizes
10 Councilmember Quetcy Lozada.

11 COUNCILMEMBER LOZADA:

12 Thank you, Council President. I'd
13 like to ask you to join me in
14 welcoming three of the principals of
15 the 7th Council District who were
16 honored to have been recognized with
17 the prestigious Lindback
18 Distinguished Principal Award,
19 Awilda Balbuena, Nichole Polk and
20 William Lawrence.

21 Please welcome. Thank you
22 so much and congratulations. As
23 well as Benita Williams and Vickie
24 Melvin, who are from the

1 Philadelphia Children's Alliance and
2 we will be recognizing them as well
3 later on in the session.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
5 Thank you. The Chair recognizes
6 Councilman Rue Landau.

7 COUNCILMEMBER LANDAU: Oh,
8 I would like to recognize state rep
9 Izzy Smith-Wade-El. Thank you so
10 much for being here.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
12 Thank you for joining us,
13 Representative. And he's also in
14 Harrisburg fighting to make sure we
15 receive funding for SEPTA. So thank
16 you for standing up and fighting for
17 us.

18 At this time, the Chair
19 recognizes Councilmember Driscoll,
20 who will present a resolution
21 honoring and congratulating the
22 Father Judge High School.

23 Boys basketball team for
24 winning the 2025 PIAA 6A

1 Championship. Would Thomas Coyle
2 and those accompanying them please
3 join the Councilmember at the
4 podium.

5 COUNCILMEMBER DRISCOLL:

6 And Isaiah.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

8 Joining Councilmember Driscoll is
9 Councilmember O'Neill, Councilmember
10 Harrity, and Councilmember Thomas.
11 And Thomas Coyle is the athletic
12 director.

13 COUNCILMEMBER DRISCOLL:

14 Well, thank you, Mr. President.
15 Today's a very special day for me
16 personally to have a team in my
17 district not only win the Catholic
18 League Championship, but then go on
19 several weeks later to win the state
20 championship. It's a school that
21 has been near and dear to my heart
22 since I was a little boy.

23 For those of you who are
24 old enough to remember the Catholic

1 school system, when I was at St.
2 Martin of Tours, the wonderful nuns
3 from the IHM they would tell you
4 where you were going, when you were
5 going, and how you were going. And
6 I thought up until February of my
7 8th grade year, I thought I was
8 going to Father Judge. And I
9 explained to some of the champions
10 today, I was very disappointed to
11 learn in February of that year that
12 I would be going to Cardinal
13 Dougherty High School instead of
14 Father Judge High School.

15 The beautiful thing about
16 that was that I not only maintained
17 my friendships from the older guys
18 and my brother who went to Father
19 Judge, but I had a whole new class
20 of friends from Cardinal Dougherty,
21 and as father camp alone likes to
22 say, when I see him, he says that,
23 Mike, you're -- you'll always be an
24 adopted member of Father Judge

1 community. So I'm thrilled to be
2 here today on behalf of these young
3 men.

4 This is not just an
5 academic or athletic achievement;
6 this is much more than that. Father
7 Judge High School for boys wants to
8 make sure these young men not only
9 succeed in their athletic programs,
10 in their spirituality, in their
11 academic programs, they want to make
12 sure these young men are prepared to
13 go into life. And that's why I am
14 always proud to support the
15 programming up at Father Judge High
16 School. They now -- Leader
17 Richardson, I know you've been
18 there, they now have an academic
19 wing and, yeah, right, a program for
20 with the welding and the trades.

21 And so these young men are
22 coming out with opportunities to go
23 on to college or go on to make
24 \$100,000 in the trades right away.

1 So -- but that's not what we're
2 celebrating today. What we're
3 celebrating is this wonderful
4 achievement of these young men.

5 The early morning hours
6 they had to get up, the late nights,
7 the practices, balancing their
8 schedules with their academics. And
9 so we as a council invited you here
10 today to present to you and to the
11 school a proclamation proclaiming
12 your wonderful achievement. So I'll
13 start out.

14 Whereas on Saturday, May
15 29th, the Father Judge High School
16 Boys basketball team finished its
17 historic season by winning the 2025
18 PIAA Class 6A championship and
19 cementing their legacy in crusader
20 history. And --

21 COUNCILMAN HARRITY:
22 Whereas under the leadership of head
23 Coach Chris Rountree and assistant
24 Coach Jim Reeds, who both played on

1 Judge's last Catholic League
2 championship team in 1998 and
3 inspired by the trials and losses of
4 seasons prior, The Father Judge
5 Crusaders went 24 at seven this
6 season.

7 COUNCILMEMBER THOMAS: I
8 just want to take a moment of
9 personal privilege to thank the
10 district Councilmember for
11 acknowledging these young people.
12 And as a member of PIAA District 12
13 board, it's truly an honor to see
14 Father Judge win a 6A championship.

15 Whereas the season
16 highlights included winning the
17 Philadelphia Catholic League
18 Championship, which I had the --
19 actually the privilege to be at.
20 And I can honestly say it was a
21 phenomenal game, and it was a
22 championship game that I won't
23 forget anytime soon.

24 Winning the Catholic League

1 Championship for the first time in
2 20 years. The first state playoff
3 run for the Crusaders culminated at
4 the Giant Center in Hershey,
5 Pennsylvania, where -- when they
6 faced off against Roman Catholic for
7 the 2025 PIAA 6A Championship.

8 And whereas with the score
9 tied at 36 entering half time, the
10 Crusaders continued pushing with
11 offensive excellence and a strong
12 defense, winning the game 71 to 60
13 in the first state championship for
14 Father Judge in school history. And
15 --

16 COUNCILMEMBER O'NEILL:

17 Whereas through their
18 historic victory and exemplary
19 sportsmanship, the Father Judge High
20 School boys basketball team has
21 brought tremendous pride not only to
22 their school, but to the entire
23 Northeast Philadelphia and certainly
24 to all the Judge families in my

1 district.

2 And establishing themselves
3 in Coach Rountree's words, as the
4 best team in Judge history, and
5 that's really making a statement,
6 whose legacy is now cemented in the
7 record books as the first to achieve
8 this milestone. Now therefore be it
9 --

10 COUNCILMEMBER DRISCOLL:

11 -- resolved by the Council
12 of the City of Philadelphia hereby
13 honors and congratulates the Father
14 Judge High School boys team for
15 winning the 2025 PIAA 6A
16 Championship and further resolved
17 that an engrossed copy of this
18 resolution be presented to the
19 Father Judge High School boys
20 basketball team with the utmost
21 respect and admiration of this
22 legislative body.

23 And Mr. President, before
24 you bring up the athletic department

1 leadership, I also want to
2 congratulate the young men and the
3 organization of Roman Catholic High
4 School, who also has wonderful
5 programs and has a historic legacy
6 in this city. And I should note
7 that Coach McNesby, who is a -- will
8 be a Hall of Fame coach in his own
9 right someday, does a wonderful job
10 with that program.

11 But these young men behind
12 me not only beat them once this
13 season, not only beat them twice,
14 but beat them three times. So one
15 more time for these young men.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
17 The Chair recognizes Thomas Coyle,
18 Athletic Director.

19 MR. COYLE: Gratitude. I
20 think as you see these young men
21 here in front of you, we're a school
22 located in northeast Philadelphia,
23 and our friends from northeast
24 Philadelphia that represent us,

1 Councilman O'Neill and Councilman
2 Driscoll, we're grateful for their
3 work. But our gratitude really, as
4 you see these young men, I think
5 it's important that we mentioned
6 that championship game was played in
7 Hershey, this great state of
8 Pennsylvania, this commonwealth of
9 Pennsylvania.

10 Father Judge's basketball
11 team represented Philadelphia, and
12 they really represented the great
13 things that occur in those youth
14 organizations, in those playgrounds,
15 in those recreation centers. These
16 young men stand behind me, they're
17 young guys that went to a basketball
18 court one day in the city of
19 Philadelphia. And our school
20 encompasses students that come from
21 all across Philadelphia. They went
22 to basketball practice, or they went
23 to a basketball game one day with
24 the parents, and they've been able

1 to live out a dream.

2 The last couple months for
3 them have been outstanding, they've
4 shared something that they'll
5 remember for the rest of their
6 lives, and that started as young
7 people throughout the city of
8 Philadelphia. I think the entire
9 city should be proud of not only
10 what our guys had accomplished, but
11 the fact that Roman Catholic was
12 able to accomplish so many great
13 things. But behind me are young
14 people who take their education
15 serious, who are so legion
16 gentlemen, who make sure that they
17 do the right things every day in
18 school, and certainly compete at a
19 very high level.

20 We couldn't be more proud
21 of them, we couldn't be more
22 grateful to the city of Philadelphia
23 and the opportunities that the
24 city's provided for these young guys

1 throughout their lives. They're
2 grateful. We thank you for
3 everything you do for us. Thank
4 you.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
6 Council will be at ease.

7 MR. KILKENNY: On behalf of
8 the Father Judge basketball team, my
9 name is Ryan Kilkenny. I'm an
10 assistant coach. We'd like to thank
11 Council for having us in today. As
12 these young men behind us, we've
13 discussed our motto at Father Judge
14 is to be who you are and be that
15 well. Our young student athletes
16 have strived not only in the
17 classroom with the commute -- with a
18 cumulative, excuse me, 3.74 GPA. We
19 also have two athletes one who's not
20 with us here today, Everett Barnes
21 who is a 4.0 student who will be
22 going to Loyola Baltimore.

23 Also, the state MVP, Kevair
24 Kennedy, will be going on for a full

1 academic and athletic scholarship to
2 Merrimack University. As well as
3 our other three seniors, Kevin Beck
4 who will be going to Montclair State
5 University, Kiev Rucker, who will be
6 playing football at Lockhaven
7 University, and Dylan Hanley, who
8 will be continuing to play
9 basketball at Elizabethtown
10 University.

11 So again, we thank you very
12 much for the honor to be down here
13 today and appreciate all the
14 support.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
16 Council will now be at ease.

17 (Council at ease.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
19 The next order of business
20 is communications. The Chair

19 Good morning, everyone.

20 Thank you, Council president. I

19 The Chair recognizes
20 Councilmember Dr. Nina Ahmad.

21 COUNCILMEMBER AHMAD: Thank
22 you, Council President. I have no
23 bills or resolutions today.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

1 Thank you very much. The Council
2 will be at ease. I want to dispense
3 from the -- thank you very much.

4 I want to dispense from the
5 regular order of business before we
6 call out reports from committees. A
7 resolution that I introduce honoring
8 the life and legacy of the first
9 Latin Pope, Pope Francis. I'm going
10 to ask everybody to stand up for a
11 moment of silence.

12 He was a pope for social
13 justice, come from very humble
14 beginnings, and fought on behalf of
15 those most in need. So we want to
16 take a moment of silence honoring
17 his life, legacy, and memory.

18 (Moment of silence.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

20 The next order of business
21 is reports from committee.

22 The Chair recognizes
23 Councilmember Bass for a report from
24 the Committee on Rules.

1 COUNCILMEMBER BASS: Thank
2 you, Mr. President. The Committee
3 on Rules reports out four bills with
4 a favorable recommendation.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
6 Thank you. Will the Chief Clerk
7 please read the title -- please read
8 the report?

9 THE CHIEF CLERK: The
10 Committee on Rules to which were
11 referred the following bills:

12 Bill No. 250207, an
13 ordinance to amend the Philadelphia
14 zoning maps by changing the zoning
15 designations of certain areas of
16 land located within an -- within an
17 area bound by Federal Street, 13th
18 Street, Wharton Street, and Broad
19 Street.

20 And Bill No. 250242, an
21 ordinance repealing in its entirety,
22 Bill No. 240972 approved December
23 23rd, 2024 entitled An Ordinance
24 Amending Title 14 of the

1 Philadelphia Code entitled Zoning
2 and Planning by revising certain
3 provisions of Section 14-906
4 entitled Market Street East Sign
5 Regulations, all under certain terms
6 and conditions.

7 And Bill No. 250243, an
8 ordinance repealing in its entirety
9 Bill No. 240971 approved December
10 23rd, 2024 entitled an ordinance
11 amending Title 14 of the
12 Philadelphia Code entitled Zoning
13 and Planning by amending certain
14 definitions relating to signs,
15 creating an area arena within the
16 center city overlay district overlay
17 and making related changes,
18 including a master plan requirement
19 and changes to accessory sign
20 controls, all in connection with
21 zoning rules for a proposed arena in
22 center city and approving a master
23 plan for the arena area, all under
24 certain terms and conditions.

1 And Bill No. 250244, an
2 ordinance repealing in their
3 entirety the following ordinances
4 all approved December 23rd, 2024.
5 Bill No. 240966, granting the
6 necessary authorizations for the
7 city to help facilitate development
8 of a new arena for the seven --
9 Philadelphia 76ers.

