21

To give our invocation this

22

morning the Chair recognizes Pastor

23

Edward Buster Fields, senior pastor

24

at Ambassador Seed of Love Church,

25

also a celebrity outstanding singer

1
2 of Gospel Sunday Best seen on Black
3 Entertainment Television.

4 With that being said, I
5 want to ask for all of our guests to
6 please rise and he's also the guest
7 of Councilmember Jeffrey J. Young.

8 Pastor Buster, the floor is
9 yours.

10 PASTOR BUSTER FIELDS:

11 Nobody told me that the
12 road will be easy. Do I have a
13 witness? I don't believe he brought
14 me this far to leave me.

15 Dear Lord, we thank you for
16 this day. For this is the day that
17 you have made and we shall rejoice
18 and be glad in it.

19 Father, we have all come
20 and gathered together for a time of
21 impartation for working together.
22 The Bible tells us when two or three
23 are gathered in my name, then you
24 are in the midst.

25 God, our city needs you,

1

2 our community needs you, our leaders
3 need you. So Lord, we invoke your
4 presence right now. Bring us on one
5 accord for the same agenda, no

17 Thank you.

18 Before considering these
19 bills and resolutions we will
20 consider public comment as follows:

21 Your public comment must
22 concern matters on a second reading
23 and Final Passage Calendar for
24 possible action at today's Council
25 session.

1

2 All speakers must sign up
3 in order to testify. If you have
4 not already signed up for today's
5 session, please do so now by giving
6 your name to Ms. Hassen at the table
7 outside the rails to my left.

8 Once you have been signed
9 up you will be called in the order
10 in which your name appears on the
11 signup sheet.

12 Under ideal circumstances
13 public comments each will have three
14 minutes to speak, however this time
15 limit may vary from session to
16 session. Today due to our volume
17 the time limit will be two minutes.

18 In order to be fair to all
19 those wishing to speak, I intend to
20 hold faithfully to the two-minute
21 limit. When you begin speaking you
22 will see a green light on a podium
23 when there are 30 seconds remaining
24 to your time. The light will turn
25 yellow which is your reminder to

1

2 conclude your remarks.

5 sergeant at arms will disconnect the

8 if you have not already done so.

9 I also reserve the right
10 pursuant to our rules of council to
11 limit repetitious comments on the
12 same subject matter.

13 I will now ask the chief
14 clerk to please read the name of our
15 first speaker.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Kate Perez
17 and may Jeremy Blatstein, Kimura
18 Anderson, Amy Novak and Lewis
19 Bartholomew also make their way to
20 the podium. Kate Perez Jeremy
21 Blatstein, Kimura Anderson, Amy
22 Novak and Lewis Bartholomew.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

24 Council will be at ease.

25 First order of business I

1

2 want to address Councilmember

3 O'Neill.

4 COUNCILMEMBER O'NEILL:

5 Thank you, Mr. President.

6 I'd like to ask to be excused from

7 the rest of the session and voted no

8 on the first resolution, 250130, and

9 yes on all other bills and

10 resolutions.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

12 Thank you very much and

13 leave is granted, sir.

14 Will the chief clerk please

15 call up our first speaker, please?

16 CHIEF CLERK: Kate Perez,

17 Jeremy Blatstein, Kimura Anderson,

18 Amy Novak and Lewis Bartholomew.

19 MS. ANDERSON: Greetings to

20 City Council President Kenyatta

21 Johnson and all members of City

22 Council. My name is Kimura Anderson

23 and I am the President of the

24 National Association of Women in

25 Construction Philadelphia, Chapter

1

2 145. I'm also -- thank you. I'm
3 also the Director of Human Resources
4 at Clemens Construction Company.

5 I stand before you to thank
6 Councilmember Katherine Gilmore-
7 Richardson for presenting this
8 resolution and I proudly support the
9 resolution for the city of
10 Philadelphia to recognize the first
11 week in March as Women in
12 Construction week. WIC established
13 Women in Construction week to
14 celebrate and promote the role of
15 Women in the construction
16 industry while raising awareness
17 about the opportunities available to
18 them. This week serves as a time to
19 recognize the achievements of women
20 in the field, excuse me, highlight
21 their contributions and encourage
22 more women to pursue careers in
23 construction.

24 This year's theme is
25 "Together we rise" reflects the

1

2 power of unity mentorship and
3 collaboration in advancing women in
4 the construction industry.

5 By formally recognizing
6 Women in Construction week the city
7 of Philadelphia would demonstrate
8 its commitment to fostering
9 diversity, equity and inclusion in
10 the trades, ensuring that women have
11 the support and opportunities that
12 they deserve. By honoring this week
13 we empower future generations,
14 celebrate the perseverance of Women
15 in Construction and continue
16 breaking down barriers in this
17 industry.

18 As Susan B. Anthony once
19 said, "Whenever women gather
20 together, failure is impossible."
21 Thank you.

22 CHIEF CLERK: We have Amy
23 Novak, Lewis Bartholomew. May
24 Natasha Scott Lawson, Jared Johnson
25 and Sherita Glenn also make their

1

2 way to the podium.

3 MS. NOVAK: Good morning.

4 My name is Amy Novak and I am the

5 current president of professional

6 Women in Construction Philadelphia.

7 On behalf of the board and

8 members of PWC Philadelphia, I'd

9 like to thank the Council President,

10 Council and especially Councilmember

11 Katherine Gilmore-Richardson for

12 recognizing the contributions of

13 Women in Construction and related in

14 industries in Philadelphia.

15 The resolution is a

16 testament to the city's commitment

17 to advancing and supporting women

18 and minorities in business and life

19 in general. We also recognize and

20 appreciate the like-minded efforts

21 of NAWIC in Philadelphia, WINC and

22 the AFLCIO, and other professional

23 organizations. We look forward to

24 promoting the growth of women in the

25 architecture engineering and

1
2 construction industries in
3 partnership and synergy with these
4 groups.

5 PWC chapter seeks to
6 acknowledge that every woman has a
7 story to share. From the up and
8 coming woman who is just beginning
9 her journey to the season
10 professional, we all have unique
11 perspectives and support to offer
12 one another. And that is especially
13 amplified during Women in
14 Construction week.

15 Although women and
16 construction are still the minority
17 we have a growing voice and it is
18 our goal to connect, promote and
19 advance women in the industry by
20 engaging women and men from AEC and
21 the affiliated firms through a broad
22 range of educational and informative
23 programs.

24 We provide a platform to
25 connect and engage across our

1
2 industry and expand our business
3 network that is only successful with
4 the support of other groups and the
5 city of Philadelphia.

6 We invite men and women
7 from any point in the professional
8 career to please join us during
9 Women in Construction week and
10 always to promote and join our
11 dynamic and diverse community.
12 Thank you.

13 (Applause.)

14 MS. GLENN: Good morning,
15 my name is Sherita Glenn.

16 Good morning, Council
17 President Johnson, my daughter
18 Majority Leader Katherine Gilmore-
19 Richardson, Majority Leader Kendra
20 Brooks and the esteemed City
21 Councilmembers and the public.

22 My name is Sherita Glenn
23 and I have the privilege and honor
24 to serve with the honoree Sonia
25 Garrett as the ward leader of the

1

2 49th Ward. The mighty, mighty 49th
3 Ward.

4 I stand on behalf of myself
5 and the 49th Ward for Sonia. And
6 thank you Councilmember Brooks for
7 honoring Sonia during this stated
8 meeting.

9 Sonia is a woman that
10 fights tirelessly for the women,
11 children and families in the city of
12 brotherly love and sisterly
13 affection. You may not have heard
14 as of yet, but Sonia wears a bevy of
15 hats with different positions within
16 the Logan Civic Association. She's
17 the committee person for the Ward 49
18 Division 11, president of Nicetown
19 CDC Nas. She's a block captain. A
20 board member of the 8th District
21 neighborhood community advisory for
22 the Mayor. And she's the third vice
23 president of the executive team of
24 the 49th Ward. She definitely needs
25 more hours in the day to fulfill all

1

2 these duties.

3 Now, those are her

4 positions with official titles.

5 Here are some of the positions with

6 unofficial titles as volunteering at

7 Cook Middle School, organizing her

8 block fall festival in October and

9 assisting with the Mayor's mission.

10 On a safer note, she likes

11 to do things to keep our

12 neighborhood cleaner and greener.

13 I'm going to stop now for the sake

14 of time. Sonia also have a plethora

15 of other official activities.

16 In addition she manages

17 some multi-generational programs in

18 the community. 803 Fresh have a

19 song titled "Boots on the ground."

20 This could be Sonia's theme song

21 because she performs 803 jobs a year

22 and boots on the ground is an

23 understatement for the many tasks

24 and volunteer work that she does

25 around the community. All she need

1
2 is a fan in her hand and she's well
3 on her way.

4 Now, because I am out of
5 time I'm going to go down to the
6 bottom and say, I just want to say
7 in conclusion, I did an acronym for
8 Sonia with her first name.

9 S is for a say when, O for
10 outstanding, N for nice, I for
11 insight and A for affable. Patty
12 Labelle in '79 had a song it says
13 "music my way of life." For Sonia
14 Garrett serving is her way of life.

15 Thank you for allowing me
16 to present. Happy Lent season,
17 happy Ramadan and God bless us all.

18 (Applause.)

19 MS. LAWSON: Good morning.
20 My name is Natasha Scott-Lawson and
21 I am here to speak in support of the
22 resolution recognizing Women in
23 Construction week. I am a sheet
24 metal worker with Local 19 for 27
25 years. I also have the honor of

1

2 being a mentor and serving on the
3 steering committee for Women in
4 Non-traditional Careers, also known
5 as WINC.

6

I would like to thank
7 Council President Johnson for this
8 opportunity to speak today and
9 Councilmember Gilmore-Richardson for
10 recognizing this resolution.

11

WINC is a six-week
12 pre-apprenticeship program that
13 helps women in the Philadelphia area
14 choose and succeed in industries
15 such as construction, manufacturing,
16 transit and utilities. WINC
17 appreciates the opportunity to bring
18 more awareness of construction
19 careers for women who now make up
20 less than 5% of those who work with
21 tools in construction nationally.

22

More women work as trades
23 women than as dental hygienst or
24 veterinarians, yet these high paying
25 and satisfying careers are not

1

2 visible enough or accessible enough

3 to all women. And especially to

4 women of color who have faced the

5 most workplace discrimination.

6 That's why WINC organizes trades

7 women, contractors, unions,

8 educators, workforce providers and

9 advocates to do better at recruiting

10 and retaining more women in the

11 construction trades.

12 You can connect with WINC

13 by going to our website

14 Wincproject.org. That's

15 Wincproject.org. Thank you.

16 CHIEF CLERK: We have

17 Jeremy Blatstein, Lewis Bartholomew,

18 Jarrett Johnson. And may Sterling

19 Johnson, Damon McWhite and Gabby

20 Rodriguez also make their way to the

21 podium.

22 MR. BLATSTEIN: Good

23 morning, Council, I'm Jeremy

24 Blatstein. It has been one year

25 since the legendary laugh from

1

2 Councilmember Phillips when he
3 realized I was the voice behind next
4 Philly mayor.

5 Why have I been coming each
6 week for the last year? Because I
7 care deeply about this city and
8 believe it is important for the
9 voices of the people to be heard and
10 I told myself I was going to come
11 for a year.

12 I'm here today in support
13 of the bike lanes bills by my
14 Councilman Jay Young. Wow. We have
15 come a long way from when Councilman
16 Young was trying to get rid of bike
17 lanes. Kudos to progress and
18 growth. We love to see it.

19 Last December, Mayor Parker
20 signed the "Get out the bike lane"
21 bill, \$125 fines downtown, \$75
22 elsewhere. It's a good step, but I
23 ride these streets sometimes even
24 looking fly and I know it's not
25 enough.

