2 Thank you very much, Councilwoman.

3 Before we proceed with the
4 consideration of the public comment,
5 we're going to take a five-, maybe
6 ten-minute break to give our technology
7 professionals an opportunity to connect
8 everyone for our public comment session.
9 So we'll be back shortly.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you, and good morning again. We
16 are now reconnected and we're going to
17 proceed with our Council session.

18 So now that everyone is
19 connected to the meeting and before
20 considering the resolutions and bills we
21 have before us today, we will consider
22 public comment. It will go as follows:

23 Public comment must concern
24 matters on the Second Reading and Final
25 Passage Calendars for possible action at

2 a session of Council. A speaker on any
3 of those matters must sign up in order to
4 testify. You must call 215-686-3406 by
5 3:00 p.m. the day before the session to
6 sign up for public comment.

7 When you call, we will take
8 your name, phone number, the number of
9 the legislative item you are commenting
10 on and whether you are in support of or
11 against the legislation, and add your
12 name to the list. We will then telephone
13 each person on the list during the
14 Council session and invite them to our
15 remote meeting.

16 Under ideal circumstances, they
17 will each have three minutes to speak.
18 Today I think we are just under that
19 threshold, so we're going to do three
20 minutes today. So please be concise and
21 get as much testimony that you can in
22 during that timeframe.

23 But in order to be fair to all
24 those wishing to speak, I intend to hold
25 faithfully to the established time limit.

1 10/21/21 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 So once invited to the meeting and asked
3 to begin your testimony, a timer will be
4 started. We will monitor your remaining
5 time throughout your testimony, and when
6 there are 30 seconds remaining to your
7 time, you will be reminded of this, and
8 once your allotted time has passed, you
9 will be asked to conclude your remarks
10 and shortly thereafter you will be muted
11 and disconnected from the remote meeting.

12 I also reserve the right to
13 limit the number of speakers where
14 repetitious comments are being made on
15 the same subject matter, which could
16 affect callbacks for public comment at
17 the meeting.

18 And also be aware that the
19 public meeting is being recorded. And
20 because the meeting is public,
21 participants and viewers have no
22 reasonable expectation of privacy. So by
23 continuing to be in the meeting, you are
24 consenting to being recorded.

4 please call the first name on our list of
5 speakers today.

6 CHIEF CLERK: The first speaker
7 we have today is Sonja Bingham,
8 commenting on 210840.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
10 morning.

11 MS. BINGHAM: Good morning,
12 everyone. My name is Sonja Bingham. I
13 am the person who Councilman Oh is basing
14 the resolution on. Approximately three
15 weeks ago, my house was firebombed by bad
16 actors in the Kensington community.

17 First, I'd like to just state
18 that the entire reason why this
19 resolution is even a subject of topic is
20 because of failed leadership. We, the
21 residents in Kensington/Harrowgate area,
22 have been tasked with the responsibility
23 of policing our own communities, which
24 has left us to be targets.

25 The resolution to offer a

2 reward in the amount of \$20,000 I do not
3 believe is a big ask. There are many
4 reasons in which I believe that this city
5 and all of the agents that have the power
6 to enact policy in our community should
7 stand behind it.

8 We are your first layer of
9 leadership within the community. We are
10 an extension of who you are. If you all
11 do not stand behind sending a clear
12 message that this type of act will not be
13 tolerated against leaders in the
14 community, you all are next. It has been
15 proven by the ATVs. It has been proven
16 by the homeless and opioid epidemic,
17 which is now spilling out into the rest
18 of the City.

19 If you all do not stand behind
20 the attacks and saying we will not
21 tolerate this and we will prosecute to
22 the fullest extent of the law and leave
23 no stone unturned and give whatever

3 Thank you for your time.

5 Thank you very much for your testimony.

6 We appreciate it.

10 morning. State your name for the record
11 and please proceed with your testimony.

12 MS. FELDMAN: Good morning. My
13 name is Brooke Feldman and I am
14 testifying in support of this resolution.
15 I agree with everything that Sonja
16 shared.