10 Bill No. 240967 authorizing
11 the execution of a service agreement
12 between the city and PAID.

13 Bill No. 240968,
14 authorizing striking Filbert Street
15 from 10th Street to 11th Street from
16 the City Plan.

17 Bill No. 240969,
18 authorizing striking certain aerial
19 portions of 10th Street between
20 Market Street and Filbert Street
21 from the city plan.

22 Bill No. 240970,
23 authorizing the construction and
24 maintenance of various right of way

1 encroachments in the vicinity of the
2 proposed arena.

3 Bill No. 240963 amending
4 the existing gallery at Market East
5 Tax Increment Financing District in
6 the arena of the proposed arena, and
7 Bill No. 240973 approving the
8 amendment of a neighborhood
9 improvement district in the area of
10 the proposed arena.

11 Respectfully reports it has
12 considered the same and returns the
13 attached bills to Council with a
14 favorable recommendation. There are
15 no further bills to report out from
16 the Committee on Rules, Council
17 President.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
19 Thank you very much. The Chair
20 recognizes Councilmember Bass --
21 Chairwoman Bass for a motion.

22 COUNCILMEMBER BASS: Thank
23 you, Mr. President. I move that the
24 rules of Council be suspended to

1 permit first reading this day of the
2 bills just read into the record by
3 the Chief Clerk.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

5 It has been moved and
6 properly seconded that the rules of
7 Council be suspended, so I have to
8 permit the consideration of the
9 bills just read by the Chief Clerk
10 in today's assessment of Council.

11 All those in favor of the
12 motion will signify by saying aye.

13 (Aye.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

15 Those opposed? The ayes have it.
16 The motion carries. These bills
17 will be placed on our first reading
18 calendar for today.

19 The Chair recognizes
20 Councilmember Squilla for a report
21 from the Committee on
22 Appropriations.

23 COUNCILMEMBER SQUILLA:

24 Thank you, Mr. President. The

1 committee on appropriation reports
2 three bills with a favorable
3 recommendation.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
5 Thank you. Would the Chief Clerk
6 please read the report?

7 THE CHIEF CLARK: The
8 Committee on appropriations to which
9 were referred the following bills:

10 Bill No. 250204, an
11 ordinance to amend Bill No. 240182,
12 approved June 14th, 2024, entitled
13 an Ordinance to Adopt a Capital
14 Program For The Six Fiscal Years
15 2025 through 2030, inclusive by
16 revising various appropriation
17 amounts and totals to conform to
18 amendments to the FY 2025 capital
19 budget ordinance, all under certain
20 terms and conditions.

21 And Bill No. 250205, an
22 ordinance to amend Bill No. 240181
23 approved June 14th, 2024, entitled
24 an Ordinance To Adopt Fiscal 2025

1 Capital Budget by revising various
2 appropriation amounts and totals,
3 all under certain terms and
4 conditions.

5 And Bill No. 250206, an
6 ordinance authorizing transfers and
7 appropriations for Fiscal Year 2025
8 from the general fund, certain or
9 all city offices, departments, board
10 and commissions; the water fund,
11 certain or all city offices,
12 departments, boards and commissions;
13 and the grants revenue fund, certain
14 or all city offices, departments,
15 boards and commissions; to the
16 general fund, certain or all city
17 offices, departments, boards and
18 commissions.

19 The aviation fund, certain
20 or all city offices, departments,
21 boards and commissions; and the
22 transportation fund, certain or all
23 city offices, departments, boards
24 and commissions respectfully reports

1 it has considered and amended the
2 same and returns the attached bills
3 to Council with a favorable
4 recommendation.

5 There are no further bills
6 to report out from the Committee on
7 Appropriations, Council President.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

9 Thank you very much. The Chair
10 recognizes Chairman Squilla for a
11 motion.

12 COUNCILMEMBER SQUILLA:

13 Thank you, Mr. President. I move
14 that the rules of Council be
15 suspended to admit the first reading
16 this day of the bills that were just
17 read into the record by the Chief
18 Clerk.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

20 It has been moved and properly
21 seconded that the rules of Council
22 be suspended so as to permit the
23 consideration of these bills just
24 read by the Chief Clerk at today's

1 session of Council.

2 All those in favor of the
3 motion will signify by saying aye.

4 (Aye.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

6 Those opposed? The ayes have it.

7 The motion carries.

8 These bills will be placed
9 on our first reading calendar for
10 today.

11 The next order of business
12 is the consideration of the
13 calendar. I note that the bills
14 just reported from committees with
15 the suspension of rules have been
16 deemed to have had a first reading.
17 These bills will be placed on the
18 second reading and final passage
19 calendar for the next session of
20 council as there are no additional
21 bills on the first reading calendar.

22 The Chair recognizes
23 Majority Leader Gilmore-Richardson
24 for the purpose of calling up bills

1 and resolutions on the second
2 reading and final passage calendars.

3 COUNCILMEMBER GILMORE-

4 RICHARDSON: Thank you,
5 Mr. President. The following bills
6 and resolutions are being called up
7 from the second reading and final
8 passage calendars today: Numbers
9 250337, 250339, 250342, 250343,
10 250347, 250348, 250353, 250354,
11 250355, 250356, 250357, 250358,
12 250361, 250102, 250148, 250176,
13 250177, 250203, 250208, 250209,
14 250240, 250241, 250271, 250272, and
15 25-274.

16 The following bills and
17 resolutions on the calendar are
18 being held: 250303, 250266, and
19 250267, 240665 is being amended.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

21 Thank you. Before considering the
22 bills and resolutions, we will
23 consider public comment as follows,
24 your public comment must concern

1 matters on the second reading and
2 final passage calendars for its
3 possible action in today's council
4 session.

5 All speakers must sign up
6 in order to testify. If you have
7 not already signed up for today's
8 session, please do so now by giving
9 your name to Ms. Hassen at the table
10 outside the rails to my left. Once
11 you have signed up, you will be
12 called in the order in which your
13 name appears on the signup sheet.

14 Under ideal circumstances,
15 public comment just will each have
16 three minutes to speak. However, to
17 the time limit it may vary from
18 session to session. Today due to
19 our extremely considerably long
20 public comment list, we will be
21 giving individuals one minute. In
22 order to be fair to all those
23 wishing to speak, I intend to hold
24 faithfully to the one-minute limit.

1 When you begin speaking,
2 you will see a green light on the
3 podium. When there are 30 seconds
4 remaining to your time, the light
5 will turn yellow, which is your
6 reminder to conclude your remarks.
7 Once one minute have passed, the
8 light will turn red and the Sergeant
9 At Arms will disconnect the
10 microphone. At that point, please
11 yield the podium to the next speaker
12 if you have not already done so.

13 Now, I also reserve the
14 right under -- the right pursuant to
15 our rules of City Council to limit
16 repetitions comments on the same
17 subject matter. So we have
18 extremely long list today,
19 predominantly on several same
20 subject matters. I will now ask the
21 Chief Clerk to please read the name
22 of our first speaker.

23 THE CHIEF CLERK:
24 Representative Ismail Smith-Wade-El,

1 May Theresa Theo, Sister Mary
2 McNulty, and Sister Beth
3 Bartholomew, Father Ryan, and
4 Reverend Geliebter, excuse me,
5 Geliebter also make their way to the
6 podium.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
8 Representative, the floor is yours.

9 REP. SMITH-WADE-EL: Thank
10 you, Council President. Thank you
11 members of Philadelphia City Council
12 and of course, Councilmember Rue
13 Landau for considering -- bringing
14 up and considering the resolution
15 supporting the Ready to Rent Act,
16 which would help to seal evictions
17 older than seven years in the
18 Commonwealth. Having been a council
19 president in Lancaster, I will try
20 to faithfully respect the time
21 limit.

22 And so what I want to say
23 is this, my mother was born in
24 Washington DC in 1948 when it was

1 segregated. She graduated from the
2 University of Pennsylvania, taught
3 35 years at Millersville, and now
4 there is a school named after her in
5 Lancaster because her parents were
6 able to provide for her through her
7 entire youth a stable home. I am
8 standing in front of you because two
9 black parents were able to provide
10 for their child a stable home and
11 more and more in the commonwealth
12 that is under threat.

13 And so the Ready to Rent
14 Act seeks to really stop us as we do
15 under Pennsylvania law from making
16 renter second-class citizens. Just
17 as a bankruptcy or a foreclosure can
18 fall off a credit report after seven
19 years, pardon me, an eviction, a 7,
20 or 10, or 12 years old should not
21 prevent somebody from accessing
22 housing in this Commonwealth.

23 And among the tens of
24 thousands of people against whom

1 evictions are filed every year, some
2 number of them, some large number of
3 them, in fact, I think Holly Beck
4 from -- there we go. Community
5 Legal Services has the exact number.
6 What they find is that the judge
7 finds in their favor. But if you
8 have been a landlord, as I have, you
9 know that often, as soon as they see
10 that eviction filing on the
11 background check, they throw that
12 application over their shoulder,
13 which is to say there are thousands
14 of Pennsylvanians being denied
15 housing over evictions that have
16 never actually occurred.

17 And so I just want to say
18 as we work hard to make sure that
19 this bill passes the house and
20 passes the Senate to get to the
21 governor's desk in a bipartisan
22 fashion, I welcome the support of
23 the Council of the birthplace of
24 American Liberty and appreciate your

1 consideration this day. Thank you
2 very much, Council president.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
4 Thank you, representative.

5 MS. THEO: Hi, my name is
6 Theresa Theo, and I'm here to speak
7 on Bill 250266 and Bill 250267,
8 which is the 47th Street Project 2
9 change the lane to a one-way
10 direction from a two-way and reduced
11 47th Street to a single travel lane
12 to install a 10 to 13-foot wide
13 parking protected bike lane.

14 We recently testified at
15 the committee on the streets showing
16 OTIS did not conduct the proper
17 studies for this project. We have
18 some issues that we'd like to raise
19 with the key impacts of reducing
20 47th Street to a single travel lane,
21 it creates a travel bottleneck. The
22 OTIS plan lacks a solution for
23 managing the high volume of vehicles
24 during student drop off and pickup.

1 We realize this is a school district
2 issue with busing. However, until
3 that knot is untied, the cars will
4 still arrive at this intersection
5 and we have no idea where they will
6 queue and it's not included in the
7 plan.

8 We have a restricted
9 emergency access. The EMT responses
10 for strokes, heart attacks, or child
11 injuries will be impeded on 47th and
12 Springfield during peak times. And
13 I know I'm running out of time, so I
14 won't go through the rest of the
15 testimony.

16 I'd just like to say that
17 we would like to encourage the full
18 Council to suspend this plan until
19 it can go back for further review
20 with the proper studies done,
21 because we believe the safety of the
22 streets should not be decided by
23 councilmanic prerogative. In this
24 case, it should be the full Council

1 who looks at this to make sure that
2 OTIS is conducting the proper
3 engineering studies and properly and
4 honestly engaging with the
5 community. Thank you.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
7 Thank you.

8 MS. MCNULTY: Good
9 afternoon, Council President and
10 Council. My name is Sister Mary
11 McNulty. I am principal of St.
12 Francis De Sales School and I'd like
13 to speak on 250266 and 250267.

14 I just want you to know
15 that our school we have children
16 from 30-plus countries speaking 16
17 different languages in their homes
18 and coming from 31 zip codes. With
19 that being said, we have ages 4
20 through 14 in that school, and we
21 have about 450 children. What
22 happens is, I'm not opposed to the
23 direction of the movement of
24 traffic, that's fine, if it wants to

1 go one way. I'm always looking out
2 for safety.

3 And I have walked around
4 with the captain of police, making
5 sure that our dismissal is staggered
6 and making sure that we use all
7 available exits and roads. However,
8 I am concerned about the bike lanes.
9 I do have a bike, so I'm not against
10 bikes, but the one thing is the
11 electric bikes. Children step out,
12 parents step out. Well, sisters, we
13 have elderly sisters, you don't get
14 to retire in our life. So they're
15 83 plus and they're worried about
16 the bike lanes as well. Most of the
17 bikes that I've seen up and down are
18 electric bikes, and I'm afraid
19 someone is going to get hit and
20 injured. Thank you.

21 THE CHIEF CLERK: We have
22 Sister Beth Bartholomew, Father
23 Ryan, Reverend Geliebter, may
24 Virginia Lynn Hogman, Kristen

1 Ostendorf, and Monique Moore Pryor
2 also make their way to the podium.

3 MS. BARTHOLOMEW: Thank
4 you. Good -- good afternoon. My
5 name's Sister Beth Bartholomew, and
6 I'm here to speak on behalf of Bills
7 250266 and 250267.

8 And I just want to speak on
9 some of the congestion issues that I
10 have witnessed since I've gotten to
11 St. Francis de Sales. I'm the vice
12 principal there.