1

2 Cars still block bike lanes
3 forcing cyclists like me into
4 danger. Dr Barbara Freed's tragic
5 death in a bike lane shows paint
6 isn't protection. We need concrete
7 barriers to keep people safe. Bike
8 lanes are vital for our city. They
9 reduce traffic congestion, improve
10 public health through exercise and
11 lower carbon emissions.

12 And let me be clear, bike
13 lanes don't cause gentrification.
14 They're not about displacing anyone,
15 they're about making our streets
16 safer and more accessible for
17 everyone. But with 65 traffic
18 deaths last year Vision Zero is
19 under funded while drivers ignore
20 the rules. Fines alone won't change
21 that.

22 I'm not here to point
23 fingers, I'm here to push for real
24 progress. We need fully protected
25 bike lanes with concrete consistent

1
2 enforcement and funding for Vision
3 zero that matches its promise. This
4 isn't just about bikes, it's about
5 keeping our community safe and
6 thriving. Let's make it happen,
7 Council.

8 And, of course, we're
9 talking about SEPTA. Kudos to
10 Councilman O'Rourke for his hearing
11 yesterday. Raise your hand if you
12 rode SEPTA in the last week.
13 Council? Oh, look at all the people
14 in the audience. Zero hands for
15 another week. Disappointing, but
16 expected. At this point riding the
17 riding and thank you.

18 MR. JOHNSON: Good morning
19 Council President and members of the
20 City Council. My name is Jarrett
21 Johnson, I am a volunteer and
22 advocate for 5th Square.

23 First and foremost, on
24 behalf of 5th Square and me, I would
25 like to thank Councilmember Young

1

2 for passing all three bike lane --
3 and the committee -- and the Streets
4 and Services Committee for passing
5 all three bike lane bills last week.

6 For those of you who don't
7 know what 5th Square is, we are an
8 urbanist organization that deals
9 with issues such as housing, transit
10 and bike lanes, Vision Zero.

11 Last week I gave a short
12 testimony about adding a bike lane
13 on 23rd Street from Race Street to
14 Market Street, which is Bill No.
15 250007 and how it would impact bike
16 riders and commuters. Recently if
17 you have not heard the news there
18 has been a number of series injuries
19 and deaths from bike riders because
20 of no installation of bike lanes.

21 I want to question everyone
22 in here in this room, whether they
23 support the bike lanes or oppose it
24 to think about what it was like if
25 you had a family member, a friend, a

1

2 coworker, a spouse or maybe a
3 stranger or other people who rode a
4 bike. Now think about that life
5 without them because there was no
6 protection of bike lanes.

7 This is the reason why I am
8 supporting these bills, especially
9 Bill No. 250007. And I urge the
10 council to approve these three bills
11 for final passage. It will help
12 save lives and it will help benefit
13 that person that's a bike rider and
14 give them a safe path to bike and
15 more options to travel. Especially
16 we have a lot of people from 5th
17 Square that ride bikes that are not
18 here today, but they have advocated
19 just as strongly as I have of
20 supporting these bike lanes.

21 So once, again, Council, I
22 thank you for your their time and
23 let's get these bills passed.

24 (Applause.)

25 MR. MCWHITE: Damon

1
2 McWhite. Good morning, members of
3 City Council. My name is Damon
4 McWhite. I am the director of
5 Partnerships for Coded by in this
6 initiative One Philadelphia. An
7 organization dedicated to all
8 Philadelphians, especially our young
9 people ensuring that they have
10 access to the skills resources and
11 opportunities necessary to thrive in
12 the tech industry.

13 I'm here today in strong
14 support of the resolution declaring
15 March 2nd through 8th, 2025, as Teen
16 tech week in the city of
17 Philadelphia. Because investing in
18 tech education for our youth isn't
19 just about job readiness, it's about
20 opportunity empowerment and
21 protection in an increasingly
22 digital world.

23 Right now technology is
24 shaping every aspect of our Lives
25 from the ways we learn to work and

1
2 how we engage with the government
3 and protect your personal
4 information. But too many young
5 people in Philadelphia, particularly
6 those from historically excluded
7 communities lack access to
8 meaningful tech education and career
9 pathways.

10 Without targeted
11 investments like Teen tech week, we
12 risk leaving behind an entire
13 generation of talent. At One
14 Philadelphia we are working to build
15 a citywide tech talent pipeline that
16 provides Philadelphians with the
17 opportunities from childhood through
18 career. At Coded By, we are
19 delivering hands-On, real world
20 training that gives teens the skills
21 to not only participate in tech, but
22 also lead, innovate and create
23 wealth within it.

24 Through these efforts we
25 are ensuring that young people have

1
2 the tools to understand digital
3 threats navigate an online world
4 safely and develop solutions that
5 protect their communities from fraud
6 and corporate harm. This work
7 cannot happen in silos, the city of
8 Philadelphia has already taken
9 critical steps such as digital
10 literacy initiatives and workforce
11 development programs to protect
12 residents and prepare them for the
13 future, but we need to do more
14 equipping our young people with the
15 tools and resources to excel as
16 technology broadens our individual
17 is essential to the future of our
18 city.

19 Exposure to digital
20 opportunities at an early age is a
21 key factor in developing a tech
22 workforce.

23 We need to work together to
24 send a clear message that
25 Philadelphia is prepared to commit

1

2 to our teams for opportunities in
3 the challenge of the digital age.

4 Thank you.

5 CHIEF CLERK: We have
6 Sterling Johnson, Gabby Rodriguez.
7 May Lynette Greene, Sherry Ann
8 Broussard and Vivian Miller also
9 make their way to the podium.

10 MS. RODRIGUEZ: Hi. Gabby
11 Rodriguez.

12 Good morning,
13 councilmembers. I'm an attorney
14 with the Consumer Housing Unit at
15 Philadelphia Legal Assistance. I'm
16 here to support my express my
17 support for Councilmember Landau's
18 resolution declaring March 2nd
19 through 8th as National Consumer
20 Protection week in the city of
21 Philadelphia.

22 Philadelphia legal
23 Assistance provides free legal
24 assistance to low income
25 Philadelphians in areas of critical

1

2 needs. One of the areas we focus on
3 in particular is housing. PLA
4 operates the Save Your Home Philly
5 Hotline in partnership with the city
6 of Philadelphia.

7 In 2024, the hotline

8 answered over 7,000 phone calls.

9 The hotline refers homeowners to HUD
10 certified housing counselors,
11 provides legal information and
12 advice, assist with brief matters
13 such as real estate tax benefits
14 applications. PLA also operates or
15 represents homeowners dealing with
16 mortgage foreclosure, tangle title
17 and consumer fraud.

18 Consumer protection covers
19 a broad range of issues in the area
20 of housing, homeowners facing a
21 foreclosure or other Financial issue
22 are primary targets for unscrupulous
23 lenders and scammers. We frequently
24 see homeowners who are scammed out
25 of hundreds, sometimes thousands of

1

2 dollars because they are told by the
3 scammer that it would save their
4 home.

5 Consumer protection also
6 just isn't just about scams. We
7 routinely see homeowners who are
8 facing foreclosures because the
9 mortgage company failed to follow
10 the applicable Consumer Protection
11 Law.

12 Councilmember Landau's
13 resolution will raise awareness
14 about consumer rights and the
15 importance of protecting consumers
16 against unscrupulous actors and
17 corporate misconduct.

18 Thank you, again, for your
19 time and consideration as you vote
20 on the resolution declaring March
21 the 2nd through the 8th as National
22 Consumer Protection week in
23 Philadelphia. Thank you.

24 (Applause.)

25 MS. PEREZ: I'm Kate Perez.

1
2 And despite costing taxpayers over
3 60-million in misconduct payouts in
4 just two years, the highest
5 Department budget is still the PPD.
6 High schoolers are begging for after
7 school programs while we discuss
8 buying cops more drones and we're
9 still allowing them to trade tactics
10 with an occupation that's preventing
11 all humanitarian aid from entering
12 the Gaza strip since Sunday.

13 As a city that worries
14 about violence, we should be taking
15 advice from studies like the 100
16 shooting review committee that found
17 that investing into communities
18 prevents violence and offers
19 evidence-based strategies like
20 improving infrastructure.

21 SEPTA needs about
22 51-million for operation and
23 improvements. This is something our
24 state could have easily sponsored
25 for its constituents, instead of the

1
2 \$56-million in condition free war
3 bonds that were used to buy things
4 like the 1,000 pound bombs Trump
5 just bypassed Congress to sell for
6 the second time.

7 As this bill revises budget
8 amounts, I ask that we lower the
9 police budget and redistribute the
10 fund into violence prevention
11 programs, like repairing old homes,
12 prevent violence. Stop overfunding
13 the cops and stop partnering our
14 city with the apartheid states. We
15 should be pressuring Congress to
16 support the joint resolutions of
17 disapproval and block the 10,000
18 artillery shells to Israel and call
19 for a complete arms embargo. Free
20 Palestine.

21 (Applause.)

22 MR. BARTHOLOMEW: Good
23 morning, Council President Johnson
24 and members of council. My name is
25 Lewis Bartholomew and I'm here to

1

2 speak in favor of the three bike
3 lane bills introduced by
4 Councilmember Young.

5 I regularly bike to Temple
6 and Fairmount from my home in Wash
7 West to visit friends. But last
8 week my girlfriend and I were biking
9 together to and from one of my
10 friends homes and halfway through
11 the bike ride she told me she wasn't
12 comfortable and wanted to walk the
13 rest of the way. Cars were rushing
14 passed us constantly and since there
15 weren't any protected bike lanes,
16 they passed extremely close.

17 My girlfriend is one
18 example among many of Philadelphians
19 who want the option to travel by
20 bike which is an extremely efficient
21 and quick way to get around
22 especially in and around Center
23 City. So many people who would
24 otherwise bike instead chose to
25 drive further clogging up our

1

2 streets and others simply don't make
3 the trip they wanted to, especially
4 if they don't have access to a car
5 or the area isn't well served by
6 SEPTA.

7 Right now most of the
8 people who bike are the ones who are
9 extremely confident navigating our
10 dangerous streets by bike. A tiny
11 proportion of our population. By
12 gradually increasing our bike
13 network in this way as Councilmember
14 Young has done, we make it possible
15 for other people to have the option
16 to get around safely by bike, folks
17 who are older as well as younger
18 kids, for example.

19 Thank you, again, to
20 Councilmember Young for his
21 leadership on this issue. Thank you
22 for your time.

23 (Applause.)

24 MR. JOHNSON: Hello, my
25 name is Sterling Johnson and I am

1
2 testifying in support of the
3 resolution condemning the
4 unconstitutional actions taken by
5 the Department of Government
6 Efficiency to dismantle the federal
7 government. I just want to say that
8 I would just like the city to
9 address its role in the region and
10 reframe a lot of what its role in
11 the state is. Also with the color
12 counties due to them having a lot of
13 surplus that often puts Philadelphia
14 in the space of having to defend
15 itself.

16 I've just been doing a lot
17 of housing advocacy, doing harm
18 reduction advocacy for some time.
19 And in general especially at some of
20 the state housing meetings there has
21 been this idea that Philadelphia
22 takes up a lot of resources,
23 doesn't -- it also can't administer
24 itself. And I just find it uh
25 horribly racist and there's a lot

1

2 of focus on Kensington which is
3 really puts us at the space of
4 having to defend ourselves.

5

When I think we're
6 surrounded by some of the richest
7 counties in the state and in the
8 country, honestly we're not poor,
9 there are a lot of people in the
10 region. There's a lot of uneven
11 development, but generally we're one
12 of the -- we have an abundance of
13 resources in this space. You know,
14 I administer a land trust in this in
15 the city so I'm mostly concerned
16 about long-term housing.