17 I enter into the conversation
18 as somebody who, you know, ran the
19 streets of Kensington using drugs. My
20 mom lived and used and died in Kensington
21 also long before it became the crisis
22 that it is today. And, you know, I spent
23 years working with people who currently
24 use drugs in Kensington, trying to
25 support them with making positive changes

2 in their life.

3 And I think it was really
4 important to get in, this short period of
5 time in, that it is absolutely
6 unacceptable what happened to Sonja, and
7 when she said that, you know, you're
8 next, it really is accurate that it could

10 And I think that a point that
11 really has to be pulled out is that I sat
12 in the meetings over the years where the
13 folks who live in Kensington, which I do
14 not, I get to go home and not have to
15 worry about my home being firebombed, but
16 the people who live there have been
17 explicitly asked to police their own
18 neighborhood, to kind of get out there
19 and clean up other people's trash, to be
20 able to work with law enforcement to
21 report, you know, drug sales in a way
22 where retaliation isn't feared and
23 there's actual protection. And I think
24 that what happened with Sonja is an
25 example of just the utter deterioration

2 to the point where what were once at
3 least unspoken norms and the code of the
4 street, so to speak, are gone.

5 And so, you know, what it used
6 to be and what it would be in anyone
7 else's neighborhood is that when someone
8 says, hey, can you please get off my step
9 or you can even say it in a more angry
10 way because it's the ninth time that week
11 they had asked the person or somebody,
12 you know, it shouldn't be a matter of
13 having to worry about whether I'm going
14 to be murdered because I asked somebody
15 to get off of my steps.

16 And I think that in addition to
17 there being a message that this is not
18 okay, that this is not part of the code,
19 this is not part of civil society, I
20 support this resolution, as much as I am
21 opposed to incarceration, but I think
22 that this needs to become a larger
23 conversation regarding how conditions
24 have deteriorated to the point where we
25 see that it has become okay to do things

2 like this.

3 And what I want to close with
4 is that the timing is pretty relevant
5 where we see an article from Dr. Eugenia
6 South that was published in the Inquirer
7 regarding research that demonstrates that
8 the environment that we live in has an
9 impact on our well-being and our health,
10 which I think we know, right? But then
11 also she talks about the violence and
12 that we see increased violence in
13 communities where there is blight, where
14 there is litter, where there is just poor
15 sanitation, where the norms and the codes
16 have broken down.

17 And so it is no surprise that
18 we see violence now sticking up, and I
19 think the time to act has long been now,
20 because it will be someone else next, and
21 this is not okay.

22 Thank you.

5 peaceful means to address conflict. As
6 you may know, the Commission employs
7 mediation to resolve complaints filed by
8 those who feel aggrieved.

9 We are all aware that conflict
10 is inevitable. While resolving conflict
11 is vital, conflict in and of itself is
12 normal and even healthy. Different
13 perspectives offer new ideas and fresh
14 approaches to problem-solving.

15 While problems go unaddressed,
16 tensions may escalate. Cultural
17 conditioning and societal norms have had
18 a huge impact on how society responds to
19 conflict. Cultural conditioning has
20 resulted in normalizing maladaptive
21 coping methods for some. Maladaptive
22 coping methods includes, but are not
23 limited to, verbal altercations and/or
24 physical violence.

25 Effective communication,

emotional intelligence, self-awareness,
and empathy are key elements of conflict
resolution. Being trauma-informed is
also a necessary tool. Becoming
trauma-informed involves recognizing that
individuals who suffer trauma often pass
trauma on to others with whom they
interact.

For instance, children who
witness outbursts may be more likely to
bully other children, hence being
trauma-informed will increase
self-awareness and allow for better
responses to conflict.

In closing, conflict resolution
ensures a more harmonious environment,
less disruption and dissatisfaction. It
enhances relationships in school,
personal, and work relationships as well.