13 We've had at least a
14 handful of times an emergency
15 vehicle has struggled to get through
16 the traffic congestion at dismissal
17 due to the blockage of the roads.
18 We've had it in the case where
19 individuals are out there yelling at
20 the parents who don't always speak
21 English, but they're yelling at them
22 upset and expressing their
23 frustration either at morning
24 arrival or at dismissal. We've had

1 at least three times that a driver
2 of one car has decided to go through
3 the school yard thinking that's a
4 thoroughfare during morning arrival,
5 which has been very concerning.

6 We've had when school
7 officials have been out to help with
8 warning arrival and dismissal,
9 individuals have expressed their
10 frustration at them and at the
11 traffic congestion. And we have
12 had, as sister said, the sisters
13 have been afraid with the bikes.
14 Thank you.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
16 Thank you.

17 MR. RYAN: Hi. I'm Father
18 Ryan. I'm the priest in charge of
19 St. Francis de Sales Parish and
20 School, and I'm here for the Bill
21 250266 and 250267. Again, I'm not
22 opposed to having the
23 one-directional street, but safety
24 is our concern because I've been

1 there for like nine months, I have
2 seen drop off and pick up it's kind
3 of chaotic.

4 Even our maintenance guys
5 help out to -- with the kids
6 crossing the street. And now with
7 this bike lane, 10 to 15 -- 10 to
8 13-feet wide, you are going to cause
9 congestion and conflict points that
10 will force the bikers to weave
11 around the kids, and the kids are
12 unpredictable. We don't have a
13 fully fenced school, unlike other
14 schools, there's no fence. So kids
15 can just run through the streets,
16 and we have elderly sisters. So
17 that's my concern, is the safety of
18 our students.

19 MS. HOGMAN: Hello. My
20 name is Lynn Hogman and I'm speaking
21 against Bills 250266 and 250267.
22 I'm a resident of the 4700 block of
23 Windsor, which is a street directly
24 affected by those bills. 47th

1 Street between Baltimore Avenue and
2 Kingessing, which these bills would
3 turn to a one-lane street is the
4 sole access for two residential
5 streets, 4700 Windsor and 4600
6 Regent. And this will deny people
7 access to their houses.

8 In addition, there is a
9 traffic problem, as has been said at
10 the St. Francis de Sales School. If
11 this is a one-lane street, lines of
12 traffic will build up all the way
13 down, blocking access to these
14 streets and will also, if
15 alternatively, the traffic is --
16 parents are forced to pull over and
17 traffic is forced to go through,
18 they will send parents around on
19 Windsor Avenue, endangering small
20 children on this residential street.
21 And we can't even have speed bumps
22 on that street because it's narrow.
23 Thank you very much.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

1 Thank you.

2 THE CHIEF CLERK: We have
3 Kristen Ostendorf, Monique Moore
4 Pryor, McKelly Richards, Jeremy
5 Blatstein, Kate Perez, and Jacen
6 Bowman also make their way to the
7 podium.

8 MS. PRYOR: Good afternoon.
9 My name is Monique Moore Pryor. I
10 come before you today to thank
11 Councilmember Cindy Bass for
12 introducing the resolution and for
13 recognizing the work of the Free
14 Library Foundation. Also, thank
15 you, Council President Johnson and
16 all members of City Council for your
17 unwavering support of the Free
18 Library. I'd like to acknowledge
19 Library Director Kelly Richardson
20 for all his support, who will be
21 coming up shortly. And to thank
22 Councilmember Katherine Gilmore-
23 Richardson for introducing the
24 resolution on One Book, One

1 Philadelphia.

2 I have been at the Free
3 Library of Philadelphia since August
4 of 2023, and I'm the inaugural
5 president. And it is with
6 Humbleness that I share with you as
7 a Phil -- a Native Philadelphian,
8 and the daughter of two Philadelphia
9 public school teachers that I'm
10 living my life's mission. Please
11 visit us at Free Library --
12 freelibraryfoundation.org. Thank
13 you.

14 MR. RICHARDS: Hi. I am
15 Kelly Richards, President and
16 Director of the Free Library of
17 Philadelphia, and I'm here to
18 comment on the One Book, One
19 Philadelphia Resolution, introduced
20 by Councilmember Gilmore-Richardson
21 today, April 24th. I want to thank
22 the Councilmember for her support,
23 for libraries, and reading. And I'd
24 like to thank the entire City

1 Council for your support for the
2 free library and our many programs
3 that advance literacy, guide
4 learning, and inspire curiosity
5 throughout our great city. I'm
6 excited to be here today to
7 celebrate the One Book, One
8 Philadelphia program. This is the
9 23rd season of One Book, One
10 Philadelphia, which means that
11 Philadelphia has the longest running
12 One Book program in the country.

13 So this year, our group of
14 librarians, teachers, and other
15 selected gem of book by
16 Philadelphia, a legend, Tariq
17 Trotter, known as -- known to many
18 as Black Thought from Roots.
19 Mr. Trotter wrote an amazing book.
20 The Upcycled Life, which chronicles
21 his youth in Philadelphia, providing
22 rich insights and reflections, many
23 of which are familiar to those of us
24 who love this city. So I'm proud to

1 be here to honor this black author,
2 this Philly author, this artist, and
3 his thought-provoking book, and I'm
4 excited to be -- to this selection
5 for the big-read this year. So a
6 book this good should be celebrated
7 and shared. So the Free Library
8 Foundation, we thank them for
9 sponsoring the many events between
10 now and the end of May, and we
11 welcome all to come and support
12 these programs. So thank you.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

14 Thank you.

15 MR. BLATSTEIN: Hello,
16 Council. My name's Jeremy
17 Blatstein. If you're going to talk
18 shit, make sure you have your facts
19 straight.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

21 Time out. You coming and speaking
22 during public comment, but could you
23 respect the decorum of this
24 institution?

1 MR. BLATSTEIN: Sorry, I

2 apologize.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

4 All right. So as we move forward --

5 MR. BLATSTEIN: That was a

6 quote --

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

8 -- the language is totally in

9 inappropriate.

10 MR. BLATSTEIN: I

11 apologize. That was a quote -- that

12 was a quote. I'm sorry. That was a

13 quote.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

15 Okay. Well, whoever quoted

16 it, they are not going to speak it

17 in this body at all.

18 MR. BLATSTEIN: Yes, they

19 -- yes they are, but it's okay. So

20 we're talking about SEPTA.

21 Thank you, Councilman

22 O'Rourke, for introducing these

23 resolutions supporting SEPTA, but

24 we're talking about the workers and

1 we just got to make sure that the
2 workers and everyone knows that come
3 May 20th, there's an election.

4 So we're talking about
5 SEPTA, we're talking about making
6 sure the city's funded, and I'm glad
7 to see some members of council
8 finally are deciding to ride SEPTA
9 once in a while, and let's do it.
10 Raise your hand if you've rode SEPTA
11 in the last two weeks. Oh, we got a
12 winner here. Let's go, Councilwoman
13 Gauthier.

14 And the last thing I will
15 say is even though the bills are
16 being held, I think that Jesus would
17 be for bike lanes. I think that
18 safety over everything. I don't
19 think we should be preventing bike
20 lanes from being built in the city
21 of Philadelphia over parking
22 concerns, because realistically,
23 that's what was coming down to.
24 Safety, safety, safety. These

1 studies were done, it's clear that
2 bike lanes are safe. There's
3 daylighting, and really when it
4 comes down to that, they're upset
5 about some parking. So let's pass
6 these bills. Thank you.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
8 Thank you.

9 THE CHIEF CLERK: We have
10 Kate Perez, Jason Bowman, may Doris
11 Cochran-Fikes, Holly Beck, Juan
12 Madrigal Garcia, Ms. Patrice, Kate
13 Parker, and Braheem Douglas also
14 make their way to the podium.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
16 The Chair recognizes Councilmember
17 Lozada.

18 COUNCILMEMBER LOZADA:
19 Thank you, Council President. When
20 I talk about respect in this
21 chamber, that includes everybody.
22 That includes everybody. We have to
23 listen to everybody's public comment
24 in here, but disrespect is

1 unacceptable, and that includes you
2 too.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

4 The council will resume.

5 MS. PEREZ: Kate Perez,
6 here to remind you that the
7 occupying state of Israel has bombed
8 every single university in the
9 entire country of Palestine.
10 Philadelphia students and faculty
11 alike have been calling to divest
12 university money and sever
13 relationships that try to normalize
14 bombing kindergartens and self-
15 defense. Visas are being revoked at
16 random and citizens are being
17 deported.

18 The task force must
19 investigate universities willingly
20 handing over student and faculty
21 information without warrants. Power
22 to the Yale students protesting the
23 internationally wanted war criminal
24 from visiting their campus, Philly

1 stands with you and war criminals
2 are not welcome here either. Pope
3 Francis died this Easter with every
4 Christian Church in Palestine burned
5 down. He was quoted saying, "I
6 think of Gaza with so much pain, the
7 level of cruelty, children being
8 machine gunned, the bombing of
9 schools and hospitals, what
10 cruelty?" Just an hour ago, the
11 occupation bombed an apartment
12 building and children are arriving
13 to destroyed hospitals --

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
15 Hey, Kate. How are you doing, Kate?
16 Ms. Perez? Ms. Perez?

17 MS. PEREZ: -- has a huge
18 lit up sign over our city. Free
19 Palestine.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
21 Okay.

22 MS. COCHRAN-FIKES:
23 Greetings. My name is Doris
24 Cochran-Fikes. I live -- I'm a

1 homeowner at 48th in Baltimore. And
2 I'm going to cut my remarks short in
3 deference to others. But I just
4 want to address the 48th Street part
5 of the 48th and 47th Street's
6 Traffic Safety and Complete Streets
7 project. The separated bike lane
8 that's been installed on 48th Street
9 receives very little use from
10 cyclists, yet 24/7 it disrupts sight
11 lines and makes it difficult for
12 pedestrians and drivers to see
13 approaching cars. 24/7 residents
14 exit cars directly into approaching
15 traffic.

16 Parking spaces have been
17 eliminated on every block. Vehicle
18 loading and deliveries are
19 problematic. Traffic congestion has
20 also increased due to the recent
21 reroute of the number 64 bus.
22 Separated bike lanes may improve
23 safety on high traffic streets, but
24 they are not well suited for streets

1 that are primarily residential.
2 Before muddling 47th, OTIS needs to
3 conduct traffic engineering studies,
4 follow federal guidelines and
5 standards, realistically assess the
6 potential usage by cyclists lead
7 with truth and regain the trust of
8 taxpayers like me. I'm a disabled
9 senior due to that 48th street
10 separated bike lane, I no longer
11 feel safe crossing the street where
12 I live. Thank you.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
14 Thank you.

15 MR. BOWMAN: Good morning,
16 City Council. My name is Jason
17 Bowman. I am the Vice President of
18 Philadelphia Black Pride. You-all
19 can give a little clap for that.
20 I'm here to support the resolution
21 done by Kendra Brooks honoring
22 Philadelphia Black Pride Week.
23 Philadelphia Black Pride has started
24 yesterday.

1 I also want to say thank
2 you to Councilperson Rue Landau and
3 Kendra Brooks for hosting an event
4 last night that honored local black
5 and brown queer leaders in the city
6 of Philadelphia. Too many times, we
7 -- those leaders do not get
8 acknowledged or honored for their
9 hard labor of community work, so I
10 want to say thank you.

11 I also want to say thank
12 you to this legislative body for
13 making sure that when you guys are
14 passing bills through the people's
15 house, that you-all are making sure
16 that queer communities, especially
17 black and brown, disproportionate
18 people are actually celebrated and
19 uplifted in the bill that you guys
20 passed.

21 So thank you. I hope the
22 city comes out to celebrate
23 Philadelphia Black Pride Weekend.
24 There's tons of events happening all

1 throughout the city. You can visit
2 our website at phillyblackpride.org
3 and I thank you very much.

4 MS. BECK: Good afternoon.
5 Thank you, Council President. My
6 name is Holly Beck and I work at
7 Community Legal Services where I'm a
8 divisional supervising attorney in
9 our housing unit. And I'm here to
10 testify in support of Council --
11 Councilmember Landau resolution,
12 urging the Pennsylvania General
13 Assembly to seal old eviction
14 records.

15 We at Community Legal
16 Services of Philadelphia help more
17 than 13,000 people each year when
18 they face the threat of losing their
19 homes, income, healthcare, and even
20 their families. And our housing
21 attorneys are in court every day
22 representing tenants facing
23 eviction. This council has led the
24 way in eviction prevention. And

1 thanks to the council's hard work
2 and dedication over the years,
3 evictions in Philadelphia are not
4 what they used to be.