17 And for me the long-term
18 housing has to be done at the
19 Housing Authority, that's the only
20 place that has housing that doesn't
21 end, so they have to be involved in
22 all of the discussions. If we're
23 not there, then I don't know what
24 we're talking about. All that stuff
25 ends.

1

2 The work that I've done to
3 get people into rapidry housing
4 which is a year or two, most of
5 those people are back on the street,
6 so it doesn't really matter for
7 that. So when we're talking about
8 actual solutions, it has to be about
9 long-term housing.

10 I like to -- you know, and
11 I think, you know, this is a point,
12 that I feel really afraid for
13 Medicaid, for SNAP for all the
14 things that -- for all the people
15 that are going to be hurt. I know
16 we had disagreements about how we're
17 doing this, but like it's really
18 going to be bad and I'm really
19 afraid.

20 So I just want us to really
21 honestly hold even the state and the
22 other counties accountable for not
23 having those -- for when people are
24 in the city, send them a bill. You
25 know, I don't know, I'm just talking

1
2 off the cuff, I'm like send them a
3 bill. Like they are here, they get
4 resources from our city, they raise
5 our taxes on like some of our
6 elders. And instead of like just
7 taking them in, send them a bill.
8 We know they're they they have
9 detainers in other counties.

10 It's like generally they
11 they put it on us. They're the
12 richest counties in the country, in
13 the state. Like Philadelphia is
14 doing our job, we are doing our job
15 and we care about people, but send
16 them a bill.

17 CHIEF CLERK: We have
18 Lynette Greene, Sherry Ann Broussard
19 and Vivian Miller. May Rickie
20 Pyatt, Brian Elmore and Benjamin
21 Hoover also make their way to the
22 podium.

23 CHILD GREENE: Hi, my name
24 is Christian Greene, representing my
25 Aunt Sonia. My name is Christian

1

2 Greene, I'm representing my Aunt
3 Sonia Garrett. And I wanted to say
4 my aunt is a wonderful woman. She's
5 a wonderful woman.

6 MS. GREENE: Good morning,
7 everybody. My name is Lynette
8 Greene and I am speaking on the
9 behalf of my sister Sonia Garrett.
10 Sonia, I think you should stand so
11 that people can know who you are.

12 Sonia asked me if I would
13 speak this morning and I'm just as
14 outgoing as she is, but it's just
15 something about standing in front of
16 people. And I mean I couldn't turn
17 down the opportunity to oblige her
18 in this. And this is my son
19 Christian Greene, he says he's
20 normally not nervous and I know we
21 have two minutes and he was supposed
22 to be 30 seconds of the two minutes
23 now.

24 Sherita Glenn spoke earlier
25 and she wanted me to just to add a

1

2 few things that she forgot to
3 mention about Sonia. She stated not
4 to mention she is a caregiver to her
5 mother, which is my mom right here,
6 a supportive mother to her two adult
7 children and a fun loving sister,
8 auntie, cousin and neighbor.

9 I am humbled that she asked
10 all of us to speak on her behalf.
11 Now this is what I wanted to say
12 about Sonia. My sister Sonia is a
13 remarkable woman. I don't know
14 where she gets the energy from.
15 Like she knows every single person
16 in Logan.

17 I mean, I can be on the
18 phone with my sister and she'll say
19 hold on a minute. She talks to
20 every single person. Sonia knows
21 every neighbor and those people stop
22 to talk to Sonia. She's out at
23 6:00 a.m. sweeping. I said, Sonia,
24 you know, just use a leaf blower.
25 Why are you taking all the time to

1

2 sweep? I'm sorry -- why are you
3 taking the time to sweep? But she
4 gets out she keeps the neighborhood
5 clean.

6 We've been in Logan since
7 1972 and Sonia is just the epitome
8 of what a neighbor, what a citizen
9 should be. She upholds the morals
10 and the values in her role and Sonia
11 has not always walked in that role.
12 And I'm so glad that she has evolved
13 to become the woman that she has
14 become today because she used to be
15 a lot more reserved. And I mean,
16 she is just a tough act to follow.
17 I don't even know if what was said
18 about her even begins to explain
19 what a phenomenal woman you are,
20 Sonia. And I am so graced to be in
21 your presence. And when I have
22 difficult situations, I always say
23 what would Sonia say? She is just
24 so wonderful with people

25 I mean, she's so smooth and

1

2 her approach and she can get people
3 talking and I deeply admire her. My
4 time is up. Okay. Thank you.

5 CHIEF CLERK: We have
6 Sherry Ann Broussard, Vivian Miller,
7 Rickie Pyatt, Brian Elmore. May
8 Benjamin Hoover, Ernest Wiley
9 Jenkins, Ernest Wiley, David
10 Alexander Jenkins and Cameron
11 O'Grady also make their way to the
12 podium.

13 MS. MILLER: My name is
14 Vivian. I'm Sonia Garrett's mother.
15 And Sonia Garrett was supposed to be
16 the block captain but she's more
17 than the black captain. She's
18 always working for the best of the
19 community and for the block.

20 And people have really
21 learned to understand that she is
22 just putting love on them and
23 watching over the place so that we
24 could have a place of happiness and
25 not fearness and cleanliness. She's

1

2 just Ms. Block Captain of the

3 century to us. Thank you.

4 (Applause.)

5 MR. ELMORE: Good morning,

6 members of council. My name is

7 Brian Elmore. I'm a resident of

8 Fairmount and I'm here in support

9 report of Bill 25005, which would

10 create a parking protected bike lane

11 at 22nd and Spring Garden.

12 The bill was introduced by

13 Councilmember Young. I just want to

14 thank Councilmember Young for his

15 leadership on this bill. I

16 regularly bike, walk and drive on

17 22nd Street and this project is

18 sorely, sorely dated in our

19 community.

20 I've been organizing around

21 this project for a little over two

22 years now and I would call myself an

23 activist. But during the course of

24 canvassing and talking to Neighbors

25 about this project, it became

1
2 apparent to me that there were a lot
3 of folks across the city,
4 particularly parents of young
5 children, that don't have the time
6 to show up to RCO meetings, to show
7 up to meetings like this to testify
8 in support of pedestrian and bike uh
9 projects, but there is an
10 overwhelming amount of support out
11 there which we demonstrated through
12 letters of support from across our
13 community from schools, parks and
14 RCOs.

15 So I would encourage
16 members of council, specifically
17 district council members to follow
18 the leadership of Councilmember
19 Young and listen to your
20 constituents who may not have the
21 time or the privilege to show up to
22 events like this and express their
23 opinion. And I want to thank
24 Council for their leadership more
25 broadly on Vision Zero during this

1

2 budget cycle as well. Thank you.

3 (Applause.)

4 MR. HOOVER: Thank you.

5 My name is Benjamin Hoover,

6 legislative representative of the

7 Philadelphia Federation of Teachers.

8 On behalf of President

9 Arthur Steinberg and the 14,000

10 members of the Philadelphia

11 Federation of Teachers and as a

12 25-year member of the PFT and

13 Veteran Educator, and also as a

14 proud product of public institutions

15 and public schools, I rise in

16 support of resolution 250130

17 introduced by Councilmember Brooks

18 and also the resolution introduced

19 by Councilmember Thomas today.

20 Opposing the constitutional acts of

21 DOGE to dismantle our institutions

22 and also to oppose the dismantling

23 and condemn the dismantling of the

24 our Department of Public Education.

25 While I'm here talking I

1
2 just want everybody to know that the
3 PFT walks the walk, as well as talks
4 the talk. On March 4th, thousands
5 of teachers in Philadelphia at over
6 150 schools handed out flyers and
7 walked with signs that declared one
8 unified voice, stop the attacks on
9 public education. Protect our kids.
10 We walk the walk and talk
11 the talk because we know how
12 important education is for our
13 students and their families. We
14 know this because of our own
15 experiences. And so many of you
16 here joined us because I think you
17 know from your own experiences as
18 students, as some of you employees
19 in the school district of
20 Philadelphia at one point, and as
21 now parents how important our public
22 schools are to Philadelphia. So we
23 PFT thank you, all the members who
24 came, to take the time to stand with
25 us in body and spirit on March 4th.

1

2

Thank you to all the

3

councilmembers and state

4

representatives who spoke, Widener

5

Memorial. And I want to thank you

6

again because of the power of what

7

you know. I think you all joined us

8

and I've heard from so many of you

9

as graduates of Frankford, Girls,

10

King West, Southern, Overbrook and

11

all the other many, I don't want to

12

forget girls, and Central, all the

13

other many schools in Philadelphia

14

how important our schools are.

15

Now, I think it's important

16

to all of us that we know what is at

17

at stake. We're facing cuts for

18

26-million vulnerable kids in every

19

school district Across the nation.

20

7.5-million students with

21

disabilities, 15% of students in

22

every community, 10-million students

23

from working class families could

24

lose subsidized loans, increasing

25

College costs for working class

1

2 families.

3

And I'm going to ask

4

everybody here, all educators,

5

elected officials to please -- I

6

have flyers here for you if they

7

could -- the sergeant of arms could

8

please distribute it. And also

9

anybody here to please contact your

10

legislators to end this unfathomable

11

attack on our kids.

12

(Applause.)

13

CHIEF CLERK: We have

14

Ernest Wiley, David Alexander

15

Jenkins, Cameron O'Grady. May Lynn

16

Landis, Marvin Robinson and Phil

17

Freedman also make their way to the

18

podium.

19

MR. WILEY: Good morning.

20

My name is Ernest Wiley. Today I'm

21

speaking in the shoes of EMT Wiley,

22

the emergency money technician. I

23

have rapid response protocols to

24

protect the citizens of Philadelphia

25

and in all cities throughout the

1
2 United States from Trump's current
3 attack on the Social Security
4 Administration.

5 I invented a tri-currency
6 financial system. I will use the
7 day rate which is part of the new
8 budget management protocols to
9 protect the senior citizens from
10 financial misery and starvation of
11 food, lights, water and gas.

12 All of the city budgets
13 will be balanced and there will be
14 zero deficits once it's set up. If
15 the Federal Government is out of
16 service we will have -- we still
17 have the city revenue collection
18 system and the state revenue
19 collection system functioning
20 properly.

21 I have to use the revenue
22 collection systems, the tax
23 preparers and the banks to rescue
24 the senior citizens from the damages
25 to the Social Security accounts at

1

2 the federal level.

3 Ever since Trump's first
4 term I have never called him an
5 enemy, I called him crazy. Donald
6 J. Trump is aware that he's secretly
7 attempting a genocide on American
8 citizens, specifically the
9 Democrats. He withdrew from the
10 United Nations and the World Health
11 Organization. The United Nations
12 has cases on genocide and the World
13 Health Organization reports to the
14 United Nations the deaths that occur
15 in all countries.

16 By removing America from
17 the World Health Organization it
18 allows him to hide the deaths from
19 the world and Americans.

20 Messages for all migrants.
21 I have no worries about you your
22 family or your loved ones because I
23 will be removing the financial chaos
24 and inflation from your home country
25 and very soon you will have a home

1
2 country to call home sweet home.
3 Migrating to the United States is
4 not the way to truth or the light
5 because it's not possible for
6 8-billion people on earth to move
7 here.

8 By next year your country
9 will be fixed so hang in there and
10 keep your heads up. You may feel
11 unwanted and abandoned, but always
12 remember EJ Wiley, the immigrant
13 that grew up in America loves you.
14 Thank you.

15 MR. ALEXANDER JENKINS:
16 Good morning, madam chair,
17 members, guests of the chamber.
18 David Alexander Jenkins.

19 I rise in favor of the
20 resolution laid before us by
21 Councilwoman Brooks which condemns
22 the unconstitutional actions of the
23 Department of the Government
24 Efficiency to dismantle the federal
25 government.

1

2 Our forefathers warned us

3 in earnest and most precisely

4 against this kind of overreach.