8 testimony is about the firebombing of a
9 friend's house here in Harrowgate. We
10 live in a billion-dollar drug business
11 here in Kensington and Harrowgate. It's
12 a very frightening place to live right
13 now, and we don't seem to be getting the
14 resources that we need. As such, regular
15 community members are tasked with trying
16 to keep drug dealers off their blocks,
17 trying to keep the addicts from using on
18 their block, and as a community, it's not
19 fair to us as ordinary citizens to have
20 to police our community.

21 My friend Sonja is one such
22 community member, and for her efforts,
23 her house got firebombed. Like someone
24 literally tried to kill my friend and her
25 children.

2 It is very disheartening for me
3 to live in a community where doing the
4 right thing and standing up for justice
5 and the right way of life can in turn get
6 you murdered.

7 I'm not sure what City Council
8 is willing to do to help us in this
9 plight, but we have very active, caring
10 members of this community who try to help
11 change the narrative of this community,
12 and like I said, it's very frightening
13 that if you stand up and you say, no, we
14 don't want you selling drugs on our
15 corner or, no, we don't want you using
16 drugs in front of our children, we in
17 turn are met with violence and sometimes
18 death.

19 So I would just hope that we
20 would get the resources that this
21 community needs so that the regular
22 residents don't feel as though they have
23 to take on policing their community,
24 because there are resources put in place
25 here that needs to be put in place here

2 actually to help us in our fight to keep
3 the drug dealers off of our blocks, to
4 keep the drug addicts from using in front
5 of our children.

6 So it is my hope that more
7 resources will be poured into this

10 officials or the police force that should
11 be actually doing the job for which they
12 get paid to do.

13 So that is my testimony. I
14 hope that it was helpful in drafting this
15 resolution to get this reward offered for
16 my friend's case, and maybe it will offer
17 some movement in someone to come forward
18 so we know who actually tried to kill my
19 friend, because that's what they did.
20 They literally tried to kill her and her
21 family.

22 So like I said, I hope this
23 helps in some way, but we are very
24 traumatized living in this community as
25 regular citizens. It's just not fair

our blocks just because we don't want our

will help to catch the people who tried

12 and Youth to conduct joint hearings to
13 investigate the organizational and
14 systemic failures that led to the return
15 of three girls to their sexually abusive
16 father, who resumed the abuse after their
17 return, introduced today by Councilman
18 Johnson.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
20 Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson.

21 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Council
22 President, colleagues, I am going to make
23 a motion to withdraw this resolution. I
24 will be deferring this issue to
25 Councilwoman Cindy Bass and Councilman

2 David Oh, who chairs the Special
3 Committee on Child Separation, to review
4 child separation in Philadelphia's child
5 welfare system and develop
6 recommendations to ensure compliance with
7 state child protective services laws to
8 protect children and due process rights
9 of families and prevent the unnecessary
10 breakups of families.

11 My two colleagues have been
12 working very diligently on this issue,
13 and so I am going to defer and withdraw
14 this resolution to them for their
15 leadership so they continue addressing
16 this very, very serious and critical
17 issue. And so I'm very disgusted by it,
18 but I look forward to the hard work that
19 they will do to get to the bottom of why
20 these three young ladies were returned
21 back to their father, who repeatedly
22 raped them over and over and over and
23 over again.

24 So I know they're up to the
25 job, and I know for a fact that they will

2 do great leadership work around getting
3 to the bottom of this issue.

4 With that being said, I make a
5 motion to withdraw this resolution.

6 (Duly seconded.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
8 been moved and properly seconded.

9 All those in favor indicate by
10 saying aye.

11 (Aye.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Those opposed?

14 (No response.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
16 ayes have it. The resolution is
17 withdrawn. Thank you very much. Thank
18 you, Councilman.

19 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
20 authorizing Council's Committees on
21 Transportation and Public Utilities and
22 Public Safety to hold joint hearings
23 regarding ongoing issues of public safety
24 at SEPTA facilities and aboard SEPTA
25 vehicles, introduced by Councilman Oh.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

4 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
5 much, Council President.