5 The Eviction Diversion
6 program, Right to Council, and
7 Renters Access Act have made our
8 city a national model in preventing
9 eviction and homelessness. Yet
10 there are still 14,000 eviction
11 cases every year in Philadelphia and
12 more than 357,000 eviction cases
13 across the state since 2020. And so
14 I'm proud to support representatives
15 Smith Wade's historic legislation to
16 seal old eviction records. And I
17 thank the sponsors of this
18 resolution.

19 THE CHIEF CLERK: We have
20 Juan Madrigal Garcia, Ms. Patrice,
21 Kate Parker, Raheem Douglas, may
22 Vivian Chang, Silvana Mazzella,
23 Benita Williams, and William
24 Lawrence also make their way to the

1 podium.

2 MR. MADRIGAL: Hello,
3 Council. My name is Juan Madrigal.
4 I'm an attorney fellow at Community
5 Legal Services, Philadelphia. It's
6 a pleasure to be with you here today
7 to support Councilmember Landau's
8 resolution declaring April 2nd
9 chance month. And also thank you to
10 Councilmember Landau for her focus
11 on, again, second chances, but also
12 fair chance hiring.

13 Really quickly, community
14 legal services. We are the largest
15 provider of free legal services to
16 low income Philadelphians in
17 Philadelphia. And we've long
18 advocated alongside and with our
19 clients with criminal records to
20 remove their barriers that they face
21 to gaining gainful employment. We
22 champion clean slate legislation and
23 at the state level that has already
24 helped over 1.5 million

1 Pennsylvanians seal their record and
2 get that fresh start.

3 We recognize though, that
4 far too many people in Philadelphia,
5 too many Philadelphians, are still
6 struggling under the weight and the
7 stigma of their criminal records.
8 They're denied the chance to move
9 forward and create gainful
10 opportunities for themselves. We're
11 thankful to Council for taking on
12 the important issue of fair chance
13 hiring for people with records and
14 to have -- to give us the
15 opportunity to inform on the changes
16 that are needed for Philadelphia's
17 Fair Hiring law.

18 Philadelphia is already a
19 leader in fair chance hiring. But
20 based on the feedback from our
21 clients and our own experiences
22 directly representing them, there's
23 still more we can do to make sure
24 that Philadelphia is the best city

1 in the country for advancing access
2 to meaningful economic opportunity
3 for justice impacted people. Thank
4 you.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
6 Thank you.

7 MR. DOUGLAS: My name is
8 Raheem Douglas. Good morning. Good
9 morning, Council. I'm speaking on
10 behalf of Councilmember Landau's
11 resolution recognizing April as
12 Second Chance Month.

13 Once again, my name is
14 Raheem Douglas. I'm the outreach
15 coordinator of the UNITE HERE
16 Philadelphia Hospitality Academy,
17 and also the Vice President of UNITE
18 HERE Local 274. Let me tell you a
19 story about a man named Chris whom
20 went through one of our training
21 programs and graduated October of
22 2022. He passed testing, receiving
23 a certification, went to the
24 interview, secure a offer letter for

1 one of our big-time employers here
2 in the city.

3 After securing the offer
4 letter of employment, he had to
5 submit a background check. He was a
6 convicted felon, so therefore the
7 company didn't move any further. We
8 didn't stop there though. Spring of
9 2024, we tried with the same
10 company, but a different location.

11 Chris went on another
12 interview; they loved him and
13 therefore offered him a job again.
14 But guess what? Yes, another
15 background check had to be
16 submitted. Once again, after
17 accepting and securing the offer
18 letter, they declined him. Let's
19 just consider this real quick.
20 Imagine completing a program,
21 passing testing, graduating with
22 stackable certificates, and going on
23 an interview where you do so well
24 that the company say, yes, we want

1 to hire you. But the very necessary
2 steps you're taking to better your
3 condition is still being held back
4 from your past trouble conditions.
5 I wish I can go longer but I want to
6 keep these conversations going.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

8 Thank you.

9 SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: State
10 your name, for the record.

11 MS. PARKER: Yes, thank
12 you.

13 Yes. Good afternoon,
14 Council President and members of
15 council. My name's Kate Parker. I
16 am the Director of Policy at the
17 Defender Association of
18 Philadelphia. Chief Defender Hudson
19 asked me to offer public comment
20 today to thank you all for declaring
21 April Second Chances month, and for
22 your continued efforts to ensure
23 Philadelphians who have been
24 entangled with the criminal legal

1 system have an opportunity to put
2 their past behind them, and to be
3 evaluated truly on their merits when
4 applying for work.

5 The Philadelphia's Fair
6 Chance Hiring Initiative already has
7 made strides towards breaking the
8 cycle of incarceration, but we
9 strongly support collaborative
10 efforts led by Councilmember Landau
11 to make the ordinance even stronger.
12 As many of you are aware, our offer
13 -- our office with the support of
14 grant funding has recently launched
15 our first formal re-entry program,
16 Bridge Home. We're proud -- we're
17 proud to announce we actively are
18 serving over a dozen people. And
19 while they are all individuals who
20 have individual needs, they face
21 systemic barriers.

22 I also would be remiss if I
23 didn't remind Council that we are
24 asking for money in our budget this

1 year to support similar programming
2 for young people exiting the
3 detention center or placements.

4 Thank you very much for your support
5 of our neighbors, our clients, our
6 family members, and our community.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

8 Thank you.

9 SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: State
10 your name, for the record.

11 MS. MAZZELLA: Silvana
12 Mazzella, Lead Executive Officer at
13 Prevention Point Philadelphia. I'm
14 here today because I'm really
15 wanting to thank the Council for all
16 the work you do and the difficult
17 decisions you make for the city.
18 I'm very proud and honored to
19 support Councilmember O'Rourke's
20 resolution to honor our SEPTA
21 workers. We have people that are
22 extremely hardworking, brave and
23 transport thousands of employees and
24 students all across the city helping

1 our economy. It's also a green
2 alternative to car driving.

3 We want to also support a
4 very modest percentage of the
5 general fund budget going into a
6 Transit Access Fund. The Zero Fare
7 program would be expanded through
8 this. We have seen people benefit
9 from this, some of our most
10 vulnerable citizens who can't get to
11 healthcare or volunteer events or
12 other things without the Zero Fare
13 program. And also to support
14 expansion of the SEPTA Key program.
15 We know many employees throughout
16 the city that benefit from that
17 transit subsidy.

18 I also wanted to talk for
19 a minute about the mobile ordinance.
20 Also a very difficult choice, and we
21 totally understand why a mobile
22 ordinance is needed and there needs
23 to be regulation. There are a few
24 parts of this bill that are very

1 concerning, including, first of all,
2 the 45-minute requirement. To only
3 be able to provide medical care for
4 45 minutes would barely allow a
5 clinic to see one to two patients.
6 It wouldn't allow for time to do all
7 of the other referrals to additional
8 types of medical care or social
9 services, potentially employment
10 linkage or something else.

11 Additionally, the
12 locations. There's a statement
13 about other locations. We would ask
14 that the city through the Health
15 Department and others determine
16 locations that have high rates of
17 HIV infection, spikes in HIV, and
18 spikes in fatal and non-fatal
19 overdose, and decide those locations
20 based on that. Finally, most
21 clinics are required to give 60 days
22 notice to patients about any change
23 in location or any change in a
24 service provider. And we think that

1 there needs to be a minimum of that
2 to be able to get patients to in
3 building or other locations.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
5 Thank you.

6 THE CHIEF CLERK: We have
7 -- we have Vivian Chang, Benita
8 Williams, William Lawrence, may Paul
9 Birdsong, Chris Safa, Dr. Linda
10 Stern, and Amy Stefan also make
11 their way to the podium.

12 MS. CHANG: Hello, my name
13 is Vivian Chang, Executive Director
14 of Asian Americans United, and I'm
15 proud to support Councilmember
16 Nicholas O'Rourke's resolution
17 honoring SEPTA workers. They're
18 unsung heroes who ensure our buses,
19 trolleys, subways, and rail lines
20 are accessible.

21 And as a former union
22 member myself, unions make the world
23 go round. As frontline workers,
24 many transit employees lost their

1 lives during their pandemic and they
2 still face safety concerns today.
3 SEPTA is a lifeline for so many of
4 us, and that's why we have to do
5 right by workers and riders. So
6 supporting this resolution and
7 supporting Councilmember O'Rourke's
8 legislation to create a Transit
9 Access fund that will help safety on
10 SEPTA is a big issue. And a lot of
11 that can be improved by helping
12 everyone who needs it to get equal
13 access to transit.

14 The Zero Fare program and
15 SEPTA Key advantage for employees
16 have been secured for one more year,
17 but we need a long-term solution.
18 So a legislation like this would
19 lock in those gains and ensure
20 ongoing access, because it's not
21 just about, you know, getting
22 everyone to the right places on
23 right time, but it's helping our
24 most vulnerable residents. It's a

1 smart investment and SEPTA needs it.

2 Thank you.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

4 Thank you.

5 MR. BIRDSONG: Paul

6 Birdsong. I'm going to try to make
7 this fast as possible because of the
8 time limit. On behalf of the
9 Panther Party for Self-Defense, we
10 support 250348. Things like
11 Pennsylvania Act 135 are not
12 uncommon in large cities around the
13 United States or under the influence
14 of developers who don't care about
15 our people and Black communities
16 target for redevelopment with
17 ethically horrific and technically
18 illegal means.

19 As is stated in our
20 10-point program, we want an
21 immediate end to redline,
22 monopolies, ethnic cleansing,
23 genocidal gentrification, and the
24 disenfranchisement and theft of

1 vulnerable historically black
2 communities. Also on my face and my
3 hand, I bear cuts and bruises I've
4 acquired via my work in the
5 community. No badge, nobody armor,
6 no walkie-talkie, no funding, just a
7 combination of concern and a feeling
8 of obligation to stand up and
9 protect the black community that I
10 live in and that I represent.

11 The PA chapter of the
12 Panther Party for Self-Defense calls
13 upon the 5,021 police officers and
14 the 2,283 nonprofits of Philadelphia
15 currently being paid and given
16 resources to do what we are doing
17 without any of that to meet us in
18 the streets and help us save the
19 community, the Black community of
20 Philadelphia. All power to the
21 people. Also, this Saturday at
22 2:00 p.m., we invite everybody to
23 come to the Panther Party cookout.
24 We got free groceries for you, we

1 got free barbecue chicken for you,
2 free community resources, and free
3 reading program for the children.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

5 Mr. Birdsong, also I know you've
6 been advocating around the forensic
7 lab and the young lady who has the
8 bill will be having a hearing if you
9 want to get a briefing on it when
10 that bill becomes -- before the bill
11 is coming to the floor and becomes
12 the law, because there has been a
13 long process. Councilmember Jamie
14 Gauthier, I just want to point our
15 out to that we did accomplish
16 getting the forensic lab done
17 because I know you've been
18 advocating for it.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

20 Please begin, ma'am.

21 MS. SAFA: Yeah. My name's
22 Chris Safa. Thank you. Good
23 morning, everybody. It's good to
24 see you. And I want to thank

1 Councilman Harrity for introducing
2 the Healthy Outdoor Public Spaces
3 resolution to get that enforced.

4 And then we also have to thank
5 Councilmember Cindy Bass whose law
6 this was.

7 The Healthy Outdoor Public
8 Spaces law was passed because toxic
9 herbicides were the go-to for land
10 management, even though safer
11 options existed. And we've seen
12 what happens when outdated unsafe
13 practices go unchecked. When I was
14 a girl, you probably remember this,
15 we went camping and the DDT truck
16 would drive through and all the kids
17 would run out and play in the clouds
18 of DDT pretending we were angels.
19 And you would say, well, why did our
20 parents let us do this? Because
21 they were told it was safe. And
22 later we were told that cigarettes
23 were safe, and we were told that
24 lead paint was safe.

1 And I've been teaching
2 people how to use these chemicals in
3 their home gardens, and now I've
4 been told that I have three kinds of
5 cancer and I'm okay, but we're here
6 because we would like this law
7 enforced. And all over the country,
8 other cities are doing this.

9 New York City has 11 pilot
10 parks, Drexel University in Jamie
11 Gauthier's District just became the
12 first school in Pennsylvania to have
13 organic land management, joining
14 Harvard and other schools throughout
15 the country.

16 Right across the street,
17 you probably heard of this, in our
18 Philadelphia Court System, \$2
19 billion was awarded and then 70
20 million. I'm going to cut short.
21 Thank you very much.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
23 Thank you.

24 MS. LISA: Good afternoon.

1 My name is Lisa Bonitatibus. I'm in
2 support of the resolution to hold
3 hearings on the enforcement of the
4 Healthy Outdoor Public Spaces
5 ordinance. I'll keep this short.
6 My full comments should be on your
7 desk. 12 years ago I was diagnosed
8 with Stage 3 breast cancer. I'm now
9 Stage 4, which is incurable. All we
10 can do at this point is try to stop
11 throwing gas on the fire, and that's
12 why I'm here today.