5 James Madison whom we remember as

6 the founder of our constitution

7 wrote in Federalist No. 47, that the

8 accumulation of powers legislative

9 executive and judiciary in the same

10 hands may justly be pronounced as

11 the very definition of tyranny.

12 And yet, here we stand

13 watching the seizure and control of

14 the federal agencies of the people

15 while bypassing their elected

16 representatives and thusly their

17 will.

18 This is not efficiency.

19 Ladies and gentlemen this is at best

20 oligarchy. It is the erosion of

21 democracy under the guise of reform

22 the taking away of institutions that

23 protect working families while

24 ensuring its poorly dressed MAGA

25 baseball cap wearing, unelected,

1
2 South African creator continues to
3 take taxpayer funded contracts
4 representing billions of dollars
5 while bankrupting the American
6 people. I repeat this is neither
7 efficient nor is it lawful.

8 In 1796, George Washington
9 in his farewell address after
10 refusing the powers of a king no
11 less than three times warned us
12 against the rise of powerful
13 factions that would subvert the
14 government to serve private
15 interests.

16 Today we heed that warning
17 justly condemning with wrath and
18 indignation the unconstitutional
19 authority and systems whereby one
20 man dictates the fate of our civil
21 servants and public institutions.

22 The resolution is written
23 not just in defense of our city,
24 brothers and sisters, but as a
25 battle cry for the very people of

1

2 America to defend of, by, for the
3 people.

4 Let history remember this
5 day, this day when democracy was
6 under attack, that Philadelphia
7 where this more perfect union was
8 born stood firm in her defense.

9 Thank you.

10 (Applause.)

11 MR. O'GRADY: Hello, City
12 Council. My name is Cameron O'Grady
13 and I'm here to support each of the
14 three ordinances regarding bike
15 lanes on various streets today. I
16 know there's already been a lot of
17 previous comments about this bill so
18 I will try to be brief and avoid
19 repeating previous points.

20 Philadelphia has made lots
21 of progress when it comes to
22 planning and building our bicycle
23 network, however, there's still more
24 to be done including various safety
25 measures which I know the city has

1

2 done by addressing with Vision Zero.

3 I live in West Philly and

4 have personally seen the effects of

5 how improvements to bike lanes

6 increase usage. 48th Street South

7 of Market has become a major bike

8 corridor after the improvements last

9 year. Not only has this change made

10 biking safer, but it has increased

11 bike usage along the route.

12 Subsequently reducing the car usage

13 along that route and thus traffic

14 along that route.

15 Ordinance like these

16 however small are meaningful and

17 each block of road expanded for bike

18 lanes is one more block that makes

19 biking in Philadelphia possible and

20 encourages more people to do so. I

21 will also add that it is especially

22 important that we take action to

23 improve in matters that we as a city

24 controller spells especially when

25 considering the state of our federal

1

2 government.

3

There is a quote from the

4

movie "Field of Dreams" that

5

concisely summarizes my view in bike

6

lanes. "Build it and they will

7

come." Thank you.

8

CHIEF CLERK: May we have

9

Lynn Landis, Marvin Robinson, Phil

10

Freedman, Heath Myers and Lillian

11

Hintz also make their way to the

12

podium.

13

MS. LANDIS: Okay. Good

14

morning my name is Lynn Landis from

15

Safestreetsphilly.org. I oppose

16

resolutions 250130, which accuses

17

the Department of Government

18

Efficiency, DOGE, if you will of

19

dismantling the federal government.

20

I also oppose resolution 250171,

21

which supports legal representation

22

for illegal immigrants.

23

Apparently Democrat

24

councilmembers don't mind

25

dismantling our immigration laws

1
2 through their illegal sanctuary city
3 policies, but they really don't like
4 it when Elon Musk and his band of
5 young techies dismantle a massive
6 amount of federal waste, fraud and
7 abuse much of which has enriched
8 countless Democrats and their
9 associates in the NGO and non-profit
10 community.

11 It's shocking and at the
12 same time revealing that Democrats
13 want to send endless billions to
14 defend Ukraine's borders, but not
15 our own. It's past time for
16 sanctuary city public officials to
17 be indicted for aiding and abetting
18 illegal immigrants. It's past time
19 for government accountability at
20 both the federal and local level.
21 And it's way past time for a change
22 in political policy, if not
23 leadership in Philadelphia. Thank
24 you.

25 MR. ROBINSON: First of

1
2 all, I want to give honor to my Lord
3 and Savior. Thank each and every
4 one for this opportunity thank you
5 councils for being here. I just
6 want to say this about immigration.
7 I don't have nothing against them,
8 but I just think we as Americans
9 that lives here should have just as
10 greatest opportunity as them.

11 And I know from me being
12 here for 58 years when we do allow
13 immigration comes amongst our
14 communities in our village they take
15 over, and then that leaves us with
16 nothing. And I know that for a fact
17 because I live in West Philadelphia
18 and the first immigration ever came
19 in my neighborhoods was Koreans and
20 I saw that happen.

21 Now I'm not here for tick
22 for tack, but I am America, my
23 mother raised me here and I work
24 hard for my people and it's very
25 difficult for me to get this things

1

2 that they are getting, that they get
3 freely.

4 Only thing I'm saying
5 believe it or not, this is what I
6 love about the laws, the laws of
7 America. Y'all all get mad at
8 Donald Trump, but Donald Trump told
9 everybody in America what he's going
10 to do before he got in office, told
11 everybody and he's doing it. So you
12 can't get mad with somebody that
13 didn't lie because he didn't lie.
14 He did not lie. He told the truth,
15 what he's going to do.

16 But this is what I like for
17 us to do, stop letting them come in
18 our country illegal and make sure
19 they come in here process, due
20 process because if it was me, I'd
21 have to do due process. So I'm not
22 knocking this, I'm not knocking
23 that, but due process is the America
24 way and that goes for every human
25 being. Thank you.

1

2 MS. HINTZ: Good morning.

3 My name is Lillian English Hintz and

4 I am the advisor for the 49th Ward.

5 And unfortunately what they signed

6 me up to talk about is not what I

7 came here to talk about. What I

8 came here to talk about is Sonia

9 Garrett. And so I'm going to take

10 this opportunity to do that, Madam

11 chairman.

12 And I'd like to recognize

13 my council person, the best in the

14 world, Cindy Bass, from the 8th

15 Councilmatic District. And I am so

16 grateful for this new council

17 because you all are doing the work

18 and that is one of the other reasons

19 that I'm here.

20 But Sonia Garrett -- I was

21 the chairman of the 49th Ward for 20

22 years and I moved out. So our new

23 ward leader made me the advisor for

24 this 49th Ward that I love.

25 I, as a committee person, I

1

2 was told that a committee person is
3 supposed to know their division.

4 And our judge on one terrible moment
5 had passed away at our division and
6 I didn't know what to do. We didn't
7 have a omar sabir downtown that we
8 could call at that time.

9 So I had to jump into
10 action and that action was at 6:00
11 in the morning to go knock on Sonia
12 Garrett's door and I didn't ask her
13 I told her, come I need your help.
14 She didn't hesitate, she said she
15 didn't know what she was doing and I
16 said neither do I, but we're going
17 to do it.

18 So we came and we put
19 together a whole team at our
20 division that day to work on the
21 polls. And you wouldn't know that
22 Sonia didn't know what she was doing
23 because she's been doing it ever
24 since. Thank you.

25 CHIEF CLERK: May we have

1
2 Stan Ellenburg, Kate Parker, Obona
3 Hains, Brennan Morag and William
4 Blocker also make their way to the
5 podium.

6 MR. MYERS: Good morning,
7 Council. Thank you for letting me
8 comment on Bill 250005 today. My
9 name is Heath and I support the
10 addition of a bicycle lane on that
11 North 22nd Street.

12 I believe the city could --
13 I'm sorry, I believe the city could
14 present an even better proposal that
15 retains the existing two vehicular
16 lanes without the need for
17 legislation removing a travel lane.
18 North 22nd Street plays a vital role
19 in accommodating the traffic needs
20 of local residents and should be
21 maintained as two lanes from Market
22 Street to Poplar Street.

23 The projects absence of an
24 interceptor commuter survey points
25 to an oversight in addressing the

1

2 needs of motorists, emergency
3 services and loading zones.
4 Reducing lanes on a primary artery
5 disproportionately impacts the
6 community by hindering daily travel,
7 emergency access and essential
8 services.

9 Furthermore, the plan
10 neglects traffic like improvements
11 such as sensors, preempts and
12 computer control which have proven
13 effective in suburban areas for
14 enhancing traffic flow and reducing
15 emissions.

16 I appreciate the
17 opportunity to share these concerns
18 and urge you not to vote for the
19 removal of traffic lane to
20 accommodate a bike lane on this
21 primary artery. Instead the city
22 can simply add a bike lane within an
23 existing roadway without removing
24 the traffic lane maintaining the
25 corridor's essential function for

1

2 daily commuters and emergency
3 services.

4 And on a personal note, I
5 rely on North 22nd Street when
6 transporting a family member for
7 routine medical care. My previous
8 route is now congested after one
9 lane was removed to added bicycle
10 lane which caused me to wait through
11 multiple light cycles at each
12 intersection for several blocks.

13 Thank you very much.

14 MR. ELLENBURG: Good
15 morning, Councilmembers. My name is
16 Stanley Ellenburg. I'm an
17 immigration attorney for 35 years.
18 My office is across the street. I'm
19 also an 8th Ward Councilmember. I'm
20 here to support Bill No. 250171 by
21 Councilmember Ahmad.

22 I'd like to thank
23 Councilmember for proposing this
24 bill. I think it's very important
25 to show the city's support for

1

2 residents of their community. We
3 all know the fear and confusion in
4 the immigrant community coming from
5 Washington today. And I think it's
6 important for us to show support of
7 those members of our city who are in
8 that situation.

9 We're all members -- we're
10 all immigrants in this city.
11 Everybody came from somebody else,
12 our parents, our grandparents, our
13 great grandparents. So I think it's
14 important to support these people.
15 They work hard, they pay taxes, they
16 educate their children.

17 And I would ask that
18 Council to listen to the opening
19 prayer from the pastor that
20 everybody is the same under the eyes
21 of God and everybody is entitled to
22 equal rights under the law. Thank
23 you.

24 CHIEF CLERK: We have Kate
25 Parker, Obona Haggins, Brennan Morag

1

2 and William Blocker.

3 MS. PARKER: Good morning.

4 Good morning my name is Kate Parker.

5 I'm the director of policy at the

6 Defender Association of

7 Philadelphia. Chief Defender

8 Hudson's out of state today, but she

9 asked me to offer public comment to

10 thank you all for your leadership in

11 protecting the rights of

12 Philadelphia's immigrant

13 communities.

14 From Councilmember Lozada's

15 work to expand legal resources, to

16 Councilmember Landau's work to hold

17 a hearing on our city's preparedness

18 to Councilmember Ahmad's

19 introduction of resolution 250171

20 your efforts are critical to keep

21 the spotlight on this issue.

22 Sixty-five percent of

23 people who were processed by the

24 Philadelphia Immigration Court since

25 October 2019 had no legal

1
2 representation at all, but with your
3 support we hope to change that. Our
4 office already works closely with
5 HYAS and the Nationality Services
6 Center, immigration experts here in
7 the city of Philadelphia because we
8 represent people who aren't U.S.
9 citizens as they navigate the
10 criminal justice process. But with
11 a city funding we aim to create an
12 immigration defense unit in our
13 office which will provide direct
14 representation to Philadelphians who
15 are at risk for deportation and
16 detention.

17 We know this legal
18 representation matters. Thirty-nine
19 percent of clients whose cases were
20 completed um were able to remain
21 with their families here in the
22 United States. That's compared to
23 19% of unrepresented people.

24 This is particularly
25 important for the maintenance and of

1
2 the integrity of the family because
3 we know that there's over 60,000
4 U.S. citizen children living in
5 Pennsylvania who resides with at
6 least one parent who is
7 undocumented.