6 We have had just such serious
7 issues, from mass shootings, drive-by
8 shootings, while people are just waiting
9 to get the bus, get on the train. Just
10 recently the terrible rape of a
11 passenger, just shocking. It is beyond
12 comprehension. And I thank Councilmember
13 Kenyatta Johnson for his continuous work
14 on gun violence with his Special
15 Committee, all the things that they are
16 doing, and of course Councilmember Curtis
17 Jones with his Public Safety Committee.

18 So with their expertise and
19 concern, I move for the adoption of this
20 resolution.

21 (Duly seconded.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
23 been moved and properly seconded.

24 All in favor indicate by saying
25 aye.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Those opposed?

5 (No response.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
7 ayes have it, and that resolution is
8 adopted.

9 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
10 other resolutions on the Final Passage
11 Calendar, Mr. President.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Thank you very much.

14 We're on pace to break a
15 record.

16 That completes our Calendar for
17 today.

18 And now we're going to move to
19 speeches, but prior to recognizing
20 members regarding speeches, I will note
21 for the record at this time that we will
22 use the Chat feature available in
23 Microsoft Teams to allow members to
24 signify that they wish to be recognized.
25 In order to comply with the Sunshine Act,

4 With that said, are there any
5 speeches on behalf of the majority?

6 And I think I saw -- I'm sorry.
7 For the minority. I'm sorry. The Chair
8 recognizes Councilman David Oh.

9 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
10 much, Council President.

11 I'd like to start by just
12 letting the public know that
13 Councilmembers do a lot that the public
14 does not see. Councilmembers do a lot.
15 And even though we may look at things
16 differently and we disagree and many
17 times we agree, Councilmembers do a lot
18 that the public does not see.

19 I want to talk about something
20 that is just so troubling to me. Today
21 at an undisclosed time and undisclosed
22 location, I'm going to meet several
23 mothers whose children were murdered.
24 They testified in court. That's been
25 done. And they were supposed to be

2 relocated, and that has not been done,
3 and they're getting shot at, and one
4 mother has lost four children to murder.

5 When the trial is over and
6 witness protection is done with, what is
7 our city doing? And how are we going to
8 have people testify if we do not take
9 care of these people?

10 It is so disturbing. It is so
11 shocking. It is so heartbreaking.

12 I'm going to go meet them. I
13 don't know what to say, but we have to do
14 something. This is just atrocious. And
15 I just thank my colleagues for all the
16 work that you do and how you interact
17 with the community and the residents and
18 how you do your best.

19 And I just want to let people
20 know, reach out to your Councilmembers.
21 Reach out to them. It's a difficult
22 process, but reach out to your
23 Councilmembers and ask for help, and we
24 shall do what we can to help.

25 Thank you.

3 Thank you, Councilman.

4 Speeches on behalf of the
5 majority?

6 The Chair recognizes
7 Councilwoman Kathy Gilmore Richardson.

8 COUNCILWOMAN RICHARDSON: Thank
9 you, Mr. President.

10 And, first, I wanted to thank
11 our colleague Councilmember Oh for his
12 work in reaching out to constituents, and
13 as he stated, as members of Philadelphia
14 City Council, we all are doing our very
15 best 24 hours a day, seven days a week to
16 be responsive to the people we have been
17 elected to serve, and we thank you for
18 all your work and all the work of my
19 colleagues here in this body.

20 But today, Mr. President, I
21 would be remiss not to take a quick point
22 of personal privilege just to mention a
23 few things, but first it was the late,
24 great Dr. Maya Angelou who said, I
25 sustain myself with the love of family.

2 And we know, Mr. President, as
3 Councilmember Oh stated, being an elected
4 public servant is a very difficult job on
5 the best day of the week. It's a
6 difficult job. So it's the love of
7 family that often sustains us as we
8 traverse doing all that we can 24 hours a
9 day, seven days a week for the people we
10 are elected to serve.

11 So on this day, I wish my
12 husband, my rider and my driver, David R.
13 Richardson, a very, very happy birthday.
14 Thank you for sustaining me and thank you
15 for sustaining our family.