13 Most oncologists will tell
14 you that the cancer wasn't your
15 fault, it wasn't anything you did,
16 don't blame yourself, it was just
17 bad luck. But my surgeon was the
18 only doctor who told it like it was.
19 She said, my kind of breast cancer
20 estrogen receptor-positive by far
21 the most common type was almost
22 certainly caused by environmental
23 factors and not genetics.

24 I was the first of my

1 family to have cancer, so what
2 happened to me? Environmental
3 factors, which include diet and
4 lifestyle, and most importantly, the
5 many, many synthetic endocrine
6 disruptors which come from the
7 petrochemicals found in plastics,
8 cosmetic products, laundry
9 detergents, household cleaners, and
10 of course pesticides. Most
11 estrogenic breast cancers are caused
12 by endocrine disrupting chemicals
13 like 2,4-D and glyphosate. Our body
14 is like a bucket. It can hold a
15 certain amount of insults.

16 You can run behind the DDT
17 -- DDT truck and get away with it
18 just as long as you don't fill your
19 bucket to overflowing. Thank you
20 for listening to me. My oncologist
21 says we should not be spraying.

22 THE CHIEF CLERK: We have
23 Linda Stern, Amy Stephen, Sophia
24 Dantzic, Kelsey Leone, Jarret

1 Johnson, Daniel Abramov, and Sam
2 Piper also make their way to the
3 podium.

4 MS. STERN: Okay. My name
5 is Dr. Linda Stern and I'm speaking
6 on behalf of the resolution to
7 enforce the healthy outdoor public
8 space law. Most of my medical
9 career was served at the
10 Philadelphia Veterans Affairs
11 Medical Center. I treated many
12 veterans who were exposed to the
13 herbicide Agent Orange, they
14 sickened and died.

15 The Philadelphia Parks
16 Department still sprays the
17 herbicide 2,4-D, one of the two
18 active ingredients in Agent Orange
19 and glyphosate. We know these
20 chemicals have high associations
21 with many diseases, including
22 non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, Parkinson's
23 disease, they cause DNA damage, and
24 asthma. Philadelphia has one of the

1 highest asthma rates in the country.
2 A couple of take homes since I know
3 I have to go short, there are no
4 safe levels of herbicides, even
5 small amounts are dangerous. And
6 the park's myth that they can spray
7 and it would be safe 24 to 72 hours
8 later is not true.

9 These herbicides linger in
10 the soil where our children play.
11 Children, pregnant women, and
12 especially the applicators who spray
13 are the most vulnerable. And I'll
14 just conclude with one study from
15 the University of Washington that
16 showed a 40 percent increase of
17 non-Hodgkin's lymphoma with exposure
18 to these pesticides. And of that
19 study, 54,000 subjects were the
20 appliers of the pesticide.

21 MS. STEFFEN: Hi. Thank
22 you, Council President for the
23 opportunity to comment. My name is
24 Amy Steffen, and I support the

1 resolution from Councilmember
2 Harrity calling for hearings into
3 compliance with the Healthy Outdoor
4 Public Spaces law. You know, I've
5 seen these chemicals sprayed in the
6 park when people are walking by and
7 around ball courts where people --
8 kids throw their jackets and nobody
9 knows they're even there. But since
10 I've seen those things,
11 Councilmember Bass introduced the
12 Healthy Outdoor Public Spaces bill
13 and it was passed unanimously by you
14 over four years ago.

15 Unfortunately, we need
16 these hearings because the city
17 doesn't seem to be following the
18 law. In 2022, over 16 tons of the
19 prohibited chemicals were sprayed on
20 the park. In 2023, over 15 tons
21 were sprayed, and in 2024, at least
22 13 tons were sprayed, all in
23 violation of the law. You have my
24 full comments, but just one thing,

1 when you hear, oh, we've tried
2 organic products, that's kind of a
3 red herring because most cities are
4 just returning to mechanical means
5 like mowing and weed whacking for
6 most of these things. These are
7 safe jobs for people instead of
8 unsafe jobs. Thank you so much.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

10 Thank you.

11 MS. DANTZIC: Hello, City
12 Council Members. My name is Sophia
13 Dantzic. I'm a harm reductionist.
14 I'm here today to mourn the death of
15 Joshua Mister who died in a cell on
16 April 3rd at the 24th and 25th
17 Police district precinct, the same
18 site where the Wellness Court
19 proceedings occur every Wednesday.
20 Members of this council have
21 referred to Leslie Gabor's
22 excruciating testimony after the
23 loss of her brother Joey Gabor, as a
24 reason, they feel moved to care

1 about what happens to drug users who
2 are incarcerated.

3 Unfortunately, Leslie's
4 vulnerability here did not bring
5 justice. Although she was
6 immediately put in touch with John
7 Christmas from the Council
8 President's office, and although she
9 spoke with him more than once, every
10 time she said she was forced to
11 recount what gruesome details she
12 knew and was asked to speculate on
13 what she thought happened to her
14 brother.

15 Every time, somehow it was
16 as though she were talking for the
17 first time. She says, I would
18 rather he hadn't engaged me at all.
19 I felt humiliated, he knew nothing
20 about me and my family. Crucially,
21 there was no offer of support.

22 Why do we keep coming back
23 up here to mourn the loss of drug
24 users in custody? Because Leslie's

1 bravery and vulnerability are
2 admirable, but absolutely should not
3 be necessary for politicians to act.
4 To recount that pain to an
5 unresponsive political body
6 represent -- replicates the same
7 inhumanity that their loved ones
8 confronted in the face of an
9 inhumane system. We keep coming
10 here to publicly mourn because
11 families of people who use drugs,
12 current drug users, and people in
13 recovery are grateful for it and
14 encourage us to do so.

15 And truthfully, we're not
16 speaking to you, we're speaking to
17 them. Whether using or not, whether
18 connected to family or not, drug
19 users deserve to live. There are
20 people who have and will die
21 preventable deaths in prison custody
22 without anyone to mourn them, that
23 doesn't mean that their lives were
24 disposable. Meanwhile, this Council

1 seems to have plenty of resources to
2 devote to policing exactly when and
3 where folks can receive services.

4 May Joshua's memory be for
5 a blessing and may we all be moved
6 towards empathy in his honor.

7 MS. ANDREAL: My name is
8 Kateri Lee Andreal and I am here to
9 speak against the mobile ordinance
10 proposed by Councilwoman Lozada.
11 I'm a harm reductionist, a street
12 medic, and a person in recovery.
13 Councilwoman Lozada has not been shy
14 about her disdain for people like
15 me, even though I have reversed
16 dozens of overdoses in her district
17 this year alone.

18 The mobile service
19 legislation targets mobile service
20 providers, but they're not the only
21 ones who disrupt the day-to-day
22 operations in a neighborhood.
23 Churches, community centers,
24 schools, block parties all disrupt

1 neighborhood operations, but they're
2 not subject to this legislation.

3 This bill is a naked
4 attempt to target and penalize harm
5 reductionists like myself. What
6 does it say that the -- that the
7 Councilwoman has spent her time and
8 energy restricting mobile service
9 providers rather than simply putting
10 in more trash cans or public
11 bathrooms in her district

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
13 The Chair recognizes Councilmember
14 Lozada, would you still like the
15 floor?

16 COUNCILMEMBER LOZADA: No,
17 I'm -- I'm fine, Councilmember --
18 Council President.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
20 The Chair recognizes Councilmember
21 Bass.

22 COUNCILMEMBER BASS: Thank
23 you, Mr. President. I just wanted
24 to point out, I think it's okay to

1 have a difference of opinion. But
2 to say that there's a disdain
3 because there is a difference of
4 opinion is not appropriate and that
5 it's -- it's okay to agree to
6 disagree on how to address a
7 problem, but to say that someone has
8 a disdain for you because they
9 disagree with you is not the way to
10 go. It's not the way to make
11 progress. Thank you, Mr. President.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

13 Thank you. Please resume.

14 THE CHIEF CLERK: We have
15 Jared Johnson, Daniel Abramov, Sam
16 Piper. May Aileen Callaghan, Lee
17 Thomas, Wick Savage, Mark Clancy,
18 Sonia Sanders and Steve Masters make
19 their way to the podium.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

21 Please begin.

22 MR. JOHNSON: Good
23 afternoon. My name is Jared
24 Johnson. I am a transit organizer

1 for 5th Square. I'm here today to
2 speak in support of the Transit
3 Access Fund introduced by
4 Councilmember O'Rourke in the Zero
5 Fare program. When the pilot
6 program was launched, it became a
7 huge relief for residents that take
8 public transit who are vulnerable
9 and live under the poverty level and
10 low income.

11 When we heard that Mayor
12 Parker was trying to get rid of it,
13 we were shocked and we took
14 immediate action as members of 5th
15 Square and residents voiced our
16 concerns and opinions. And thanks
17 to our fight and voices, our
18 concern, the mayor -- Mayor Parker
19 decided to keep the -- keep the
20 program for one more year, but we
21 want it to become permanently.

22 So with this, it will gain
23 more access to these commuters and
24 ensure ongoing access. It's not

1 about helping our most vulnerable
2 residents or living below the
3 poverty level, it's a smart
4 investment for SEPTA itself and a
5 moment when the system needs stable
6 ridership and support.

7 So please help us in this
8 fight and pass the resolution. And
9 then on one level -- and on one
10 personal note on the -- for the
11 rally that was happening two weeks
12 ago, we thank every city
13 Councilmember that came up -- that
14 came out and supported us. And
15 that's it.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
17 Thank you, sir.

18 MS. PIPER: Hello, my name
19 is Sam Piper. I'm a community
20 organizer with Positive Women's
21 Network. We're an organization for
22 and by women living with HIV.

23 I'm here to speak about
24 Bill No. 246665, Councilwoman

1 Lozada's mobile service provider
2 ban. I'm a harm reductionist and
3 from my standpoint, this bill poses
4 serious dangers because it
5 prioritizes aesthetics, control and
6 punishment over public health,
7 safety and dignity, especially for
8 people who use drugs and rely on
9 mobile outreach for lifesaving
10 services, and here's why:

11 It treats people who use
12 drugs as public threats, not people
13 in need of care. The language of
14 this bill paints service recipients
15 as dangerous nuisances. It even
16 says phrases like, nuisance and
17 criminal activity, and it blames
18 residents trauma on exposure to
19 people who are receiving these
20 services in order to stay alive. It
21 erects impossible barriers for
22 non-medical providers.

23 The 45-minute time limit
24 plus the one-block a day rule makes

1 it nearly impossible for outreach
2 organizations to maintain consistent
3 particular routes, and because of
4 this HIV and Hep C rates will
5 continue to rise.

6 I have a lot more to say,
7 but I see my time is running out.
8 The bottom line is this bill may
9 have been amended from a total ban
10 and I appreciate that and thank you
11 for working with me on that, but it
12 still operates from a framework of
13 control and punishment, not health
14 and humanity in the name of dignity
15 for one group, it's just -- it
16 strips dignity for another.

17 People will not stop
18 needing care just because it's
19 harder to provide, but they may die
20 trying to find it.

21 MR. ABRAMOV: Hello,
22 everyone. My name is Daniel
23 Abramov. I'm here to explain why I
24 strongly oppose the 665 Mobile Harm

1 Reduction bill. I wouldn't be here
2 speaking if it wasn't for harm
3 reduction. I've overdosed many
4 times and, you know, it's because of
5 Harm Reduction mobile services and,
6 you know, the different programs
7 that I'm still here and alive. And
8 the language in the bill --

9 SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Speak
10 right into the mic.

11 MR. ABRAMOV: The language
12 in the bill is very vague on
13 purpose, which is going to cause
14 more lives than save them. And I
15 might not care about my life, but my
16 family and a lot of people care
17 about me. That's all I have to say.
18 Thank you.

19 MS. CALLAGHAN: Thank you,
20 everyone. My name is Aileen
21 Callaghan. I live at Allegheny and
22 Jasper in Kensington, and I'm the
23 mother of an 11-year-old son. Every
24 day when I take my son to school, I

1 take Kensington and Allegheny, and
2 every day I see people that my son
3 can't tell if that they are alive or
4 dead. They're laying on the steps,
5 he can't tell if they're alive.
6 They're laying on the sidewalks, he
7 can't tell if they're alive.

8 What would reduce the
9 trauma that my son experiences on a
10 daily basis is not a mobilization
11 ban or permitting system. What
12 would protect my son is the billions
13 of dollars that the city receives to
14 address the opioid crisis, so you
15 put to the best use possible. Fully
16 funded overdose prevention centers.

17 The abandoned -- the
18 abandoned buildings, which there are
19 many in my community are actually
20 already being used as DIY centers.
21 There is no justification for us to
22 not use these centers to keep more
23 people alive each and every day. I
24 do want my -- I do not want my son

1 to think that the city of
2 Philadelphia thinks that if you live
3 outside, your life doesn't matter.
4 That's the message my son gets. He
5 deserves better. Our city deserves
6 better. Thank you.