8 Representation also ensures
9 that people with legitimate defenses
10 are able to raise them, people like
11 claiming asylum. And so we thank
12 you for your leadership on this
13 issue and recognizing that legal
14 representation isn't a luxury. It's
15 a necessity for people navigating
16 this system.

17 (Applause.)

18 MR. BLOCKER: Good
19 afternoon, my name is William
20 Blocker and I'd like to thank City
21 Council for giving me an opportunity
22 to speak on behalf of my Uncle James
23 Blocker. And I'd also like to thank
24 Councilman Jeffrey Young for pushing
25 the resolution to have a street name

1

2 changed to my uncle's name.

3 And if there was ever a man

4 that was deserving of such an honor

5 it would be my uncle, James Blocker.

6 And it's not just because he's been

7 an outstanding businessman in our

8 community for 60, I don't know, 50,

9 60 years, but the amount of

10 opportunity and leadership and

11 guidance that he's provided to young

12 black men in our community it's

13 just -- I can't even speak on it. I

14 can't even speak.

15 He's been a great leader

16 for our community. He's provided

17 numerous services for the old and

18 the young in our community. And

19 he's also raised up myself, his

20 nephews, his sons Greg and Kevin,

21 and numerous young black men from

22 our community to go on to be

23 valuable members of our society. So

24 if anybody's deserving of this honor

25 will be my uncle, James Blocker.

1

2

MR. HARRIS: Good morning,

3

everyone. Good morning, Council.

4

First I want to thank the Councilman

5

Jeffrey Young for introducing this

6

legislation here. My name is Keith

7

Harris, a leader 28th Ward and state

8

representative.

9

What can we say about

10

Mr. Blocker? Everything actually.

11

This is a fourth generation

12

business. This is -- you know,

13

sometimes black businesses they go

14

out of existence after the second

15

generation. Mr. Blocker have

16

survived the crack epidemic, prior

17

to that through the gang war

18

epidemic era. He survived all that

19

and he's still in business. The

20

integrity he brings to our

21

community, the help, the advocacy he

22

brings in the community. So I thank

23

the councilman and I want to thank

24

the community for even -- for us

25

asking to have this done.

1

2

Mr. blocker and his sons

3

Greg and Kevin is to be complimented

4

on the ethics they bring to the

5

Strawberry Mansion auto repair shop.

6

Okay. So they expanded from one

7

shop that was on 30th and Dauphin

8

Street and they expanded up the

9

street to 31st Street.

10

You know, so there's two

11

locations that both brothers -- one

12

operates one and the other operates

13

the other. So we want to thank this

14

family and we want to honor them by

15

doing a name change for at Dauphin

16

Street between 29th and Dauphin and

17

I believe 31st and Dauphin to James

18

Blocker Way and also he's a veteran.

19

So we want to thank councilman and

20

thank this Council.

21

MR. THOMPSON: My name is

22

Billy Thompson and I am also a

23

resident of the Strawberry Mansion

24

and would like to thank the Council

25

President, Councilman Jones and Bass

1

2 and all you guys, you are new guys
3 and thank you guys. Councilman
4 Young, thank you very much,
5 Councilman young. We've been doing
6 this for years that we've been
7 working on this.

8 I'm a person that grew up
9 and born and raised in Strawberry
10 Mansion and I grew up in the bad
11 side and now the Lord put me on the
12 another side, the pastor's side.
13 Now I'm Billy Thompson.

14 But what changed -- what
15 stood the same was Mr. Blocker. He
16 came and he's an Army veteran. He
17 came and started a business. He
18 turned it over to his son. Now the
19 other son went with a block up the
20 street now they own the whole block.
21 And there's many people in our
22 neighborhood, I'm 67, still owe him
23 for a tune-up when Mr. Blocker
24 opened up the shop. That's the kind
25 of guy he is.

1
2 So we just want to thank
3 Councilman Young for letting us have
4 our own hero in Strawberry Mansion
5 and councilman President Johnson and
6 the rest of you guys, we begging you
7 guys, please, give us this. Give us
8 the sign that we can have something
9 in our neighborhood that we grew up
10 in. We are homeowners. All of us
11 here are homeowners. And the ones
12 that -- I got a brother at 68th,
13 78th and Ogontz, he bring his car
14 all the way down there to get a
15 tune-up cuz he been born and raised.
16 My dad did it, I did it, my sons
17 bring their cars to him to the same
18 shop.

19 And Mr. Blocker had one
20 logo. I can fix everything, but
21 broken hearts. Amen. So y'all --
22 y'all bless us with that sign and we
23 be ever grateful we let our
24 neighborhood knows how this
25 happened. We could have had our

1
2 neighborhoods down here, but some of
3 them, you know, they couldn't come
4 down and all that. But if y'all
5 bless us and we have an honor, we
6 bring out our hamburgers, they all
7 going to come and we're going to
8 tell them what y'all did for us.
9 Amen. Amen.

10 CHIEF CLERK: We have Obona
11 Haggins and then Brendan Morag.

12 MR. MORAG: Good morning.
13 My name is Brendan Morag. Hard last
14 name so totally understand. I'm a
15 resident of graduate hospital
16 speaking in support of Councilmember
17 Young's bike lane bills. I wanted
18 to thank the Council and the Council
19 President Johnson for considering
20 them.

21 In the interest of not
22 repeating testimony about the safety
23 and the many benefits that a bike
24 lane brings, I will just say that I
25 moved to Philadelphia recently and

1

2 part of the reason that I did so was
3 because of the abundance of ways to
4 get around the city, whether it
5 would be SEPTA, whether it be bike
6 lanes, whether it be Indigo.

7 And I am enheartened by the
8 Council's willingness and ability to
9 continue to expand those options for
10 people like myself who don't own a
11 car or choose not to drive around
12 the city. So I just wanted to say
13 thank you all for considering the
14 bill. Hope they go through the
15 final passage. And I look forward
16 to hopefully seeing more residents
17 of the city who use these amenities
18 and attracting more people like
19 myself to the city through expanding
20 these critical pieces of
21 infrastructure. So thank you so
22 much.

23 MR. HAGGINS: Obona
24 Haggins, fourth generation, chattel
25 slavery survivor.

1

2 Today this body considers
3 Bill No. 250171, a resolution
4 recognizing the importance of legal
5 representation in protecting the
6 rights of immigrants when
7 interacting with ICE.

8 Legal representation is
9 indeed critical when individuals
10 face government action, however, I
11 must ask where is the legal
12 representation for American
13 Freedmen, who have suffered
14 systematic violations of their
15 rights for generations. Where is
16 the legal infrastructure to address
17 the devaluation of our homes, the
18 economic discrimination we endure
19 and the failure of council to define
20 the badges, vestiges and incidents
21 of slavery as required under the
22 13th Amendment.

23 We are cognizant of the
24 fact that well over 700,000 citizens
25 in Philadelphia have the liberty

1
2 interest in having this office. We
3 are cognizant that the Equal
4 Protection Clause of the 14th
5 Amendment mandates that this Council
6 provide an office that serves the
7 interest of the citizens who
8 descended from persons emancipated
9 from slavery and are recognized in
10 this city by the holiday Juneteenth.
11 We are cognizant that the ignorance
12 of the law is no excuse.

13 When the Philadelphia
14 Reparations Coalition for American
15 Freeman petition this body for
16 creation of an office, we're not
17 asking for a favor. The Honorable
18 Charles Sumner, author of the 13th
19 Amendment and Freeman's Bureau once
20 said we need a Freeman's Bureau not
21 because these people are Negroes,
22 but because they are men who have
23 have been generations despoiled by
24 their rights.

25 Councilman O'Rourke has

1
2 shut his doors of his office to my
3 organization because I exercise my
4 free speech on illegal immigration
5 labeling me a xenophobe. Yet it is
6 this very Council that refuses to
7 acknowledge the American Freedmen,
8 citizens whose ancestors built this
9 nation are still without legal
10 protections. If this Council truly
11 believes in legal representation as
12 a fundamental right, then let us
13 extend that right to the American
14 Freeman.

15 Starting with the
16 establishment of the office of
17 Freeman Affairs. I call on Council
18 President to cite Councilmember
19 O'Rourke for breach of office,
20 breach of oath and malpractice.
21 Obona Haggins, over and out. Thank
22 you.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

17 speeches on the part of the
18 minority?

19 The chair recognizes
20 minority leader Councilmember Kendra
21 Brooks.

22 COUNCILMEMBER BROOKS:
23 Thank you so much,
24 Councilmember -- I mean, Council
25 President.

1

2 Two weeks ago I introduced
3 a resolution condemning DOGE and
4 Elon Musk, mass firing of public
5 servants and cuts of services to
6 work -- that the working families
7 depend on.

8 In my resolution we
9 directly condemn the way he was
10 taking millions per day in tax
11 dollars for his business interest
12 while the average welfare recipient
13 has to survive off a couple hundred
14 dollars a month. This is what
15 oligarchy looks like and when
16 billionaires corrupt the legislative
17 process.

18 Since my introduction Musk
19 attacks have escalated on the
20 Department of Education, the
21 Department of Labor and every other
22 entity that limits his power or
23 protects working people against
24 corporate greed.

25 The Trump Administration

1

2 plans to cut food stamps, school
3 lunches, housing programs at a time
4 when working families are already
5 struggling. And they're doing it so
6 they can fund tax breaks for the
7 wealthy.

8 With these attacks from the
9 federal level, it's up to us to
10 fight back on the local level on the
11 behalf of the people of
12 Philadelphia. We do that with
13 legislation like the Power Act which
14 protects workers and strengthens our
15 Department of Labor, co-sponsored by
16 13 of my colleagues.

17 We do that by not limiting
18 our policy options to tax breaks for
19 corporations in the city with a
20 poverty rate of over 20%. We do
21 that by standing with our immigrant
22 and working class neighborhoods.
23 Philadelphia we protect our own.
24 Also, we do that by honoring the
25 work public servants -- public --

1

2 I'm sorry, honoring the work public
3 servants do in government everyday,
4 which brings me to my resolutions
5 today.

6 As we begin Women's History
7 Month this week, I wanted to
8 recognize two of my sheros. Once
9 again, North Philadelphia, Logan-
10 Nicetown area Ms. Sonia Garrett and
11 Ms. Charlene Samuels. Both of these
12 women have devoted countless hours,
13 over several decades to protecting
14 and improving their community in
15 Logan.

16 I'm going to start with
17 Ms. Sonia Garrett is a parent, a
18 foster parent, a block captain, a
19 poll worker and a leader of multiple
20 community organizations, including
21 the Logan Civic Association and the
22 Nicetown CDC. In other words, she
23 is constantly giving back to her
24 community in so many ways and almost
25 every way possible.

1
2 And next I have to
3 highlight Ms. Charlene Samuels, who
4 is the president of the Logan Civic
5 association and a fierce advocate
6 for her community. She's also the
7 constituent services representative
8 in my office and way before that she
9 was my constituent services rep. My
10 go-to person, no matter where she
11 was, what whatever role she served
12 in helping me navigate hard times in
13 my life. So I was honored to bring
14 her on as part of my team and I'm
15 even more honored to recognize her
16 right now in this moment.

17 What I can say about
18 Charlene, she has helped hundreds,
19 I'm saying probably more than that,
20 Philadelphians, find housing. She
21 resolved conflicts and access city
22 services. And when it comes to
23 serving constituents, she accepts
24 nothing less than excellence for
25 herself and for her fellow public

1

2 servants.

3 Both in her neighborhood

4 and here in City Hall, she has

5 raised the bar for what

6 Philadelphians expect and deserve.

7 And for me, she is a constant

8 reminder of what I am here to do

9 which is serve our people.

10 So I want to honor both of

11 these women and just say thank you.