16 Thank you, Mr. President, for
17 that point of personal privilege.

18 COUNCILMAN OH: Happy birthday,
19 David.

20 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: I know
21 that's right.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Love
23 it. Love it. Thank you, Councilwoman.

24 The Chair recognizes Councilman
25 Domb.

2 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
3 Council President.

4 This week I attended the
5 opening of Penn Medicine's Pavilion, and
6 being there was a great reminder to me
7 about how fortunate we are to have Penn
8 Medicine, Jefferson, Drexel, Temple, and
9 all the other great medical institutions
10 here in Philadelphia. And I think we
11 should more frequently actually celebrate
12 all the positive things about these
13 institutions and other things in our
14 city.

15 Recently, I don't know if you
16 saw this, but in Philadelphia, we
17 actually moved up 20 notches on the list
18 of best places to retire to in the
19 country, and a lot of it was because of
20 the tremendous healthcare we offered
21 people.

22 The Penn Medicine Pavilion,
23 it's an amazing facility. Everyone
24 should take a tour. It's the largest
25 capital investment and is the largest

2 project in Penn's history at
3 \$1.6 billion. The state-of-the-art
4 facility will include advanced operating
5 and emergency rooms, telemedicine
6 infrastructure for remote monitoring and
7 consultations, technology in each of the
8 private patient rooms to strengthen
9 communication among patients, families,
10 and care teams, and it should be no
11 surprise to any of us, though, that Penn
12 is at the forefront of healthcare
13 advancement.

14 The list of Penn Medicine
15 firsts is lengthy, but I will highlight
16 just a few. And I wasn't around when
17 this happened, but Penn Medicine founded
18 the first medical school in the nation.
19 Penn Medicine developed the first x-ray
20 machine. Penn Medicine discovered the
21 first gene linked to cancer, and
22 continues to work on all types of cures
23 and treatments through cell therapy,
24 which has made us a leading cancer center
25 in the world, cell therapy.

2 And that's just the tip of the
3 iceberg of Penn's firsts. One of the
4 most significant and relevant projects
5 going on at Penn which occurred was the
6 mRNA research, which we honored in
7 Council, by Drew Weissman, M.D., a
8 professor of infectious diseases, and
9 Katalin Kariko, an adjunct associate
10 professor, that helped pave the way for
11 the development of the Pfizer BioNTech
12 and Moderna COVID vaccines.

13 It's only fitting that the
14 nation's first hospital was also integral
15 in this new era in the fight against
16 COVID. The development and distribution
17 of this vaccine at Penn will go down in
18 history as one of the world's most
19 significant biomedical achievements in
20 our lifetime.

21 We should all thank the
22 leadership of the University of Penn,
23 including President Amy Gutmann, who I
24 believe will be moving on to another
25 position, and Penn Medicine's CEO, Kevin

2 Mahoney, and the tremendous doctors,
3 nurses, and staff.

4 I also want to thank the
5 various generous donors who made the
6 dream come alive of Penn Pavilion, as
7 well as the construction team who worked
8 on the project.

9 Penn Medicine is known
10 worldwide as one of the best medical care
11 facilities. We are all so proud of Penn
12 working as a team to make this happen and
13 proud that this world-class institution
14 is in Philadelphia.

15 Thank you, Council President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you, Councilman.

18 The Chair recognizes
19 Councilwoman Gym.

20 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you so
21 much, Council President.

22 So yesterday more than two
23 dozen principals, climate managers,
24 assistant principals came together on
25 North Broad Street to decry the latest

shootings that have been going on in our city. The shooting of a 16-year-old Lincoln High School student, who is now fighting for their life, marks what we understand to be the 35th young person 18 and younger shot in the City just since the start of school, and it's the fourth shooting that's happened immediately outside of a public school. And this doesn't even include the multiple incidences that have been happening within blocks of schools that have been terrifying families and young people all across the City.