7 SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: State
8 your name for the record, please.

9 MR. THOMAS: Good
10 afternoon. My name is Lee Thomas,
11 President of Philadelphia Black
12 Pride. I'm here speaking on behalf
13 of the resolution to have Black
14 Pride named this week. I stand on
15 the shoulders of the late Michael
16 Henson, Dorena Kearney, Chris
17 Alston, and Jeremy Taylor.

18 Just as my vice president
19 just mentioned, it is important that
20 we honor those people while they are
21 still here. He said a lot of things
22 that I was going to say, so I'll
23 just fast forward that our theme for
24 this year is, love is love.

1 And what we are looking for
2 and what we want you to take from
3 this weekend is to take what you
4 need to fill your mind, body, and
5 spirit. We have a whole list of
6 events that we are celebrating and
7 we hope that we are able to reach as
8 many people so that you then can
9 turn and join in this work with us.
10 Thank you.

11 THE CHIEF CLERK: We have
12 Wick Savage, Mark Clancy, Sonia
13 Sanders, Steve Masters. May Robert
14 Harris, Jordan Ford, Wanda Walker,
15 Andy Feltzen and Ashley Miscavich
16 also make their way to the podium.

17 MR. SAVAGE: Good
18 afternoon, President, City Council.
19 I'm here representing the city of
20 Philadelphia. I first support Bill
21 250348 because we have to stop the
22 slick lawyers. I have other
23 subjects I'd like to talk about at
24 this moment.

1 My dear friend Councilwoman
2 Cindy Bass states quite often, "The
3 shooter is sleeping with you."

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
5 I want to stay on topic, Mr. Savage.
6 You asked for Act 135, Special
7 Committee, so could we stick with --
8 remain to the topic, sir?

9 MR. SAVAGE: Yes, we can,
10 Council President. But this also
11 has to do with residents living in
12 this city. We cannot have young
13 people shooting and murdering
14 77-year-old men, adults, seniors,
15 because they just went to work.
16 This should be an all-out bulletin
17 and reward for these individuals.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
19 I'm working on being
20 consistent, sir. So I want you to
21 stick to the topic of Act 135,
22 Special Committee has nothing to do
23 with gun violence, sir.

24 MR. SAVAGE: Well, I beg

1 the difference. If people are out
2 of their homes, if people homeless,
3 it affects that kind of behavior
4 because they're desperate. And
5 until we get our arms around this
6 silly, unnecessary violence, I don't
7 care how many homes you build, we
8 won't be safe in the city of
9 Philadelphia.

10 MR. MASTERS: Good
11 afternoon, members of Council.
12 Steve Masters from JustLaws. I'm
13 here to appreciate Cindy Bass for
14 the legislation 250274, and to give
15 you just a little backstory,
16 encroachments sound like we're just
17 talking about the physical things
18 going on with the Streets
19 Department.

20 This is for Rittenhouse
21 Soundworks. It's an iconic company
22 that provides sound equipment, sound
23 studios in Germantown, extremely
24 popular. They put some planters out

1 to beautify the street and also to
2 stop cars from parking on on their
3 property, and we needed an
4 encroachment legislation.

5 Councilwoman Bass was able
6 to put together the legislation in
7 record time and move it forward. We
8 really appreciate all the help that
9 you did, and the neighbors are
10 thrilled that we're going to have
11 the planters legalized. Thank you.

12 MR. HARRIS: Good
13 afternoon, Council President and
14 members of City Council. My name is
15 Robert Harris. I'm the Vice
16 President of AFSCME District Council
17 47. I'm here to speak in support of
18 the SEPTA Unsung Heroes Resolution
19 and accompanied legislation because
20 very much like our AFSCME members,
21 our union siblings at TWU Local 234
22 and SMART Local 1594 make
23 Philadelphia happen.

24 AFSCME city workers are

1 happy to see that the Zero Fare
2 program and SEPTA Key advantage for
3 employees have been secured for
4 another year in a time when our
5 collective bargaining units have a
6 combined vacancy rate of close to 30
7 percent. It is a major tool for
8 recruitment and retention, while
9 providing much needed funds for
10 SEPTA and reducing congestion
11 population -- pollution and traffic
12 crashes.

13 We fully support
14 Councilmember O'Rourke's resolution
15 calling on the creation of a Transit
16 Access Fund to ensure that our
17 funding for these important programs
18 continue and ask that all of council
19 vote in the affirmative. Please
20 stand with District Council 47 and
21 our siblings at 33, and our ability
22 to continue to negotiate strong
23 benefits for our members, continue
24 funding for SEPTA and much needed

1 support for low-income
2 Philadelphians to travel, to work,
3 to worship, and to participate in
4 the economy of Philadelphia. Thank
5 you.

6 MR. FORD: Good afternoon.
7 My name is Jordan Ford. Good
8 afternoon, Council President, and
9 Council members, and thank you to
10 Councilmember O'Rourke for your
11 leadership on the legislation of the
12 Zero Fare for for SEPTA.

13 My name is Jordan Ford. I
14 serve as a civic engagement manager
15 at the Pennsylvania Immigration
16 Coalition. We work with immigrant
17 communities across Philadelphia who
18 contribute to the city everyday as
19 workers, parents, neighbors, and
20 small business owners.

21 For many of those
22 residents, public transportation is
23 the only way to get to work, school,
24 medical appointments or to engage in

1 civic life. But even a few dollars
2 a day in fares can be a significant
3 barrier for low-income immigrant
4 families.

5 Our coalition members have
6 heard directly from people who have
7 to choose between paying for transit
8 and buying groceries, or from young
9 people who miss out on opportunities
10 because they can't afford the ride.
11 We urge you to support this
12 legislation and be a firm
13 Philadelphia's commitment to equity
14 inclusion and the vital role
15 immigrants play in our communities.
16 Thank you.

17 And for more information

21 MS. WALKER: Good
22 afternoon, beautiful people. My
23 name is Wanda Walker, and as always
24 I'll be talking about generational

1 wealth. I'm going to stay on the
2 bills, the topics, I'm going to go
3 with O'Neill's bill which states
4 that the parking meters -- and
5 that's bill number -- which bill is
6 it? 271. So I agree with that
7 bill.

8 I also agree that we need
9 to do something about the parking
10 authority tickets since we were
11 talking about having tenant's
12 evictions sealed after seven years,
13 maybe we could have tickets sealed
14 or dropped off after seven years
15 because that's really ridiculous.

16 I want to make some points
17 in reference to what's going on. A
18 lot of us aren't understanding a lot
19 that's being said. And so with --
20 you're listing a lot of properties
21 that are being given away by the
22 Land Bank but that's not on this.
23 We've asked before for transparent
24 language so that we understand what

1 is being said. Maybe we need to
2 have a board so that some -- we can
3 understand what's actually going on
4 because a lot isn't being divulged
5 on the papers that are being handed
6 out.

7 And I would like to also
8 have a senior safety bill presented.
9 I brought today -- brought with me
10 today a lawyer that presented a bill
11 and he's coming up after me and I'm
12 hoping that you all adopt it. Thank
13 you.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
15 Thank you.

16 THE CHIEF CLERK: We also
17 have Andy Phelps, Ashley
18 Misceovich, May David Alexander
19 Jenkins, Ogbonna Hagins, Junior
20 Brainard, Seamus Tyler and Sultan
21 Smalley also make their way to the
22 podium.

23 MR. PHELPS: Good
24 afternoon. My name is Andy

1 Phelpsen. I'm here for two reasons.
2 The first is I would like to support
3 Rue Landau's Bill 250343. I'm a
4 lawyer who generally represents
5 landlords during evictions and even
6 I'm in favor of sealing records
7 after seven years. Bit of a
8 biochemistry nerd. After seven
9 years all the cells in your body
10 have divided and you're technically
11 a different person.

12 So it does not make sense
13 that a eviction or a painful
14 reminder should follow you in
15 perpetuity. I hope the Council
16 Members will support that bill.

17 The other reason I'm here
18 is I've penned an open letter to
19 Philadelphia City Council regarding
20 proposed changes to section 9-3901
21 and 9-3903 and proposed ordinance
22 changes regarding certificates of
23 rental suitability. The reason
24 being that I think that the

1 penalties serve as way too much of a
2 deterrent and are grossly unfair to
3 the landlord/tenant process. I
4 would urge the committee to please
5 read my open letter.

6 Please read the proposed
7 ordinance changes and if agreed with
8 that someone in this committee would
9 formally sponsor my changes. Thank
10 you very much and have a wonderful
11 day.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
13 Thank you.

14 MS. MISCEVICH: Good
15 afternoon, members of City Council.
16 Ashley Misceovich from the Chamber of
17 Commerce for Greater Philadelphia
18 testifying on resolution 250353.

19 I'm here today to urge your
20 help to call on our state
21 legislators to secure critical
22 funding for SEPTA. Without action,
23 SEPTA will be forced to implement 45
24 percent service cuts and raise fares

1 21 percent, a crisis that would
2 threaten the economic future of our
3 city and region.

4 Approximately 400,000
5 commuters rely on SEPTA daily. For
6 many, SEPTA is their only access to
7 transportation. When employers
8 can't fill jobs that have been cut
9 off from the workers, they will soon
10 take those jobs out of the region,
11 reduce service and increased fares,
12 widen economic disparities and
13 hinder the city's progress towards
14 equitable growth. A diverse
15 accessible workforce is crucial for
16 our competitiveness in the global
17 market.

18 If SEPTA's doomsday plan
19 takes effect, we will witness the
20 dismantling of our transit system
21 and the subsequent contraction of
22 our city. The Chamber of Commerce
23 and our diverse member companies
24 stand ready to work with the city

1 elected leaders to fund our transit
2 system. Thank you so much for your
3 time today.

4 MR. JENKINS:

5 Mr. President, members and
6 guests of chamber, David Alexander
7 Jenkins.

8 I rise in firm support of
9 resolution 250343 calling under
10 Pennsylvania General Assembly to
11 pass the ready to rent act. We in
12 this chamber know that nearly one in
13 four renters in Philadelphia, more
14 than 140,000 individuals carry an
15 eviction record.

16 Many of these are not the
17 result of formal judgments, but they
18 remain permanent black marks on the
19 characters of our brethren. Locking
20 citizenry out of housing, crudely
21 and mercilessly denying them access
22 to rudimentary stability.

23 They're ready to rent
24 actual automatically seal most

1 eviction records giving our
2 constituents the second chance that
3 they deserve. In a city noted for
4 its 10 percent increase in unhoused
5 individuals and 38 percent increase
6 in unsheltered neighbors, this is
7 not merely a piece of housing crisis
8 that we face, brothers and sisters
9 of love. It is a matter of justice,
10 a matter of safety, and a matter of
11 public health.

12 Let us unanimously urge our
13 colleagues in Harrisburg, however,
14 not to stop here but to pursue the
15 legislation referred to in committee
16 on the Urban Affairs and Housing
17 over a year ago outlined in Senator
18 Cappelletti's and Dillon's Bill
19 1095.

20 Legislation that caps the
21 rent increase above 10 percent per
22 year and existing lease holders at
23 50 percent per annum for new
24 renters. No family should be forced

1 out of their house by predatory
2 pricing, not in a country withholds
3 to life, liberty and the pursuit of
4 happiness therein as a tenant of
5 inalienable rights. Not in a
6 commonwealth bound to principles of
7 integrity nor in a city aptly named
8 for brotherly love.

9 May this chamber lead
10 through charity and conviction with
11 a resounding voice pro this
12 resolution in a valiant pursuit of a
13 city where housing is not a
14 privilege but a promise and a
15 commitment to all.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
17 Thank you.

18 MR. HAGINS: Before I
19 start, there's like seven members of
20 Council that are not here which is
21 disrespectful. Respect goes both
22 ways. When I look at this
23 resolution for the tush push, it's
24 clear that it's not about the

1 children. It's an obvious
2 misappropriation of time, focus and
3 money. A tush push resolution?
4 What a tangled web we weave, a
5 cautionary reminder of the
6 consequences of dishonesty. The
7 Philadelphia Reparations Task Force
8 is a disrespectful entity. A tush
9 push resolution?

10 This task force has been
11 performative -- is performative
12 politics, a ploy to misappropriate
13 and capsize efforts of the freedmen
14 from finishing the work of
15 reconstruction and makes this city
16 and nation, a laughing stock by not
17 dealing with this. Keep the promise
18 of reconstruction. Reconstruction
19 is reparation. As far as I see,
20 there is no task force, nothing has
21 been done. Where is the original
22 president, Breanna Moore?