12 Thank you for your commitment to our

13 community. Thank you for your

14 commitment to our government. And

15 thank you for your commitment to the

16 city. Thank you.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

19 Councilmember O'Rourke?

20 COUNCILMEMBER O'ROURKE:

21 Thank you, Council

22 President.

23 Elder Edward Fields, pastor

24 of the Ambassador Seat of Love

25 Church at the invitation of Member

1

2 Young, I believe thoroughly
3 fulfilled the request to provide
4 invocation for our proceedings this
5 morning.

6 I said invocation. That is
7 to invoke, to invoke, to invoke the
8 aid of providence and aid in the
9 sacred -- of the sacred, I should
10 say, into the business and the
11 dealings of the secular. World
12 because as Carl Bart said, we can't
13 do it ourselves.

14 So I want to thank Pastor
15 Buster, as he is affectionately
16 called, for being authentically led
17 of the spirit this morning. Spirit
18 of the living god and invoking that
19 aid, that providence and that Spirit
20 from the Lord's house into this, the
21 people's house, and doing so through
22 song as folks noticed.

23 Member Gauthier in just
24 turned around and said, IDK, looks
25 like you might have some

1
2 competition. I laugh, it's funny.
3 She says it in just, but it is funny
4 because it really ain't no
5 competition. For folks that don't
6 know, he was in a competition
7 already I think it was back in 2020
8 that brother made it, I think to the
9 finals, top 10, in a little
10 competition called Sunday's Best.
11 So if you looking for folks who can
12 sang and raise the praise Pastor
13 Buster is one of the best at it.
14 Also, no competition
15 because any of us at best are, but
16 willing vessels used of the same
17 spirit. We are one in the spirit as
18 some might say. Same spirit that
19 leads Pastor Buster is the same
20 spirit that leads me is the same
21 spirit that I believe led Member
22 Jones last week in his remarks at
23 the start of the holy month of
24 Ramadan is the same spirit that led
25 Member Landau and Member Jones to

1

2 stand with me when we called for the
3 release of one van after counsel is
4 the same spirit that moves any of us
5 to sing to speak, to write, to
6 legislate, to organize, to do those
7 things that are right and are just.

8 Same Spirit. We are one in
9 that spirit. Flowing from that
10 thought with a nod to the Prophet
11 Mohammed peace be upon him, I want
12 to offer up the words of the Prophet
13 Isaiah as an anchoring thought For
14 the Lent season. Our Muslim
15 siblings got started last week, now
16 is the Christian's turn to step into
17 this season of focus and fasting he
18 says and I quote:

19 "Is not this the kind of
20 fasting I have chosen to loose the
21 chains of injustice and untie the
22 cords of the yoke, to set the
23 oppressed free and to break every
24 yoke. Is it not to share your food
25 with the hungry and to provide the

1
2 poor wanderer with shelter, when you
3 see the naked to clothe them and not
4 to turn away from your own flesh and
5 blood. Then your light will break
6 forth like the Dawn and your healing
7 will quickly appear. Then your
8 righteousness will go before you and
9 the glory of the Lord will be your
10 rear guard. Then you will call and
11 the Lord will answer and you will
12 cry for help and he will say here am
13 I.

14 "If you do away with the
15 Yoke of oppression with the pointing
16 finger with malicious talk and if
17 you spend yourselves in behalf of
18 the hungry and satisfy the needs of
19 the oppressed then your light will
20 rise in the darkness and your night
21 will become like the noon day. The
22 Lord will guide you always and he'll
23 satisfy your needs in a sun-scorched
24 land."

25 This is a holy month of

1
2 Ramadan for our Muslims, a holy 40
3 days of fasting and focus for the
4 Christians. Our Jewish siblings
5 will be joining us not too, too long
6 from now as well in their own holy
7 days. And I just want to make sure
8 that we raise this up and be mindful
9 of the values and that spirit that
10 drives us to do any good thing.

11 I also want to mention and
12 thank Member Jones, Chairman Jones
13 again for cheering and hearing and
14 standing with, as I said Vietlead
15 and hontos last week, as well as
16 Member Landau.

17 So much going on that I
18 think speaks to what it means to do
19 work for and on behalf of the
20 people. Some of the issues that
21 were raised in that hearing that we
22 had earlier this week are of
23 importance to so many of you here in
24 this chamber, so many of my
25 colleagues. I'm thinking about the

1

2 forensic intensive recovery piece
3 that I think would be of interest to
4 the Kensington Caucus. Technical
5 violations of post-release
6 supervision that, I believe is of
7 interest to Councilman Thomas as
8 well as you Council President.

9 First Judicial District procedures
10 around bail hearings, I think many
11 folks are concerned about that.

12 I want to thank everyone
13 who came out to share their
14 thoughts, their concerns and their
15 experiences. We have to figure out
16 how to at least get our jails up to
17 the Constitutional standards which
18 is not a high bar. So I look
19 forward to building on this effort
20 in the months and years to come.

21 Not only that, we continue
22 to work on efforts that I believe
23 are kind of a through line and
24 important lifeline for all
25 Philadelphians across the city,

1

2 SEPTA. We hear about that from Mr
3 Blatstein every single week, however
4 annoyed you may be by his reminding
5 of us, I do believe it is important.
6 I agree with him on that front.

7 We did have a hearing
8 yesterday and many folks felt that
9 that was good. I want to thank
10 Member Driscoll, Chairman Driscoll
11 of the Transportation Committee,
12 Member Gauthier, Member Landau,
13 Council President and others that
14 came. There were some state reps
15 and senators there and I believe
16 that we had a good one.

17 I said in yesterday's
18 hearing and I'll say it again City
19 Council's remit on this issue boils
20 down to local funding which we
21 boosted last year. I'm excited to
22 see what more we can do to help
23 SEPTA and I don't see why any
24 elected official in Southeastern
25 Pennsylvania would disagree with

1

2 that. And I hope that we can all
3 keep that energy from City Hall to
4 Harrisburg.

5 I could speak to a number
6 of other things that are going on in
7 the world, but I think so much of
8 that has been said. That having
9 been said, Council President, I
10 thank you for your leadership in
11 this chamber and allowing a young
12 preacher to get up there and inspire
13 me today through his song and
14 letting it rise. I believe this
15 benefits all of us. Thank you,
16 Council President.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

18 Thank you very much.

19 Are there any speeches on
20 behalf of the majority?

21 The Chair recognizes the
22 gentleman from Northwest
23 Philadelphia, Councilmember Anthony
24 Phillips.

25 COUNCILMEMBER PHILLIPS:

1

2 Thank you, Council

3 President.

4 I just simply wanted to say

5 a couple words about Sonia Garrett

6 and Charlene Samuels. My first

7 public service as a councilmember in

8 Logan began with Charlene Samuels

9 and Sonia Garrett. It was a cleanup

10 around the Logan triangle area. And

11 everything that was said about those

12 two individuals today is true.

13 They are absolutely the

14 definition of what you call

15 individuals that are reluctant

16 leaders. They don't desire the

17 spotlight, but when called to serve,

18 they lead. And so I just want to

19 thank Councilwoman Kendra Brooks for

20 honoring them today and for all the

21 work that they're doing in Logan

22 community. Thank you all so much.

23 And I also want to thank

24 everyone for coming to the legal

25 dumping hearing. I received some

1

2 wonderful insight on how the city of
3 Philadelphia is doing a great job
4 with cleaning the city when it comes
5 to illegal dumping.

6 So Carlton Williams and
7 Commissioner Jacobs are doing some
8 great work there. However, we're
9 making some more progress around
10 enforcement and prevention and so
11 that's going to have to happen, and
12 that insight came from a lot of
13 advocates and residents. I want to
14 thank them for coming, and one of
15 them included Jim Harrity.

16 And a couple other people
17 mentioning that we need to begin to
18 shame the individuals who are doing
19 illegal dumping publicly, put them
20 on TV on social media, put their
21 faces and at some point they can't
22 do business in the city of
23 Philadelphia. So I'm really looking
24 forward to this morning what that
25 looks like in the coming months.

And lastly, I just want to thank the Philadelphia Federation of Teachers. They've been doing a good job with us, you know, working with all of us to shame this administration for all the cuts that they're doing at the federal government level around our education. And I was happy to join several of our members at -- where was I? At Prince Hall the other day, and then I didn't get make it to the Widener, but Prince Hall we did some lit drops around this issue and also some protesting.

And honestly, you know, we as Democrats just have to do a better job with uniting against Donald Trump. You know, today I just learned that our Democratic federal government, Congressional people, ten members of the democratic party voted to side with Republicans to censor Representative

1

2 Al Green. And to me that's just
3 inexcusable. The Republican Party
4 would have never did that to one of
5 their members even if they thought
6 that that was a wrong thing to do.
7 And honestly it wasn't a wrong thing
8 to do. It may not have been the
9 right time, but the right time for
10 us is for us to unite. So I'm very
11 disappointed in those 10 members and
12 we got to find a way to unite better
13 against Donald Trump. Thank you.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:
15 The Chair recognizes
16 Councilwoman Jamie Gauthier.

17 COUNCILMEMBER GAUTHIER:
18 Thank you, Council
19 President. Last year with the
20 support of this body, I was able to
21 create a new properly tax relief
22 program called the low income
23 properly tax freeze. This is a
24 program that provides relief for
25 low-income homeowners in freezing

1
2 their properly taxes at prior year
3 levels.

4 I thought that it was
5 important to do this because I knew
6 that an increase in assessments was
7 coming and that would hit
8 communities like mine especially
9 hard.

10 The low income properly tax
11 freeze is a vehicle to protect, you
12 know, some of the most vulnerable
13 homeowners in the city who are
14 overwhelmingly black and brown.

15 The original deadline for
16 the application for the program was,
17 I believe January 31st. By that
18 time we had seen just under 1,700 uh
19 homeowners apply for the program or
20 receive acceptance into the program,
21 but we believe that 62,000
22 homeowners in our city are eligible
23 for the program.

24 So here I want to take some
25 time to credit Councilmember Landau

1

2 who is my vice chair on the Housing
3 Committee. She has been tenacious
4 in tracking how many people are
5 being accepted into this program and
6 pushing for extensions so that we
7 can get more people in, so that they
8 could see this relief.

9 Her first push around this
10 extended the deadline to February
11 the 28th and today we co-introduced
12 a bill that would extend the
13 deadline even further to September
14 30th, to put it in line with the
15 application deadline for some of the
16 city's other tax relief programs.

17 Additionally, our bill as
18 proposed would allow for retroactive
19 qualification for future applicants
20 and move us towards the ultimate
21 ideal of automatic enrollment for
22 homeowners who are qualified so that
23 people aren't leaving money on the
24 table. We instituted this program
25 so that we could stop displacement

1
2 as it relates to increases in
3 properly taxes among the most
4 vulnerable homeowners in the city
5 and we want to make sure that
6 everyone is taking advantage of it.

7 One thing that is really
8 special about Philadelphia is that
9 we have always had been a city of
10 homeownership and that has been rang
11 through up and down the socio-
12 economic spectrum. So we even have
13 you know a significant amount of
14 homeowners who are low income and
15 working class and we need to protect
16 that and make sure that the those
17 folks are not displaced from their
18 neighborhoods, particularly by city
19 properly taxes.

20 And so I feel proud of the
21 work that we have done. Thank you
22 to this body. Thank you to
23 Councilmember Landau for pushing for
24 even more time and opportunity for
25 people to enroll in this vital

1

2 program. And I hope that these this
3 bill makes it across the finish
4 line. So thank you so much.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

6 You're welcome. Thank you.
7 Good job.

8 The Chair recognizes
9 Councilmember Curtis Jones, Jr.

10 COUNCILMEMBER JONES: Thank
11 you, Mr. President, and thank you
12 for those dates. Around 6:01 p.m.,
13 I'm going to enjoy them while I
14 break fast and I want to thank
15 Member O'Rourke for his insightful
16 commentary today and recognizing all
17 of the religions during this month,
18 whether it's Lent or Ramadan and
19 soon with the Jewish faith.