The announcement by the Mayor that the Police Department will establish school safety zones in 25 areas of the City around 35 public and charter schools deeply impacted by violence was welcomed, but to be clear, it is so long overdue and there's so much more that needs to be done.

For months, educators, young people, families, colleagues here on

2 Council have been ringing the alarm on
3 the urgent need for our city to have a
4 coordinated school-based strategy to
5 protect young people, and it's largely
6 because we need an entity larger than the
7 School District to be doing this.

8 In addition to a police buffer
9 zone, there's a need clearly for safe
10 corridors, partnerships with community
11 groups, organizations, community mentors,
12 and leaders that can guarantee that
13 children are safe from the school door to
14 the front door.

15 But this is not just about what
16 happens immediately outside of schools.
17 It's actually a lot about what happens
18 inside of our schools. Council has been
19 a true leader. Thank you so much to
20 Councilmember Kenyatta Johnson for
21 emphasizing the trauma and behavioral
22 health supports that have been needed.
23 It's why we've been leading on the effort
24 to put social workers in our schools, to
25 ensure that there were nurses and

2 counselors restored back to schools, that
3 things are different now post-pandemic,
4 and our schools are suffering from
5 massive, massive vacancies that are
6 hollowing out services and opportunities
7 for schools to be able to respond not
8 only just every day but especially in
9 crisis.

10 When the shooting happened
11 outside of Franklin Learning Center, that
12 school did not have a school secretary.
13 It lacked climate staff. It did not have
14 a school nurse. And even though it
15 served many immigrant communities as one
16 of the few welcoming centers in the
17 School District of Philadelphia, it
18 lacked a Spanish-speaking bilingual
19 counselor.

20 We know that our schools also
21 need trauma and behavioral health
22 services, which are consistently promised
23 to kids, but somehow never seem to make
24 it into young people's lives. And I do
25 want to thank the leadership of

2 Councilmember Quinones-Sanchez.

3 Together, we're trying to figure out this
4 IBHS, but we need it to be coordinated
5 with schools.

6 And we've been very clear. As
7 Councilmember Thomas has led on
8 after-school and out-of-school-time
9 programs in neighborhoods most impacted
10 by violence, those young people need
11 guarantees, expansion of slots. We need
12 guaranteed employment for young people in
13 our high schools.

14 We can embrace our children and
15 bring and show them that it's not just
16 policing that keeps them safe, but a
17 community that is offering them
18 investments, opportunities and
19 opportunities after opportunities.

20 That's the message that we
21 heard from principals, but I also want to
22 make it clear that this effort goes far
23 beyond what the District can do and
24 really requires the City to coordinate
25 broadly amongst schools that are very

2 different.

3 The schools most impacted by
4 violence are a mixture of 25 schools
5 where 50 percent of the kids that have
6 been harmed or injured by gun violence
7 have last called their place. We don't
8 have to do it everywhere. We do have to
9 do it for these communities, for these
10 young people, and we have to do it now.

11 Thank you very much, Council
12 President.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you, Councilwoman.

15 The Chair recognizes Councilman
16 Thomas.

17 COUNCILMAN THOMAS: Thank you,
18 Council President.

19 I hate to continue to go down
20 the same road that a lot of my colleagues
21 have already started to go down, but I
22 just have -- I feel obligated.

23 I just want to take a moment to
24 offer my condolences to the family of
25 Kalique Williams. Kalique unfortunately

1 10/21/21 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 passed away yesterday. This was yet
3 another Simon Gratz student who had --
4 who's come victim to gun violence.

5 I'm not going to get into
6 details about the young man or anything
7 like that, because everyone I knew had
8 nothing but positive things to say about
9 him, and I heard about the shooting in
10 multiple circles from multiple people. A
11 lot of folks posted it on social media.
12 And these are the things that my
13 colleagues are talking about that are
14 just heart-wrenching, and I know everyone
15 on our side is doing the best we can, but
16 some how, some way it feels like it's not
17 enough.