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

24 Talk about that tush push.

1 MR. HAGINS: Yeah, the tush
2 push thing is crazy. Why hasn't
3 Breanna Moore's departure been made
4 public?

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
6 It's your time, Mr. Ogbonna Hagins

7 MR. HAGINS: Does any
8 council members know about this?
9 The tush push resolution?

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
11 Thank you, sir.

12 MR. HAGINS: And the
13 unseated council president --

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
15 Thank you, sir. There's only one
16 president at a time. Thank you,
17 sir. Thank you, sir. Thank you
18 sir. Thank you sir. Thank you.

19 MR. BRAINARD: Hello. I'm
20 here to speak in opposition to bill
21 240665. I have worked over eight
22 years to promote public awareness
23 and prevention efforts, combating
24 the ongoing HIV epidemic in

1 Philadelphia. In my time doing this
2 work and volunteering with Harm
3 Reduction outreach, I've come to
4 understand the biggest obstacles
5 that stand in the way of ending
6 these crises is the power of stigma
7 and the systemic failures to provide
8 basic needs such as healthcare and
9 housing to those at risk.

10 In Philly, our rate of new
11 HIV infections is higher than
12 national average. And last year we
13 saw a recorded 1,122 unintentional
14 overdose deaths. These numbers are
15 a reflection of how stigma and
16 systemic failure leads us to
17 continue to struggle despite having
18 the tools necessary to prevent HIV
19 infection and overdose deaths.

20 These numbers are also decreasing,
21 which is a testament to the efforts
22 of those providers on the frontline.

23 Vehicular Mobile Service
24 providers exist today as a critical

1 response to an unprecedented public
2 health emergency. As an epicenter
3 of the opioid crisis, Philadelphia
4 is like the canary in the cold mine
5 where we succeed and where we fail,
6 it ripples far beyond the 7th
7 District.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
9 There's time, sir. Thank you very
10 much.

11 MR. BRAINARD: I implore
12 the council to honor the factual
13 evidence behind harm reduction
14 impact on public health. Don't
15 restrict these services. Look
16 beyond stigma. Place your efforts
17 into organizing true partnership
18 that supports public health
19 wellbeing for all community members.

20 MR. SMALLEY: Hello. My
21 name is Sultan Smalley and I'm a
22 student at the Community College of
23 Philadelphia, and I'm proud to
24 support Councilmember O'Rourke's

1 resolution honoring SEPTA workers.
2 SEPTA keeps Philadelphia moving.
3 Public transportation is a necessity
4 for working class people and
5 protecting our environment, and
6 that's why I also support his
7 legislation to create a transit
8 access fund.

9 So we need a long-term
10 funding source for the Zero Fair
11 Program and SEPTA key advantage and
12 I know the importance of keeping
13 public transportation affordable and
14 accessible for working people
15 because I've spent the past few
16 months with my fellow students and
17 professors from FSFCCP advocating
18 for free SEPTA passes for students
19 and staff.

20 Transit access Fund is not
21 just about helping our most
22 vulnerable residents economically.
23 It's also a way to lower emissions
24 in our city, which has an asthma

1 rate triple that of the national
2 average. Black and brown kids bear
3 the brunt of those hospitalizations.
4 So for the sake of ensuring
5 equitable access to transportation,
6 let's pass this legislation and keep
7 SEPTA funding. Thank you.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
9 Thank you.

10 THE CHIEF CLERK: Council
11 President, there are no further
12 names for public comment.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
14 That concludes today's
15 public comment. We will now
16 consider the bills and resolutions
17 on the second reading and final
18 passes calendars.

19 Will the Clerk please read
20 the title of Resolution No. 250337?

21 THE CHIEF CLERK: A
22 resolution authorizing the
23 Philadelphia Land Bank to dispose of
24 705, 709 and 713 North 35th Street,

1 3712 and 3714 Wallace Street, and
2 3810 Haverford Avenue located in the
3 3rd councilmanic district in
4 accordance with the terms of chapter
5 16-700 of the Philadelphia Code.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
7 The Chair recognizes Councilmember
8 Jamie Gauthier for a motion
9 regarding Resolution No. 250337.

10 COUNCILMEMBER GAUTHIER:
11 Thank you, Council
12 President. I move for the adoption
13 of the resolution.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
15 It has been moved and properly
16 seconded that Resolution No. 250337
17 be adopted.

18 All those in favor of the
19 motion will signify by saying aye.

20 (Aye.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
22 Those opposed? The ayes have it.
23 The motion carries and the
24 resolution is adopted.

1 Will the Clerk please read
2 the title of Resolution No. 250339?

3 THE CHIEF CLERK: A
4 resolution authorizing the Committee
5 on education to create a task force
6 investigating the current state of
7 higher education as this pillar of
8 the Philadelphia regional economy
9 and cultural landscape undergoes
10 general change.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
12 The chair recognizes Councilmember
13 Katherine Gilmore-Richardson for a
14 motion regarding Resolution No.
15 250339 on behalf of Councilmember
16 Isaiah Thomas.

17 COUNCILMEMBER GILMORE-
18 RICHARDSON: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. On behalf of
20 Councilmember Thomas, I move the
21 adoption of the resolution.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
23 It has been moved and properly
24 seconded that Resolution No. 250339

1 be adopted.

2 All those in favor of the
3 motion will signify by saying aye.

4 (Aye.)

18 in the city of Philadelphia,
19 introduced by Councilmember Brooks.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

21 The Chair recognizes Councilmember
22 Brooks for a motion on the
23 resolution.

24 COUNCILMEMBER BROOKS: I

1 move for the adoption of the
2 resolution.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

4 It has been moved and properly

8 COUNCILMEMBER O'ROURKE:
9 Thank you, Mr. President. I move
10 for adoption of the resolution.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
12 It has been moved and properly
13 seconded that the resolution be
14 adopted.

15 All those in favor will
16 signify by saying aye.

17 (Aye.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
19 Those opposed? The ayes have it and
20 the resolution is adopted.

21 Will the Chief Clerk please
22 read the title of the next

24 THE CHIEF CLERK: A

1 privileged resolution honoring the
2 life and legacy of His Holiness Pope
3 Francis, the 266th supreme pontiff
4 of the Roman Catholic Church, known
5 for his commitment to peace, social
6 justice, and humility on the
7 occasion of his passing on April
8 21st, 2025, introduced by
9 Councilmember Driscoll on behalf of
10 Council President Johnson.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
12 Councilmember Driscoll, I may
13 acknowledge you for a motion and
14 we'll take a silent vote.

15 COUNCILMEMBER DRISCOLL: I
16 move for the adoption of the
17 resolution.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
19 Will the Chief Clerk please read the
20 title of the next resolution?

21 THE CHIEF CLERK: A
22 privileged resolution recognizing
23 Monique Moore Pryor's vision,
24 leadership, and unwavering

1 dedication to the Free Library
2 Foundation of Philadelphia and
3 ensuring that the Free Library of
4 Philadelphia remains a beacon of
5 hope, education, and opportunity for
6 all Philadelphians, introduced by
7 Councilmember Bass.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
9 The Chair recognizes Councilmember
10 Bass for a motion on the resolution.

11 COUNCILMEMBER BASS: Thank
12 you, Mr. President. I move for the
13 adoption of the resolution.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
15 It has been moved and properly
16 seconded that the resolution be
17 adopted.

18 All those in favor will
19 signify by saying aye.

20 (Aye.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
22 Those opposed? The ayes have it and
23 the resolution is adopted.

24 Will the Chief Clerk please

1 read the title of the next
2 resolution?

3 THE CHIEF CLERK: Council
4 President, there are no further
5 resolutions in my possession.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
7 Thank you. That completes our
8 calendar for today.

9 Before we give speeches on
10 behalf of the minority and the --
11 and the majority, just a small
12 matter of personal privilege to
13 acknowledge the new hiree for the
14 Office of Veteran Affairs, I want to
15 welcome to our team new director of
16 office of Veteran Affairs,
17 Mr. Gregory Wright. Can you please
18 stand, sir? Born and raised in
19 North Philly. Currently living in
20 Fox Chase. Proud graduate of Girard
21 College. Graduated from -- with a
22 degree from Pierce College in
23 Criminal Justice. Later earned his
24 MBA from Eastern University.

1 Also, a former Philadelphia
2 police officer. Served 14 years
3 with the Pennsylvania National Guard
4 as a sergeant, E6. His service
5 included a deployment to the Middle
6 East during the COVID-19 pandemic
7 where he earned the following
8 honors:

9 Army Achievement Medal, the
10 National Defense Service Medal, the
11 Global War on Terrorism Service
12 Medal, the Overseas Service Ribbon,
13 and the Armed Forces Reserve Medal.
14 Being a son of a veteran, I
15 appreciate his hard work and his
16 dedication to a cause that should
17 definitely be supported. And so we
18 thank you for joining. I call us
19 Team Johnson and the Office of
20 Veterans Affairs. Give the brother
21 a round of applause and make sure
22 you get a chance for your staff to
23 meet him. Thank you.

24 I'm going to ask also for

1 brief speeches, if you all would
2 allow it today, just based upon our
3 schedule and we all have other
4 things to do and we know things were
5 kind of rearranged in terms of how
6 we started today. So I'm just
7 asking that level of consideration.
8 So if there are any speeches on
9 behalf of the Minority? The Chair
10 recognizes Councilmember Kendra
11 Brooks.

12 COUNCILMEMBER BROOKS:

13 Thank you, Council President. I
14 just want to take a moment to thank
15 my colleague, Councilmember Rue
16 Landau, for joining me again for
17 officially recognizing this weekend
18 as Philly Black Pride Weekend in
19 Philadelphia.

20 We started this in 2022
21 when I lost a dear friend, Michael
22 Henson, and I introduced a
23 resolution in his honor. And since
24 then I continue to see the impact of

1 his leadership in so many corners of
2 our city.

3 Michael was one of the
4 co-founders of Philadelphia Black
5 Pride. And last night,
6 Councilmember Landau and I hosted a
7 reward ceremony to honor dozens of
8 people who have followed in his
9 footsteps, carrying on to work in
10 Philadelphia Black Pride, as well as
11 multiple organizations that serve
12 and advocate for black queer
13 Philadelphians.

14 I'm so happy and proud to
15 see Michael's legacy is alive and
16 well, and to kick off this weekend
17 to celebrate 26 years of Philly
18 Black Pride. Thank you.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
20 Thank you, Minority Leader Brooks.
21 The Chair recognizes deputy whip of
22 the minority party, Councilmember
23 Nicolas O'Rourke.

24 COUNCILMEMBER O'ROURKE:

1 Thank you, Mr. President.
2 After a long and taxing holy week
3 for any minister, certainly pastors,
4 on Monday, I woke up to the news --
5 devastating news that Pope Francis
6 had transitioned. As you pointed
7 out, Papa Francisco was a steadfast
8 advocate for the poor and the
9 marginalized, emphasizing the
10 church's role in addressing not just
11 social justice, but economic
12 inequality. And not just fighting
13 poverty, but actually recognizing
14 the need to fight wealth.

15 Particularly for me, he was
16 an inspiration. Many ministers keep
17 the tradition of bearing a pectoral
18 cross worn over the heart to remind
19 you of what your cause is, and he
20 wore one that inspired me to copy
21 his and I wear it today in his
22 honor. His teachings on charity and
23 material provision serve as a moral
24 compass, especially in times when

1 government policies undermine the
2 basic needs of our most vulnerable
3 neighbors.

4 That message feels
5 particularly urgent in light of
6 recent federal actions under the
7 Trump administration. Programs that
8 directly supported marginalized
9 communities have been gutted and
10 defunded. Just last week, one such
11 consequence became clear. Federal
12 cuts have jeopardized the future of
13 the Share Food Program, a critical
14 source of nourishment for hundreds
15 of thousands across our region.

16 Francis taught us that
17 justice for the poor requires more
18 than good intentions. It requires
19 material action. As we honor his
20 legacy today, we must also step up
21 to defend the systems that make
22 dignity possible for all. And I say
23 we because the moral lessons that
24 are intended are for more than just

1 pious individuals, they're for
2 nations, they're for communities,
3 they're for cities.

4 One of the ways that we do
5 that right here in Philadelphia is
6 by fighting for equitable access to
7 the essentials, whether that's food
8 or whether that's transportation,
9 which is why today's legislation on
10 transit access and our recognition
11 of SEPTA workers is so deeply
12 aligned with that moral vision.

13 Transit is about more than
14 getting from point A to point B.
15 It's about connecting people to
16 jobs, education, healthcare, and
17 community. Today's legislation to
18 establish the Philadelphia Transit
19 Access Fund is a step toward transit
20 justice, ensuring Philadelphians
21 aren't left behind because they
22 can't afford a fair.