20 Many of us had to suffer
21 through the president's address. A
22 lot of us boycotted watching it not
23 to give him any extra ratings on the
24 subject matter. But as Member
25 Brooks talked about the many things

1

2 that he began to bully Americans
3 about, to intimidate countries
4 about, snatching, land grabbing and
5 bullying the world.

6 I want to focus on just one
7 aspect of that bullying which is
8 DEI, Diversity, Equity and
9 Inclusion. And more importantly,
10 some of the reactions private
11 corporations have had to that and
12 educational institutions have had to
13 that.

14 A lot of people hide
15 behind -- well, you know, the devil
16 made me do it. But some of us
17 believe that if you did it, you
18 wanted to do it anyway.

19 I'd like to focus on the
20 fact that this week I had the
21 opportunity to go up to St Joe's
22 University where a Member Morgan
23 Cephas of the house was able to
24 negotiate a community benefits
25 agreement that incorporated

1

2 businesses, community organizations,
3 schools. They adopted Gompers in a
4 way that is going to be a replica of
5 what is happening in Jamie
6 Gauthier's district with the
7 University of Penn.

8 I want you to know that
9 whether it's the boycott of Target
10 for the month of Lent we have power.
11 That brown people have the
12 purchasing power of Canada. If you
13 include black and brown and women,
14 that exceeds many nations throughout
15 around the world. So we can choose
16 to fight back in that regard.

17 Lord knows I hate a bully.
18 Lord knows out of all -- I fought
19 bullies when I wouldn't fight for
20 myself about stuff because they were
21 bullying others. We have to choose
22 to stand up. When it comes to
23 education institutions and they say,
24 well, he made me do it, I can't.
25 What do I do? I may lose money.

1
2 I'm going to say to you life is
3 hard, but we can choose to look at
4 pilots to determine whether or not
5 you're paying your fair share,
6 whether or not you are contributing
7 to the communities that you shadow.
8 Choose your heart. You can
9 either stand up to them or you going
10 to have to face us, but we will not
11 sit by and be bullied by anyone.
12 There's too many people depending on
13 what we do to defend them in this
14 time. So we've introduced a
15 resolution that looks at education
16 institutions and I'm going to
17 applaud Member Gauthier for what
18 she's doing to work it out with
19 Penn. I get it. I'm thankful for
20 what St Joe's does, but we're going
21 to look at each of those
22 institutions to determine if you
23 back up for this because you think
24 you're getting bullied, then we need
25 to evaluate what you do for the

1

2 communities in which you reside.

3 To the people who are

4 listening, we ain't scared. You

5 can't -- you might think if you

6 ignore a bully, if you lower your

7 gaze to a bully or if you whine to a

8 bully, that's like the rationale of

9 a rabbit, whining to a wolf. It's

10 only going to attract them. Stand

11 up, hold your head up, fight back.

12 Thank you, Mr. President.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

14 Thank you, Mr Jones. Very

15 well said.

16 The Chair recognizes

17 Councilmember Dr. Nina Ahmad.

18 COUNCILMEMBER AHMAD: Thank

19 you, Council President. And I thank

20 my colleague Curtis Jones for his

21 remarks to really talk about

22 standing up when it's important.

23 And I also want to thank all my

24 colleagues today for voting for the

25 adoption of the resolution 250171.

1

2 Philadelphia must stand for
3 justice and due process. Every
4 person regardless of immigration
5 status deserves access to fair legal
6 representation. Legal support is
7 not just a privilege, it is a
8 fundamental issue of justice and due
9 process.

10 We cannot let a 34 times
11 convicted felon make division
12 amongst us and make us despair for
13 our humanity. We will not do that
14 here in Philadelphia. Immigrants
15 have always been a corner stone of
16 America's history, economy and
17 culture.

18 We cannot ignore the fact
19 that our country was built by
20 immigrants, some who were brought
21 here against their will and even our
22 founding fathers were by definition
23 immigrants themselves arriving
24 without permission of the indigenous
25 people who were already here.

1
2 Demonizing immigrants is
3 both hypocritical and
4 counterproductive. Instead we
5 should recognize their contributions
6 and ensure they have legal
7 protections that they deserve. Many
8 immigrants face complicated legal
9 proceedings that can determine their
10 ability to stay in the country, yet
11 they often lack proper legal
12 support. Studies show that detained
13 immigrants with legal
14 representations are 11 times more
15 likely to seek relief and twice as
16 likely to obtain relief than those
17 without counsel.

18 Ensuring legal aid for
19 immigrants is not just the right
20 thing to do, it also strengthens our
21 communities by preventing unjust
22 detentions and deportations. You
23 know, this ICE enforcement creates
24 fear and instability that continues
25 to make our communities afraid.

1

2 Many immigrants are unaware of their
3 legal rights when confronted by ICE
4 and may unknowingly waive protections
5 available to them.

6 This resolution ensures
7 that immigrant communities know
8 their rights and have access to
9 trusted legal resources when needed.

10 We must expand partnerships with
11 non-profit organizations, such as
12 the American Immigration Lawyers
13 Association, Philadelphia Legal
14 Assistance, the ACLU, and others
15 that were mentioned in testimony
16 today about this resolution.

17 Philadelphia's Public
18 Defenders are taking a crucial step
19 by forming an Immigration Defense
20 Unit, which will provide essential
21 legal support to immigrants and
22 those entangled in the justice
23 system. Increasing awareness of
24 legal hotlines pro bono legal
25 services and the community training

1

2 will help our residents navigate
3 immigration enforcement challenges.

4 As I said, Philadelphia has
5 been since the time of abolition and
6 before a sanctuary city. It has
7 given sanctuary to those who have
8 needed it. And so we have a culture
9 and a tradition in this city and we
10 need to continue that. And we
11 cannot allow divisive voices to move
12 us on this issue and division
13 amongst us when the humanity of us
14 need to rise to the top.

15 I thank you, Council
16 President, for actually being -- for
17 your cultural competency which all
18 of us must exercise. My colleague
19 Curtis Jones already thanked you for
20 these dates that people use to break
21 their fast. These gestures tell us
22 that we are a, you know, a multi-
23 ethnic space here. And you doing
24 that signals to all of us that the
25 leadership recognizes that. And

1

2 that's why I stand with all of you
3 to say we must fight injustice where
4 we see it and we must give people
5 due process.

6 So I thank you very much.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

8 Thank you.

9 The Chair recognizes

10 Councilmember Jeffrey J. Young, Jr.

11 COUNCILMEMBER YOUNG: Thank
12 you, Mr. President.

13 I want to thank my
14 colleagues today for passing a
15 package of legislation pertaining to
16 transportation safety in the 5th
17 Council District.

18 Since taking office as
19 chair of the Streets and Services
20 Committee and vice chair
21 Transportation and Public Utilities,
22 transportation safety has always
23 been a priority. So after community
24 engagement review of traffic studies
25 provided by the Office of

1

2 Transportation and Infrastructure
3 Systems, these locations were
4 identified as areas where bicycle
5 lanes could improve connectivity and
6 public safety with minimal effect on
7 the quality of life.

8 So I understand how
9 controversial some of the proposals
10 could be, but we want to make sure
11 that safety and quality of life are
12 always at the forefront of what we
13 do here in the 5th Council District.
14 I look forward to continuing to
15 enhance public safety for all public
16 safety measures for all in our city.
17 And, again, we're looking to see
18 where we can have the most minimal
19 effects on the quality of life for
20 neighbors.

21 And there's a lot of, you
22 know, Donald Trump and Trump
23 Administration bashing today so I'm
24 going to keep up with that same
25 spirit, something I typically don't

1

2 do. But as lawyers, we're held to
3 the highest legal, ethical and moral
4 standards. So I want to applaud the
5 Philadelphia Bar Association for
6 issuing a statement condemning
7 recent attacks.

8 U.S. Marshals have worn
9 federal judges of unusually high
10 threats as Elon Musk and other Trump
11 Administration allies continually
12 discredit judges calling them
13 corrupt. These attacks threaten
14 judicial independence and we cannot
15 allow these attacks on the integrity
16 of judges just because they don't
17 rule in your favor.

18 I'm going to read the
19 statement of the Philadelphia Bar
20 Association Chancellor Katayun
21 Jaffari because I couldn't have said
22 it even better. You know, "We are
23 deeply concerned at the
24 unprecedented escalation of attacks
25 against the federal judiciary by the

1
2 current administration and just last
3 week you know the attacks by the
4 president himself against a private
5 law firm that was retained by a
6 former special counsel. These
7 attacks have included calls for the
8 impeachment of Judges who have
9 stayed the enforcement of executive
10 orders by the President and actions
11 by the President's Administration
12 and called by the President and some
13 members of Congress to restrict
14 judicial review in these cases.

15 "These actions of the Trump
16 Administration are directly in
17 conflict with the mission of our
18 association and the values of our
19 profession, which include respect
20 for the rule of law, the importance
21 of judicial independence and the
22 need to advance fair and equal
23 administration of justice.

24 "As judges and attorneys we
25 commit to supporting and defending

1
2 the Constitution. No judge or
3 attorney should fear personal or
4 professional retribution for the
5 rulings they make or the clients
6 whom they represent. These attacks
7 are also dangerous in that they
8 erode a public trust in the justice
9 system which is essential to the
10 ability to function effectively and
11 to our society as a whole.

12 Our republic was founded
13 upon a system of checks and balances
14 to ensure that no single branch of
15 government could exercise unfettered
16 power. In the tradition and spirit
17 of the Philadelphia lawyer, the
18 Philadelphia Bar Association stands
19 with the American Bar Association in
20 support of our federal Judiciary and
21 all attorneys representing their
22 clients in the pursuit of upholding
23 the judicial system."

24 I really think that we have
25 to, you know, take into

1
2 consideration that the judiciary is
3 our last stance against fascism of
4 Donald Trump. Right, this is our
5 last stance. And if they continue
6 to try to erode our justice system,
7 it's just to ensure that their
8 policies, their unconstitutional
9 policies can then be deemed to be
10 constitutional.

11 When Donald Trump ran, he
12 ran for office to literally change
13 the face of this country. They
14 want to make sure that things that
15 we deem to be sacred to our republic
16 are no longer sacred, so then they
17 can become this dictatorship that he
18 wants to create here in America. So
19 we have to keep standing up, we have
20 to keep fighting back and we have to
21 unite as a country, not just as
22 Democrats, as a country to stand up
23 to this tyranny that Donald Trump is
24 trying to reign over our nation.

25 So thank you,

1

2 Mr. President, for allowing me that
3 time.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

5 Thank you very much.

6 The Chair recognizes

7 Councilman Quetcy Lozada.

8 COUNCILMEMBER LOZADA:

9 Thank you, Council
10 President.

11 First, I want to thank
12 Councilmember Dr. Nina Ahmad for her
13 resolution today regarding the
14 importance of legal representation.
15 (Latin speaking message to the community.)

16 COUNCILMEMBER LOZADA: I
17 always find it interesting that
18 people feel comfortable coming into
19 public spaces and spewing hate. I
20 find it -- I find it surprising that
21 they can spew hate and then walk out
22 before it's addressed.

23 It's starting to frustrate
24 me. And if you know that when I get
25 frustrated sometimes I can't control

1
2 my passion. And so, you know, with
3 all due respect, Council President,
4 when it happens again expect for me
5 to respond to it. Because if we
6 don't put an end to hate in spaces
7 like this, people are going to
8 continue to feel emboldened and
9 think that it is acceptable. Yes,
10 this is a space where everyone
11 should be able to speak freely about
12 how they feel, but it needs to be
13 done respectfully.