18 I do appreciate my colleague
19 Councilmember Bass for reaching out to
20 the principal and the administration over
21 at Gratz as well as Councilmember -- our
22 Chair and Vice Chair of Education,
23 Councilmember Sanchez and Councilmember
24 Gym. But at the end of the day, on a
25 certain level, it just becomes

2 frustrating when you have to continue to
3 hear these stories, the impact it has on
4 the teachers, the principals, and the
5 entire school family.

6 And so I just want to offer my
7 condolences as well as my support for
8 Principal Dunn at Gratz High School as
9 well as the entire staff there. I know
10 it's becoming very fatiguing for them as
11 it relates to the emotional side of this,
12 the trauma that they continue to deal
13 with as they've lost a number of
14 students. I understand that it is not
15 easy, but it also doesn't get
16 acknowledged.

17 I think what I wanted to do, if
18 anything, today is just acknowledge that
19 we recognize what's taking place, let
20 them know that we appreciate them. We
21 appreciate all the educators across the
22 City, because we know they're struggling
23 right now. And I think my challenge to
24 my colleagues and I, because we always
25 step up to the plate, is figure out what

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can we do to support those who are
working in our schools, because they feel
like they're not being appreciated right
now. And I don't know exactly how we hug
thousands of teachers and administrators
and other climate staff and things like
that, but we have to think of something,
because at the end of the day, they are
the ones who take care of our children.
And the society is only judged based on
how we treat our children and our elders,
and right now we all know we have to do
better.

Thank you, Council President.

Thank you, colleagues.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you, Councilman. Very difficult
challenge for us all.

The Chair recognizes Councilman
Jones.

COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
Mr. President.

And to all of my colleagues who
do this on a daily and nightly basis, I

2 can only echo Member Oh's comments, that
3 you don't hear about a lot of what we go
4 through dealing with this violence, boots
5 on the ground all the time.

6 A young lady who was an Earth
7 Day kid -- and what is an Earth Day kid?
8 But an urban inner city kid that really
9 took environmental issues to heart --
10 helped me in 2008 clean up Centennial
11 Lake. That lake had refrigerators and
12 tires in it, and she and others of her
13 age went into that lake, cleaned it out.
14 It won a national restoration award.
15 Centennial Lake is one of the first
16 man-made lakes built in this country.

17 I say that because she doesn't
18 come from the suburbs. She comes from an
19 inner city street where violence
20 occurred.

21 She used to have the brightest
22 smile, and when she sung her Earth Day
23 songs, you know, her eyes lit up the
24 stage.

25 And she made it through

2 childhood and became a mother, and last
3 week she was with a friend, went into a
4 corner store, one of those brightly lit
5 often open stores, where she was
6 confronted by a man who liked her car.
7 And her escort friend was like taken
8 aback, and they decided to leave their
9 order, get out of the store and go ahead
10 and get in their car.

11 A block away that same person
12 that confronted them pulled up on a bike,
13 shot into the car, hit Diamond, is her
14 nickname, in the face. She was rushed to
15 the hospital. She is recovering. She is
16 in a, Councilman Oh, a halfway house
17 because she's afraid to go home. She is
18 in jeopardy of losing her eye, that same
19 eye I told you about that lit up the
20 stage talking about environmental issues.

21 And I rise to talk to you today
22 because this violence is becoming so
23 commonplace, her shooting didn't even
24 make the news. We have to continue to
25 talk about these things, Councilman Oh

2 and my colleagues, because we don't want
3 it to become so normal that people just
4 say it's another day in Philadelphia. We
5 have to still be upset and appalled and
6 take action about these things every
7 time. We have to answer the bell, step
8 up to the plate, and deal with this.

9 But when it gets to the point
10 where teddy bear memorials -- those are
11 those bunch of dolls and teddy bears that
12 wind up on street corners -- become so
13 commonplace and when shootings that are
14 not fatal wind up not even making the
15 news, we have to double down on our
16 efforts to deal with the climate in our
17 city.