23 At the same time, we're
24 honoring the SEPTA workers who power

1 this city, individuals who show up
2 every day to make sure our families
3 can move safely and reliably,
4 transporting -- supporting transit
5 means, supporting the people who
6 rely on it and the people who make
7 it possible. And we were thankful
8 again to be joined by Anthony Clark,
9 who is a train operator here in our
10 city.

11 Finally, I just wanted to
12 give a little plug for an event my
13 team is hosting this Friday, a
14 community event in Love Park
15 centered around the People's Budget
16 Office installation. This event
17 will include a constituent service
18 table and information on city
19 services. There will be music,
20 there will be food, and
21 opportunities for the public to
22 engage with the budget process. If
23 you're around, come say hi and join
24 us then. Thank you, Mr. President.

1 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

2 Thank you. Any speeches on behalf
3 of the majority? The Chair
4 recognizes Dr. Nina Ahmad.
5 Councilmember.

6 COUNCILMEMBER AHMAD: Thank
7 you, Council President. I will be
8 brief. I rise today to recognize
9 and celebrate two exceptional
10 interns from my office who are
11 wrapping up their service with us,
12 Nusat Tadjreen and Amaya Madarang,
13 while they're not here now because
14 they're in class, I just wanted to
15 make sure my thanks are reflected in
16 the public record.

17 Nusat is graduating this
18 May from Temple University with a
19 degree in public health. And Amaya
20 is graduating from the University of
21 Pennsylvania with a degree in
22 political science and government.
23 Both are now in the job market and
24 any workplace -- any workplace would

1 be lucky to have them.

2 Their impact has been
3 lasting. They have drafted
4 resolutions including the -- Nusat
5 having drafted the International
6 Mother Language Day and Amaya doing
7 a resolution to recognize Dr. Arlene
8 Bennett, the first Black woman to
9 graduate from the University of
10 Pennsylvania Medical School. These
11 contributions speak to their
12 thoughtfulness, talent and
13 commitment to public service.

14 Interns like Nusat and
15 Amaya play a critical role in our
16 work. They bring new energy, sharp
17 insight, and a deep desire to make a
18 difference. Please join me in
19 thanking them for their outstanding
20 service and wishing them all the
21 best in the bright paths ahead.
22 Thank you, Council President.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

24 Thank you. The Chair recognizes

1 Deputy Whip, Councilmember Cindy
2 Bass.

3 COUNCILMEMBER BASS: Thank
4 you, Mr. President. I wanted to
5 speak today in strong support of the
6 resolution that I introduced earlier
7 regarding having our city pension
8 funds, make sure that they uphold
9 the values of transparency,
10 accountability, and fiscal
11 responsibility. Recent developments
12 in El Salvador, most notably the
13 refusal of its President to comply
14 with a unanimous ruling by the
15 United States Supreme Court signals
16 a serious disregard for the rule of
17 law.

18 When a foreign government
19 openly defies our higher court, it
20 causes not only diplomatic concerns,
21 but also tangible financial risk to
22 our pension investments. We cannot,
23 in good conscience, invest the
24 retirement security of our public

1 employees in environments where
2 legal norms are ignored and
3 transparency is lacking.
4 Philadelphia is the birthplace of
5 the constitution and justice and the
6 rule of law are not just ideals
7 here, and they should be our
8 foundation.

9 This resolution directs our
10 pension board to review and where
11 appropriate divest from investments
12 in El Salvador. It's not just the
13 right thing to do, it's the fiscally
14 responsible thing to do. And I also
15 wanted to point out that Governor
16 Pritzker, I just read today from the
17 State of Illinois, also called for
18 the investment -- the divestment of
19 pension funds from the entire state
20 of Illinois to do the same thing, to
21 basically divest from El Salvador.

22 So we will be looking to
23 our partners in the Commonwealth
24 legislative bodies. And also, I

1 remember we did this many, many
2 moons ago with South Africa when we
3 called to divest from South Africa
4 because of apartheid and it worked.
5 It made a difference. And so for
6 those who say it doesn't make a
7 difference, I beg to differ.

8 I also wanted to very
9 briefly recognize and celebrate the
10 remarkable vision, leadership, and
11 unwavering dedication of Monique
12 Moore Pryor, Esquire, a proud
13 Philadelphian and the first
14 Executive Director of the Free
15 Library of Philadelphia Foundation.
16 Since stepping into this historic
17 role in August of 2023.

18 Monique has led with heart,
19 purpose, and an unbelievable
20 unshakeable belief in the power of
21 libraries to transform lives. And
22 we wish her well and offer
23 congratulations and more to come in
24 the future on that, I'm sure. Thank

1 you, Mr. President.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

3 Thank you, Member Bass.

4 The Chair recognizes
5 Councilmember Jeffrey J. Young.

6 COUNCILMEMBER YOUNG: Thank
7 you, Mr. President. Briefly, I just
8 want to thank my colleagues for
9 passing a resolution today to
10 authorize hearings to discuss our
11 rails and cleaning of our rails.

12 As I drive through my
13 district, we have a number of tracks
14 where there's a lot of short dumping
15 and our streets department, and our
16 sanitation department cannot go on
17 those rails to clean it up. And it
18 provides a -- it is a hazard to our
19 community. So I look forward to
20 having that discussion to figure out
21 how we can continue to make our city
22 the safest, cleanest, greenest city
23 in America.

24 I also want to give my

1 condolences to the family of Jibril
2 Abdul Jalil, a.k.a. Butch, formerly
3 known as James Chiles. He is one of
4 the original Cecil B. Moore Freedom
5 Fighters who marched around Girard
6 College for months on end to allow
7 myself and Greg the opportunity to
8 get the great education that we did.
9 So I want to give my condolences to
10 his family as well.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

12 Thank you very much.

13 The Chair recognizes
14 Councilman Quetcy Lozada.

15 COUNCILMEMBER LOZADA:

16 Thank you, Council President.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

18 Leader of the Kensington Caucus.

19 COUNCILMEMBER LOZADA:

20 Thank you, Council President. I
21 would like to thank my colleagues
22 for joining me today in welcoming
23 and celebrating the principles in
24 our community as well as the

1 Executive Director and the Associate
2 Director of the Children's Alliance.
3 Their work is truly inspirational,
4 and the work that they do is
5 extremely important in our
6 community. So thank you for joining
7 me in welcoming them.

8 I also introduced an
9 amendment to my bill pertaining to
10 mobile service providers in
11 Kensington, Bill No. 240665.

12 The bill was introduced in
13 the fall and passed Council's
14 license and inspection committee
15 with a favorable recommendation.
16 However, I made a decision to hold
17 the bill for seven months. For
18 seven months, we held the bill
19 because we understood that there
20 were voices in the Kensington
21 community and the public health
22 community that had more to say.

23 I hosted multiple meetings
24 with mobile service providers.

1 Every single provider that did
2 services or that provided services
3 in the Kensington community was
4 invited to the table, every single
5 one of them. Whether we agreed with
6 them or not, they were invited to
7 participate in community meetings.

8 We held community meetings
9 with all stakeholders, with
10 students, with businesses, with
11 families, with faith-based
12 individuals. Every single person in
13 the Kensington community that had
14 anything to do with mobile service
15 providers work was invited to come
16 and share their opinions and their
17 expertise with us.

18 During the meetings, my
19 team and I listened to the subject
20 matter experts. We worked with them
21 to narrow on -- to narrow down and
22 narrow in on details that needed to
23 be changed and expanded our vision
24 to include the ideas that were not

1 in our original purview. I'm proud
2 to say that this bill represents
3 thoughtful, informed, and community
4 centered input. It reflects the
5 voices of residents, it reflects the
6 voices of residents. It prioritizes
7 residents, business owners,
8 children, police, and the experts in
9 our public health areas. This was a
10 collaborative effort from all fronts
11 which I'm proud of.

12 I would like to say thank
13 you to every person who attended
14 those meetings, corresponded with my
15 office and took part in the process.
16 I'd also like to thank the
17 administration who also was very
18 supportive, offered support in those
19 amendments. I believe that the
20 bill's not perfect. I don't think
21 any piece of legislation is ever
22 going to be perfect. I don't think
23 that everyone is going to ever come
24 in agreement -- in full agreement.

1 But I think that having
2 held the bill and having held these
3 meetings was a learning process for
4 myself and for my team.

5 We've also engaged and have
6 had conversations with many of the
7 offices on this legislative body.
8 You know, I want to thank my
9 legislative staff who is a young
10 staff and who doesn't always get it
11 right, but is always extremely
12 respectful to everyone in this
13 legislative body and to your staff.
14 It's unfortunate that some people
15 can't reciprocate that. But we work
16 hard to make sure that we listen and
17 that we hear the opinions of
18 everyone. The Kensington community
19 has suffered for a really long time.

20 And I believe that all of
21 the work that we're doing, including
22 legislation like this one will only
23 continue to allow us to reimagine a
24 Kensington that is a healthy

1 community, a community that should
2 be a part of the economic growth
3 that so many of us continue to talk
4 about. And they don't deserve to
5 continue to live in a neighborhood
6 that is occupied oftentimes right on
7 their front steps. And so this bill
8 helps to coordinate those services.

9 Someone mentioned in public
10 testimony that medical providers
11 were only going to be able to
12 receive 45 minutes or be in an area
13 for 45 minutes. That is incorrect
14 information.

15 I encourage people to read,
16 read, read the bill. All experts,
17 all individuals, all providers who
18 are going to be providing services
19 that are medical certified
20 providers, there is no timeframe for
21 you to be on that street. My
22 community deserves some relief.
23 We've tried to be as compassionate
24 as possible. We are going to

1 continue to push. As a government,
2 we can't continue to allow people to
3 live on our sidewalks.

4 There has been a lot of
5 emphasis on a certain kind of work
6 in a certain way that has shown us
7 that has not worked. We're doing
8 things differently. If folks want
9 to sign up to take some of these
10 individuals home with them, I have
11 signup sheets. Create a space
12 amongst your family, amongst your
13 neighborhood, in your neighborhood
14 that will allow for these people to
15 be cared of in the way that you
16 believe we need to be caring for
17 them for. But they can't. They can
18 no longer live on the streets of the
19 7th Council District. They can't.
20 it's not healthy for our -- for our
21 families. It's not healthy for our
22 businesses. It's not healthy for
23 our -- it's not healthy for anybody.

24 And so I have some signup

1 sheets if folks want to take them
2 home. Please open your doors. Let
3 me know. But we're going to
4 continue to push forward and make
5 sure that Kensington becomes the
6 healthy community that it should be,
7 and that folks continue to receive
8 the services that they need in a
9 coordinated fashion, in a
10 coordinated space. Thank you.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

12 Thank you.

13 The Chair recognizes
14 Councilmember, Dr. Anthony Phillips.

15 COUNCILMEMBER PHILIPS:

16 Thank you so much, Council
17 President. And thank you so much,
18 Councilmember Lozada.

19 I just want to say really
20 quickly, next Thursday, your budget
21 town hall with Council President
22 Johnson and Members of Philadelphia
23 City Council is going to be in the
24 East Oak Lane section of the 9th

1 District. I'm looking forward to
2 seeing everybody there.

3 It's going to be at our
4 budget town hall, Oak Lane,
5 Presbyterian Church, 6637 North 11th
6 Street, 6637 North 11th Street, Oak
7 Lane, Presbyterian Church, Thursday,
8 May 1st, 6:00 to 8:00 p.m. District
9 Budget Town Hall in the 9th
10 District. All right. See you all
11 there. That's it.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
13 That's it. Thank you, Dr. Phillips.

14 The best part of you
15 getting coordinated with your
16 doctoral degree is what Member
17 O'Rourke said, that you did the work
18 without AI because a lot of people
19 use AI these days for their
20 dissertation. But thank you young
21 man. There are no more speeches.

22 Thank everybody for their
23 hard work. For the record, we did
24 pass 12 official bills today. So

1 thank you for your hard work.

2 And with that being said,
3 the Chair recognizes Majority Leader
4 Councilmember Katherine Gilmore-
5 Richardson for a motion to adjourn.

6 COUNCILMEMBER GILMORE-

7 RICHARDSON: Thank you,
8 Mr. President. As a reminder, we
9 still have the Committee on Public
10 Property hearing immediately
11 following the stated meeting of City
12 Council. Also, welcome to our new
13 director, Greg Wright, for Veterans
14 Affairs. But we also want to thank
15 Wanda Pate-Dennis for always holding
16 it down.

17 To that point, I move that
18 council stand adjourned until
19 Thursday, May 1st, 2025 at
20 10:00 a.m.

21 COUNCILMAN HARRITY:

22 Second.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

24 It has been moved and properly

1 seconded by Member Harrity that
2 Council stand adjourned until
3 Thursday, May 1st, 2025 at
4 10:00 a.m.

5 All those in favor will
6 signify by saying aye.

7 COUNCILMEMBERS: Aye.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

9 Those opposed? The ayes have it and
10 the motion carries. Thank you all
11 very much.