14 Immigrants contribute a lot
15 to this city, to the Commonwealth
16 and to the nation. And it doesn't
17 matter how they got here, it doesn't
18 matter what the situation is. If
19 they're -- if they're responsible
20 contributing citizens to our nation
21 then they should be allowed to be
22 amongst us and figure out how they
23 correct or become legal.

24 Not everyone has the
25 luxuries of being able to pay the

1

2 thousands of dollars that it costs
3 in a process that is difficult to
4 understand. And so I offer my
5 office -- I said it in Spanish, I'm
6 happy to say it in English.

7 My office is available to
8 all of those families who are living
9 in our city regardless of whether
10 you live in the 7th Council District
11 or not please visit us. We will
12 connect you to those organizations
13 who provide legal services or
14 resources so that you continue to
15 thrive in our city, so that you know
16 what your rights are.

17 But you cannot stop sending
18 your children to school, you cannot
19 stop visiting our businesses, you
20 cannot stop working, you cannot stop
21 going to places where you find food
22 to put on your table. We are here
23 to help. My office is here to help.
24 We're in 484 in City Hall and we are
25 at 4821 Frankford Avenue for those

1

2 families who find themselves
3 confused or frustrated or afraid of
4 the legal process.

5 I also want to share with
6 you that I had the opportunity to
7 visit Wellness Court yesterday and I
8 invite all of my colleagues to visit
9 Wellness Court on Wednesdays at 3901
10 Whitaker Avenue.

11 I had an opportunity to sit
12 back and watch the process. I
13 watched real compassion and empathy
14 towards those who are actively
15 living in addiction. I watched the
16 amount of resources that they were
17 able to be connected to and I and I
18 was able to hear success stories in
19 that courtroom.

20 I never had the opportunity
21 to meet Judge Lewandowski, but I
22 have to say that I have deep respect
23 for him because he's able to connect
24 with individuals who are struggling
25 in a way that I've never seen a

1

2 Judge be able to connect with. And
3 there were people of all races in
4 that courtroom from all walks of
5 life, most not originally from here.

6 And so that only confirms
7 to me that while many don't agree,
8 the work that we're continuing to do
9 in my neighborhood is how we have to
10 do it.

11 I participated in a lot of
12 meetings this week that also further
13 confirmed that individuals don't
14 want people like me to do the work
15 that I'm doing in the Kensington
16 community because they don't want it
17 to move into their community. I ask
18 you, what are you doing to protect
19 your community? What are you doing
20 to respond to the need in your
21 community? Are you talking to your
22 residents and where is your
23 compassion and empathy for those who
24 are struggling?

25 Happy to continue the

1

2 conversation and to continue to work
3 to represent the residents of the
4 7th Council District because they
5 also deserve quality of life. Thank
6 you.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

8 Thank you. Very well said.

9 Councilmember Isaiah

10 Thomas.

11 COUNCILMEMBER THOMAS: Good

12 afternoon, Council President.

13 I want to first thank my
14 colleague Councilmember Brooks for
15 the people that she recognized
16 today. I don't even know if you
17 know this, Councilmember Brooks, but
18 Charlene Samuels and I used to work
19 together. We were colleagues in
20 another lifetime and I've watched
21 the amazing work that she's done,
22 both working for city government and
23 the non-profit sector. And she's a
24 pillar in the Logan community,
25 Logan-Olney section of the city of

1

2 Philadelphia. So I just wanted to
3 commend her on that.

4 Today we passed a
5 resolution around the Pennsylvania
6 Municipal League, 125 years of
7 celebration. I want to thank
8 Councilmember Brian O'Neill, as well
9 as former Councilmember Derek Green.

10 And for those of you who
11 don't know Councilmember Brian
12 O'Neill is a legend in the space of
13 National League of Cities. He's a
14 former president, he's a board
15 member, and he's somebody who
16 elected officials all across the
17 country look to for advice, wisdom
18 and things of that capacity.

19 And every time I go to the
20 National Convention this past year
21 it was in Tampa Bay, Brian's praises
22 are sung and he's always
23 representing Philadelphia in a great
24 way. So thank you colleague, we
25 appreciate you.

1

2

Two other things. So I

3

also want to say thank you to

4

Councilmember Majority Leader

5

Gilmore-Richardson, Minority Leader

6

Kendra Brooks, Councilmember Rue

7

Landau, our state partners and

8

everybody who stood together

9

concerning issues related to funding

10

for public education.

11

Similar to most people

12

still listening right now,

13

Councilmember Lozada, your remarks

14

and other members remarks,

15

Councilmember Ahmad, Councilmember

16

Gauthier, Councilmember O'Rourke,

17

you guys are on point today. And if

18

I could just add an attachment to

19

the comments that we've heard public

20

education is on the list of things

21

to be chopped.

22

When we look at the threat

23

that the recent conversation could

24

consist of if actualized for

25

children in the city of

1

2 Philadelphia, this could be more
3 detrimental than the Corbett
4 Administration. And anybody know
5 about the cuts during a Corbett
6 Admininistration know that as of
7 yesterday we're still trying to
8 recover from those detrimental
9 decisions.

10 So I pray, I hope and I
11 stand united with my colleagues in
12 City Council that will continue to
13 fight for every child in the city of
14 Philadelphia and across the
15 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania to
16 assure as Councilmember Gilmore-
17 Richardson would say, no matter what
18 zip code you live in, you have
19 access to a quality education.

20 Last, but not least,
21 Council President, today we voted to
22 approve the mid year transfer. And
23 I want to say thank you to all
24 members of the Appropriation
25 Committee, but especially our

1

2 chairman Councilmember Mark Squilla.

3 In that mid year

4 appropriation we had a lot of

5 different things that we voted on,

6 but one of the things that I just

7 want to keep pushing is that we

8 voted to invest in 2026. And I know

9 it was some tough negotiations as it

10 relates to putting dollars and cents

11 into 2026, but here we are.

12 While I am proud of some of

13 the things that we are spending

14 money on, I do have concerns about

15 other things that we're spending

16 money on and I'm hoping that as we

17 transition into budget negotiations

18 listening to the Mayor's budget next

19 week, we could begin to see 2026 be

20 more of a priority to the

21 administration, as well as to our

22 state partners and federal partners.

23 Because 50 years from now when folks

24 get ready for our uh two was that

25 would that be 2076, they're going to

1

2 look back at 2026. They're not
3 going to ask about what happened
4 during COVID, they're not going to
5 ask about votes that we've taken on
6 different issues that have a huge
7 impact on the city of Philadelphia.

8 Just like we're looking
9 back on 1976 and 1876, they're going
10 to look back on 2026 and see if we
11 got it right. And I'd be damned if
12 I'm sitting in City Council and we
13 get it wrong. So I appreciate all
14 of my colleagues and the great work
15 that folks have done to advocate for
16 what we know will be a historic year
17 and I look forward to the work to
18 continue over the next couple months
19 as we indulge in budget
20 negotiations.

21 Thank you, Council
22 President. And a special shout out
23 to you, Council President, because
24 we are about to start budget season
25 and I know that there have been a

1
2 lot of organizations talking about
3 transparency in the budget process
4 and I don't know what's more
5 transparent than coming into your
6 neighborhood and listening to you
7 tell us what you want us to spend
8 money on, as well as what you don't.
9 So I'm looking forward to not just
10 our in-council chambers budget
11 negotiations, but also listening to
12 the constituents across the city of
13 Philadelphia tell us what their
14 priorities are.

15 Thank you, Council
16 President. Thank you, colleagues.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

18 Thank you, Majority Whip
19 Thomas.

20 Rue Landau?

21 COUNCILMEMBER LANDAU:

22 Thank you, Council
23 President. Thank you, colleagues.

24 Today I introduced a
25 resolution declaring March 2nd to

1
2 8th as National Consumer Protection
3 Week, in the city of Philadelphia.
4 The recent dismantling by the Trump
5 Administration of the Consumer
6 Financial Protection Bureau has
7 ceased all monitoring, ended
8 lawsuits and cut staff making
9 consumers even more susceptible to
10 scams and unscrupulous practices.

11 The good news is that last
12 year City Council adopted the
13 consumer protection -- the city's
14 Consumer Protection ordinance, which
15 I introduced with the Parker
16 Administration and it empowers the
17 city to legally protect consumers
18 throughout Philadelphia.

19 As the federal onslaught
20 continues we must protect ourselves
21 at the local and state level.
22 Thankfully we have resources in
23 place, but I want to urge
24 Philadelphians to be alert for signs
25 of fraud and scams and contact

1
2 consumer.protection@phila.gov or a
3 financial counselor or a legal
4 service provider if they believe
5 that they've been affected.

6 Another resolution I
7 introduced this week is for Teen
8 Tech Week, in the city of
9 Philadelphia. It's recognizing the
10 crucial role of digital literacy in
11 today's world.

12 As technology continues to
13 evolve and as we continue to fight
14 for what my dream is making
15 Philadelphia the most teen friendly
16 city in America, our teens must have
17 the tools they need to navigate the
18 digital landscape safely,
19 responsibly and effectively.

20 Teen Tech Week underscores
21 our commitment to closing the
22 digital divide and fostering
23 environment where all young
24 Philadelphians can thrive in the
25 digital age.

1

2 I'd also like to recognize
3 and congratulate Philadelphia's own
4 Coleman Domingo on his second Oscar
5 nomination for the film Sing Sing.
6 Coleman couldn't be here today, he
7 is going to come soon and I will
8 tell you all when he can be here,
9 but he's amazingly honored for this
10 recognition today in Council.

11 His portrayal of the
12 wrongfully convicted Divine G. who
13 spent more than 25 years behind bars
14 is especially timely as
15 Councilmember O'Rourke hearing this
16 week examined how we can reduce the
17 Philadelphia prison population,
18 provide resources for those who were
19 incarcerated and ultimately close
20 the Detention Center.

21 Born and raised in
22 Philadelphia in the 4th Councilmanic
23 District so Councilman Jones was
24 very happy to be a prime co-sponsor,
25 Coleman Domingo has continuously

1

2 made our city proud through his
3 artistry and dedication and the
4 powerful stories he brings to life
5 on screen.

6 His leading actor
7 nomination not only highlights his
8 immense talent, but also serves as a
9 reminder to everyone on this Council
10 that our incarcerated individuals
11 are people with humanity and
12 dignity.

13 I watched Sing sing last
14 night and I cannot tell you the
15 connection that I felt between the
16 actors and those who were portraying
17 folks behind bars and the real life
18 folks behind bars. And the stories
19 we heard this week in Councilman
20 O'Rourke's hearings really
21 underscores that their life does not
22 end behind the walls. We have a
23 responsibility to serve them as much
24 as any other resident, if not more,
25 since they need to be equipped with

1

2 resources when they come home.

3 Thank you to Coleman for
4 bringing this story to life, for
5 making Philly proud and
6 congratulations.

7 And finally, I'd like to
8 thank Councilmember Gauthier, chair
9 of the Housing Committee for her
10 leadership with partnering with me
11 to introduce the proposed extension
12 to the low-income real estate tax
13 freeze and the Revenue Department
14 for their openness to extend the
15 deadline so that more households can
16 sign up.

17 Philadelphians are leaving
18 money on the table by letting this
19 freeze pass them by. We must reach
20 them. For those who may be
21 eligible, but who have not yet
22 signed up, there's now even more
23 time. The goal is to get the
24 deadline to September 30th.

25 If you meet the income

1
2 requirements, you're eligible for
3 reduction to your real estate taxes
4 and a freeze so they won't go up
5 over time. Contact your
6 councilmember, contact my office or
7 go to phila.gov to apply for this
8 essential tax relief.

9 Thank you very much,
10 Council President.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT JOHNSON:

12 Thank you. Good work.

13 Any other speeches from
14 members of the majority?

15 Hearing none, the Chair
16 recognizes Councilmember Thomas for
17 a motion to adjourn.