18 So thank you, Member Oh, for
19 meeting with those parents, and whatever
20 we can do to examine the relocation
21 monies that we give to the Courts and the
22 District Attorney, I'm in.

23 Thank you, Mr. President.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you, Councilman.

2 Not a good note to end our
3 session on today, but it's a note of
4 reality as we continue to deal with this
5 balanced approach. And when we say
6 "balanced," we need to like have a
7 genuine conversation about all aspects of
8 the balance, both providing resources.

9 We had a really good meeting
10 last night with a group of individuals.
11 I'm not going to say their name because
12 they didn't allow me to do that, but they
13 were a group of individuals, some of who
14 were actually lifers, that had some
15 significant relationships, and we talked
16 about all aspects of it. And the mindset
17 of the individuals out here with these
18 issues -- and I agree with their
19 approach. I agree with what we did in
20 terms of providing money, the first round
21 of announcements for groups, money for
22 organizations, but the balance means that
23 it is genuinely balanced.

24 Some folks out here have made
25 the decision that they no longer want to

2 be a part of a civilized society, such as
3 the person that you just referenced,
4 Councilman, who would shoot
5 indiscriminately in a car, and that
6 balance requires that some people go
7 away.

8 So we really need to start
9 having that real conversation, and I
10 understand it's controversial, but some
11 people need to go away. All right?

12 I know I'm not supposed to
13 talk, but I'm just feeling all of our
14 pain and the pain of the City of
15 Philadelphia on a continuing basis. So
16 I'll leave you with that. I shouldn't be
17 talking about this on the podium.

18 So with that, I will recognize
19 Councilmember Jones for a motion to
20 adjourn.

21 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Bass,
22 Mr. President.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Oh,
24 I'm sorry. I didn't get that on mine.

25 Councilwoman Bass. I just got

2 it.

3 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you.

4 Well, I'm going to be really brief, and
5 thank you, Councilwoman Parker, but I'm
6 just incredibly disturbed by the news
7 that we just heard from Councilman Jones,
8 and it does send a very strong signal to
9 our communities when these incidents
10 don't even reach the news. But the fact
11 of the matter is is that most people know
12 and feel that our city does not feel safe
13 right now.

14 Just last week I was driving
15 along Chew Avenue in my district and I
16 encountered -- I won't exactly say what
17 it was that I encountered, but I will say
18 this: I called the district captain and
19 I said, you know, what are we going to do
20 about this? Who is in charge in this
21 city? Because it feels as if people can
22 do anything and get away with it.

23 And so one of the things I
24 think that we need to do is, I think that
25 we really need to seriously look at

2 what's happening in our schools, because
3 a lot of the violence I think that we see
4 happening on the outside has started
5 within the classroom, within the school
6 with some sort of internal beef and it
7 carries out into the neighborhood and it
8 goes on generationally for a long time.

9 We need to look at and have the
10 School District play a much more stronger
11 role in what's happening with the
12 violence in our community, because a lot
13 of it seems to be, in my opinion,
14 originating from some of our schools and
15 we just -- it's all hands on deck.
16 Everybody has got to be in to finding
17 solutions to the violence that we're
18 seeing.

19 My daughter, seventh grader, 12
20 years old, told me the other day there
21 were three fights today.

22 And I said, three fights today?

23 She said, mom, there's a fight
24 every day. Every day.

25 And this is totally

unacceptable. It shouldn't be. But we have to get in front of this, and I do think -- I want to make the point. I know Councilmember Gym spoke about this earlier, but the resources in terms of counseling and just figuring out a way to deal with some of the violence that's emanating from our schools -- you have to call it out -- I think we have to really look at that and do something serious about it.

So I just want to thank all of my colleagues. These are very difficult times. We all take this all very, very seriously and it hurts our hearts. And I know this. I've talked to my colleagues about it, and I know that it hurts their hearts, and I just really want to thank them for their diligence in this matter.

So thank you, Mr. President.

Thank you.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

Thank you, Councilwoman. And we'll continue to be a part of the solution,

2 this very challenging issue that we face
